

The July report of the Department of Agriculture, says a Washington dispatch, represents an improvement in winter wheat, but a decline in the prospects of spring wheat on account of the unecasonable weather in some quarters, and the insect enemies in others. The average in eorn is increased in West Virginia and Minnesota, and decreased in all the other States, except Florida and Arkansas, where it remains the same as last year. Complanting was oversymbere retarded by the weather, and in many cases the corn has been several times replanted. The universal complaint of defective seed is made in all parts of the country.

The condition of cotton has been previously given. The reports up to July I indicate the crop to be 89.5 per cent. of average, nickluding Virginia, where the culture is yet mainly experimental.

Visit of the Austrian Emperor to the Ex-position–His Inspection of the Ameri-can Department. (Vienna (July 22) Cor, New York Herald.)

The Emperor visited the American Department this morning, accompanied by Baron Schwarz-Senborn, Count Belgard, and the Minister of Police, Notice had been given to the Commissioners beforehand. His Majesty wore a full marshal's uniform. 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
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
