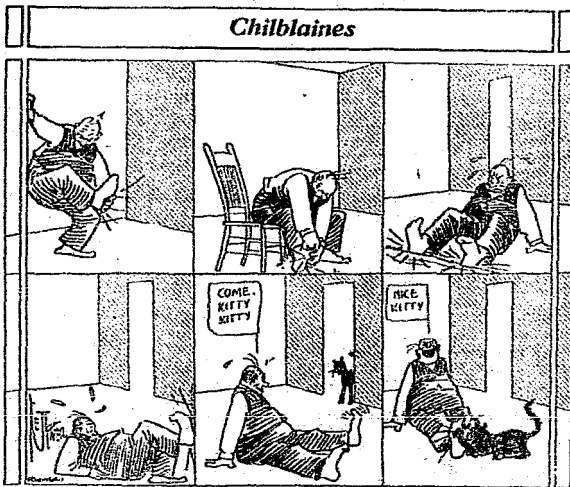

## NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS

Brief Items, of Interest in Chelsea And Vicinity, From Nearby Towns and Localities.

**STOCKBRIDGE**—Mrs. Chas. Fortman reports to us that she has a Bible printed in 1823, size 9x11x2 1/2 inches, which was her great-grandmother's, and which she treasures very highly.—Brief-Sun.

**MANCHESTER**—Miss Emma Wolfe, a much respected woman of this village, died at her home Sunday night after a long and painful illness, aged 69 years. She had been a practical nurse in this community for several years and will be greatly missed.

**HOWELL**—The building containing the foundry, finishing and stock room of the Howell Electric Motors company was burned to the ground Monday night with a loss of \$25,000 and upwards, covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown.

**MANCHESTER**—A special meeting of the taxpayers of Manchester school district No. 2 was called at the high school building Monday evening to act upon the proposition of building a new ward school. Over fifty were present. After considerable discussion pro and con, a vote was taken with the result of 34 against and 17 in favor of erecting a new building on the site of the present building. It was also decided that some other arrangement must be made for the 20 pupils of the ward school, since that building is in an unsanitary and unsafe condition.

## DR. HARRY HOWARD AVERY.

Dr. Harry Howard Avery died Wednesday, February 18, 1920, at his home in Chelsea, 231 East Middle street, following a long and painful illness which he bore with remarkable patience. He was 53 years and 16 days of age.

Dr. Avery came from a long line of illustrious ancestors, "the Grotan Avery clan," who were prominent in the early history and development of the United States. His parents were Henry Estlin Avery (Sprague) Avery, well known and highly respected residents of Marion township, Livingston county, where the deceased was born February 4, 1867. There he grew to young manhood on a farm and by thrift and industry accumulated the funds necessary to permit of his entering the dental department of the University of Michigan, from which he graduated in 1891. Soon afterwards he located in Chelsea, which place had since been his home and where he had continued to practice up until about two years ago. He was a member of the State Dental society, of the Royal Arch Masons, the O. E. S., Knights of Pythias, and of the Chelsea Methodist church.

He was united in marriage with Miss Ida Estella Whitaker, in Jackson, October 22, 1890, who is left with one son, Arthur Henry Avery, to mourn their loss. His mother, Mrs. Henry Avery of Howell, two brothers, Dr. Ernest Lee Avery of Howell and Cassius Bruce Avery of Duluth, and one sister, Mrs. Frank Bailey of Plymouth, survive him also.

The funeral was held from his late residence at two o'clock this afternoon, Rev. Harvey Pearce of Detroit, assisted by Rev. H. R. Bentley of this place, conducting the service.

The remains will be placed in the vault at Oak Grove cemetery and later will be removed to Howell where they will be placed in a crypt in the mausoleum, with Masonic rites.

## MAY BE BOHEMIAN WAXWINGS.

Regarding the strange birds noted by Mrs. W. D. Arnold recently, mention of which was made in the Tribune of February 10th; we are inclined to the opinion that they were the rare Bohemian Waxwings which have been reported from several points in Southern Michigan this winter. An observer in Brooklyn reported them at about the same time Mrs. Arnold saw the strange little birds in her yard.

These birds are a northern species, whose customary habitat is Northern Canada and the Hudson Bay country. But occasionally, during unusually long and severe winters, they migrate south, and such is undoubtedly the case this winter.

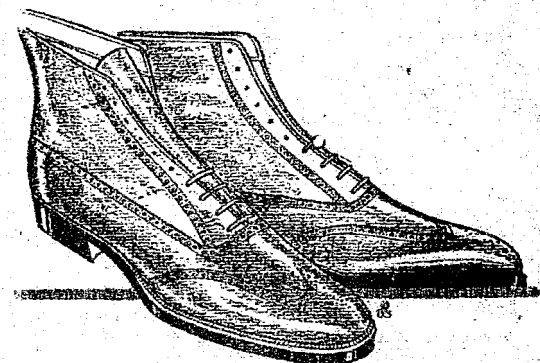
