

HEAVY FIRE, WATER AND SMOKE DAMAGE

Gallagher's Bazaar Stock Was Ruined
In Early Sunday Evening Fire.
Damage Upwards \$15,000.

Fire, smoke and water Sunday evening damaged S. S. Gallagher's bazaar and grocery stock and the Klein building on North Main street, in which the Gallagher store is located, upwards of \$15,000 according to hasty estimates made Monday morning.

The Gallagher stock is insured for \$14,000 and is practically ruined. The damage to the building will probably be another \$1,000, at least, covered by insurance.

The fire started on the second floor of the Klein building in rooms used by Mr. Gallagher for the storage of surplus stock, and was first noticed by Fred Oesterle about nine o'clock Sunday evening. The fire department responded promptly to the alarm, but the rear half of the second floor was all ablaze and it was necessary to use considerable water to quell the flames, resulting in the flooding of the store proper on the floor below.

The damage to the building includes the burning of the rear half of the roof so badly that it will have to be rebuilt, also all of the wood work and floor in the rear half of the second floor.

Just how the fire started is still unexplained. Mr. Gallagher was in the store Sunday morning to attend to the heater and came up again in the evening for the same purpose, but had forgotten his keys, as the result of changing his clothes and so did not go into the store. If he had entered probably he would have smelled the smoke of the then smoldering fire as it was only a short time afterwards that the alarm was turned in.

Adjoining buildings also suffered some from smoke and water, particularly the Knights of Pythias hall on the second floor of the McKune building, adjoining the Klein block.

ISHAM-BRAATZ.

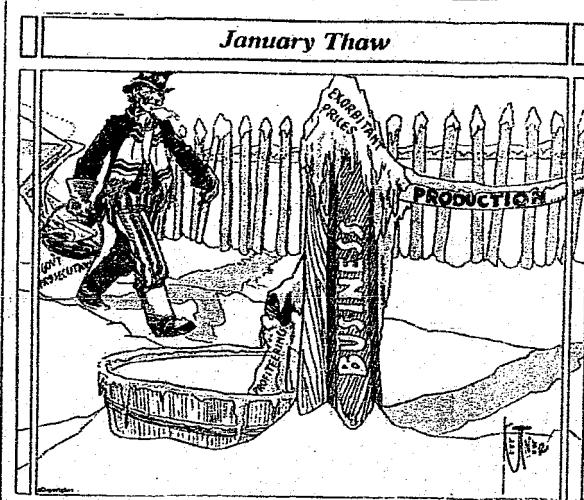

OUIJA STORY WAS FAKED

University Officials Say Report Regarding Use of Mystic Boards Is False.

The "best known member of the University faculty" who, according to Detroit and Ann Arbor newspapers, declared that women students of the University of Michigan were suffering nervous breakdowns from their use of ouija boards, can not be discovered.

Mrs. Myra B. Jordan, Dean of Women, and Dr. John F. Effinger, Dean of the college of Literature, Science, and the Arts, say that the story is absolutely without foundation. Dr. W. R. Forsythe, head of the University Health Service, stated that nervous breakdowns are no more frequent than usual, and that the few cases the health service is treating could be traced to natural causes.

The majority of the women at the university are enjoying their usual good health. Naturally, they were amazed when the account of their abnormal condition appeared in the newspapers. Contrary to the startling statements to the effect that more ouija boards than Bibles could be found in the rooms of sorority houses, two Bibles to each room and no ouija board at all were produced in one of the houses.

A few girls acknowledge possession of the boards, but they consider them playthings and not spiritual mediums. The "specialists," in whose care the neurotic women were said to be placed, are missing, along with the faculty member who was supposed to have given the press the information about the magic board menace. None of the sorority houses are able to produce even one girl who "is a wreck of her former self." All of them testify to full dinner tables.

The Ann Arbor dealers who were quoted as saying that the demand for the boards exceeded their supply, cannot be found, though a thorough search was made for them. Managers of State street book stores and novelty shops say that they have sold only a few boards, and that most of those sold were bought by citizens and not by students.

150 MICHIGAN MEN ARE MILLIONAIRES

Only Seven Other States Have More in Millionaire Class Than Has Wolverine State.

One hundred and fifty Michigan citizens are classified as "millionaires" by the governmental bureau of internal revenue in a statement given out Saturday. That is, their annual income tops \$100,000.

Only seven other states in the union have more millionaires than Michigan. They are New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Illinois, New Jersey, Ohio and California.

One Michigan man is said to have had an income of \$4,886,654 in 1917 on which he paid an income tax of \$1,987,637. Financial people in Detroit "guess" it is Henry Ford. Two Michigan men had incomes of more than \$1,000,000; four reached the \$500,000 mark in a single year; five were in the \$400,000 class; six took in \$300,000; eight, \$200,000; eighteen, \$200,000; thirty-one, \$150,000 and seventy-five made between \$100,000 and \$150,000.

Throughout the country there are eight persons whose annual income tops \$4,000,000, and four who take in more than \$5,000,000.

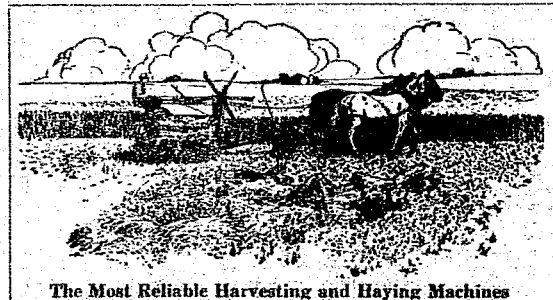

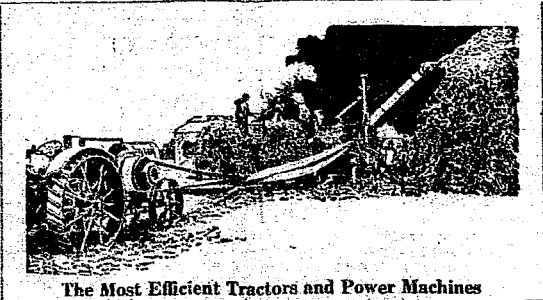

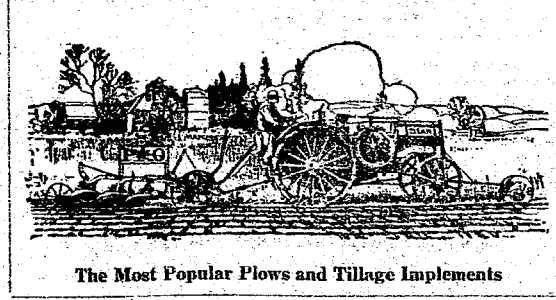
