TELLS HOW TO GROW YOUNG IN SPIRIT

Remember Youth Like the Eagle—The Way to Obedience the Effect of Advancing Years—Simple Habits Lead to Longevity

(Copyright, 1901, by Louis Kleppok) Washington, Feb. 17.—In this discourse Dr. Talmage shows how anyone can conquer the effect of years and grow younger in spirit...

CANADA
