

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CONSERVING EGG SUPPLY.

"Now is the time to conserve the egg supply, for next winter's use when eggs are expensive and hard to get," says A. B. Spencer, superintendent of the Methodist Old People's home.

"One year ago we preserved in water-glass 100 dozens of eggs and of that number we lost just one egg. And furthermore, on preparing the cracks for this year's supply we found that about three dozens had been over looked and they were in perfect condition, too. The convenience of this way of preserving eggs is that one may put down one egg or one dozen, or more, as one prefers, once the solution has been prepared."


