



The Lewis Spring & Axle Co. have their new spring depositions in full working order, and they are now turning out a large number of spring daily for several automobile manufacturers besides those for their own use on Rollier cexs. The new plant is in the building formerly used by the Flanders Man-ufacturing Co, as the steel ball de-partment of their factories.
