INTERESTING NEWS COMPILATION.

FROM WASHINGTON.

THE PUBLIC DEBT STATEMENTS ISSUED ON THE 1st showed the total debt to be \$1,531,401,801.

THE PRESIDENT made the following appointments on the 1st: A. L. Snowden, of Pennsylvania, Minister Resident and Consul General to Roumania, Servia and Greece.

THE GOVERNMENT RECEIPTS FROM ALL SOURCES during the fiscal year closed June 30 aggregated \$88,291,075, against \$77,339,000 for the preceding year.

THE ANNUAL STATEMENT OF THE 1st of the Comptroller of the Currency showed that the National bank circulation had fallen from \$22,000,000 a year ago to \$21,000,000, or about seventeen per cent.

IN 1868, before the newspaper stamp was abolished in Hungary, there were only 120 newspapers and magazines published in the whole kingdom.

MISS HOWLAND and Miss Burbank, teachers in the high school at Hartford, Conn., sailed the other day for Europe.

PERSONS who have a superstitious dread of Friday will be pleased to hear that this is a year for Fridays.

CARLISLE D. GRAHAM, who proposed to "shoot" Niagara Falls in a barrel, took the barrel to Chippewa, Ont., recently and let it drift down the river and over the Horseshoe falls.

THE LONGEST RECORDED EXAMINATION of a legal witness was recently concluded in New York in the case of the State of New Jersey against the Morris & Essex Railway Company for \$1,000,000 back taxes.

WILLIAM F. MOORE and Bertha A. Van Dusen were married at Ironton, O., the other night.

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THE EXECUTION OF THE NEGRO PRINCE Fleming and Richard Jordan, for the murder of John Taylor (colored), took place at New Orleans, La., on the 2d.

AT THE RACE TRACK in Oklahoma, Ind. T., the grand stand collapsed on the 5th, injuring more than one hundred persons, many fatally, and one killed outright.

KENTUCKY REPUBLICANS met in State convention at Lexington on the 4th and nominated David G. Colston for State Treasurer.

AT RE LOUIS on the 2d four negroes were arrested for the killing of seven white men in an election riot at Marion, Miss., in November, 1881.

THE NORTH AND SOUTH Dakota, Washington and Montana constitutional conventions met on the 4th to adopt State constitutions.

AT MILWAUKEE the large Lark, Jung & Borchert brewery, with fifty-two thousand barrels of beer in stock, was burned on the 4th.

FRANK BREKIDIS killed his wife at Memphis, Tenn., on the 5th because she refused to live with him, and then took his own life.

FLAMES DESTROYED THE BUSINESS DISTRICT and a large part of the residence section of Ellensburg, W. T., early on the morning of the 5th.

SHERIFF BRASSCOX attempted to arrest William and James Mills on the 5th, at Kirbyville, Mo., for carrying concealed weapons.

FROM PROM REPORTS received on the 7th Secretary Mohler, of the Agricultural Department of Kansas, estimated the total yield of wheat at 54,000,000 bushels, just double that of last year.

THE OHIO UNION LABOR PARTY in State convention at Lima on the 7th made the following nominations: For Governor, J. Rhodes; Lieutenant-Governor, C. L. Hilditch; Attorney General, H. A. Tuttle; Auditor, Martin Kramer; Treasurer, D. D. Martin; Attorney General, William Baker; Commissioner of Public Works, Oswald Dietz.

DURING A RECENT terrific destructive rainstorm at Hong Kong, China, fifteen lives were lost by flood and lightning.

AT BRUNN, Austria, fifteen thousand workmen struck for higher wages on the 1st, including the bakers in the city.

ON THE 1st the Massachusetts rifle team contested with the Honorable Artillery Company at rifle shooting at London, and the American team won by a score of 1,013 to 961.

MICHAEL DAVITT in his testimony before the Parnell commission in London on the 2d admitted that he had given the names of the best Irishmen in America, and included no more a murder club than the Carlton Club of London.

ON THE 2d the World's Sunday-School convention opened at Parker's Temple in London, and closed on the 5th.

ROBERTSON'S fire-works factory in Aubervilliers, France, exploded on the 2d, killing seven persons.

ON THE 4th Mr. Hirsch, the new United States Minister to Constantinople, presented his credentials to the Sultan and met with a cordial reception.

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GOVERNOR PIERCE of Illinois, Grants a Pardon to the Noted "Fire-Worker" Mackin in Time to Restore Him to Citizenship.
