

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"The Farmer Kept Faith With the Country

-- Now Let the Country Keep Faith With Him'

LEONARD WOOD

This is Wood's sentiment toward the American Farmer, as expressed in his Platform and speeches:

"If the farmers had not kept faith as they did we would have lost the war, we would have been unable to feed our Allies and ourselves. They sent their sons to war, and in spite of the shortuge of labor they raised the biggest crop in history.

"We want to maintain our rural population because it is the basis of our most stable eitizenship. To do this, we must make life on the farms more attractive.
