I have noticed that the middlemen are fully aware of your obligations, or, if not, the first thing you do is to inform them, by saying: "I must raise some money to pay debts, what can you give me a bushel for my grain?" That gives them to understand that you are obliged to sell, no matter what you get, and they take the advantage of you.
