"In most cases farmers who intend to buy fertilizer stocks for fall deliver ery will do well to withhold their orders until the present high level of y prices becomes adjusted," says Professor McCool. "Prices are certain to come down, and those who delay purchase will save the difference."

Berlin-A new German cabinet has been formed under the premiership of Herr Bauer, formetly minister of labor, with Dr. Herman Muedler the Mojority Socialist leader, as minister of foreign affairs.

Bernstorn, Demburg and Brockdorff Bernstoff, Dernburg and Brockdoff, Anntzau all have been swept aside in the reorganization. The only men of international repute who remain the governing circle are Noske, who stays as minister of defense, and Erzebergof, who is minister of finance. The national assembly, Sunday afternoon, by a vote of .27 to 13 decided to sign the peace terms. The assembly also voted confidence in the new government of Herr Bauer.

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GERMANS SCUTTLE INTERNED FLEFT

SSELS TAKEN BY BRITISH AT ARMISTICE ARE SENT TO BOTTOM BY CREWS.

"UPHELD TRADITION" THEY SAY

mander of Fleet Ordered Deed-Craft Went Down.

London.—The German officers and saflors forming the complements of the German ships interned at Scapa Flow, sank most of their fleet June 21. All the big ships, the battleships and nattle crussers, excepting the Eaden and numerous smaller craft were unk, while others went ashore in a nalf sunken condition.

It is estimated that more than 400,

half sunken condition.

It is estimated that more than 400,000 tons of enemy crafts went down. Admiral von Renter, commander of the surrendered German facet personally ordered its scuttling by the crews, "to uphold the traditions of the German navy, which knows no surrender", he says.

The wholesale sinking of the German ships, which were surrenderal under the terms of the armistice was carefully arranged by officers and crews. All explosives had been removed, and therefore the only means of destroying the ficet was by opening the seacocks. The ships went down slowly, with the German flag, which the crews had hoisted, showing at the mastheads.

The crews composed entirely of Germans, under the terms of the armistice, which did not permit of British guards aboard, took to the boats when the vessels began to settle.

The Newfoundland scaling voyage for 1919 closed recently with the smaller stratch in recent years. Only ten ships, the smallest fact since 1870, prosecuted the industry, the crews numbering 1.085 men, and the total catch amounting to \$1.235 petts, valued at \$278,145. This gives a decrease in number of 70,148 and in value of \$555,407, compared with the 1918 voyage.

The poor fishing seemed to be due to adverse weather conditions, ice being too closely packed for vessels to marking the properly, and to the fact that the scal were scattered. The price of young scal petts was placed at \$8 per hundredweight, as against \$12 for 1918, and \$6.50 to \$7 for other qualities as against \$5 to \$9.55.
