

GARMENT FACTORY IS COMING TO CHELSEA

Has Rented Second Floor Loft In The
Wilkinson Bldg. and Will Start
Operations July First.

The Goebel Garment company is the latest addition to the growing industrial plants in Chelsea and it will begin the manufacture of women's garments, including aprons, dresses, etc., about July 1st.

Mr. F. S. Goebel, recently general manager of the United Garment Co. of Canton, Ohio, will head the new concern and has rented the entire second floor loft of the Wilkinson building. He expects to have his machinery here, ready for installation within a few days.

Upwards of 40 women and girls will be needed to operate the plant, but only a few will be started at a time so that they can be trained for the work. Eighteen cents per hour

will be paid at the start and in a few days time the average woman will earn as high as three dollars a day, depending upon her ability to learn the work.

Mr. Goebel has rented the residence, Park and Madison streets, now occupied by W. L. Walling, and will move his family here as soon as Mr. Walling vacates the property, about the first of next month.

FERTILIZER WILL BE CHEAPER.

Commercial fertilizer prices are coming down greatly for fall delivery, according to Dr. M. M. McCool, soils specialist at M. A. C. The prediction is based upon information gathered from fertilizer men and farmers all over the country.

In most cases farmers who intend to buy fertilizer stocks for fall delivery will do well to withhold their orders until the present high level of prices becomes adjusted," says Professor McCool. "Prices are certain to come down, and those who delay purchase will save the difference."

Mixed fertilizers will be appreciably lower in the fall, while prices of acid phosphate will show less change. All indications, however, point to a sure fall in the prices of all commercial fertilizers, and in plenty of time for the fall deliveries.

Ordinance No. 53.

An Ordinance Relative to Users of Water Which is Furnished Them by the Municipal Water Works.

The Common Council of the Village of Chelsea Ordain:

Section 1. It is hereby ordered and declared that all users of water, furnished by the Water Works of the Village of Chelsea, shall have installed in their residence, place of business or premises, as soon as the same can be done, and after having been requested by the Water Works Commission, a meter, for the purpose of metering the amount of water used by them.

Section 2. Such meter shall be furnished such users of water, by the Electric Light and Water Works Commission, at actual cost.

Section 3. The Electric Light and Water Works Commission is hereby authorized to purchase such a number of meters, as in its judgment is necessary to furnish each user with a meter.

Section 4. Each property owner, who is a user of water furnished by the Village, shall pay the actual cost of such meter, and the installation thereof. Such user, however, shall have the right to pay the same in installments of three dollars quarterly, the meter to remain the property of the Village of Chelsea, until fully paid for, and in case of the payment in installments there shall be added the sum of one dollar to the price of the meter.

Section 5. The Electric Light and Water Works Commission shall, as soon as practical, fix a rate to be charged per thousand gallons of water used, which rate shall be equitable both to the user of water and the Village of Chelsea. There shall however be fixed a minimum charge per month, which shall be due and payable each and every three months.

Section 6. All meters shall be installed under the supervision and instructions of the Electric Light and Water Works Commission.

Section 7. In case of neglect, or refusal, on the part of any property owner, who is a user of village water,
