A Man Who Knew One Hundred and Fourteen Languages.

Gniseppe Mezzofanti was, without doubt, the greatest master of languages who ever lived. He was born in the year 1774, and his father, a carpenter, destined him for the same calling.

He worked on a bench standing with-Latin, and without knowing the Greek alphabot, or even looking into a Greek or Latin book, he picked up by ear a considerable knowledge of both languages, thus discovering to himself and others his wonderful aptitute for linguistic studies, and attracting the notice of a priest who arranged with him for his education. In college he mastered Latin, Greek, Hebrew, Spanish, French, Swedish, German, Arabic, and Coptic, Swedish, German, Arabic, and Coptic, and at the age of 23 was appointed pro-fessor of Arabic in the University at Bologna.

During the Napoleonie wars he was a constant visitor to the hospitals, whether he went mainly for the purpose of learning the various languages spoken by the prisoners there, among whom he found Bohemians, Russians, Walloahs, Poles, and from them he learned to speak fluently all their languages.

Late in life he went to Rome, first as

keeper of the library of the Vatican, and afterwards as a Cardinal. Here he continued his linguistic studies, mastercontinued his linguistic studies, mastering Sancrit, Persian, Georgian, Wolsh, Irish, Lappish, Armenian, Chinese, and a number of other tongues, and when he died, in 1849, he could speak correctly one hundred and fourteen different languages. The most astonishing part of the matter, however, was that he not only spoke these languages correctly.



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
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
