ANN ARBOR—More than 18,000 books were added to the University of Michigan libraries during the fiscal year ending June 30 last. Of the number 14,500 were purchased from a fund provided by the board of regents.

Although Freeman lost considerable blood, it is not thought by jail authorities that he will die.

JACKSON—Fire broke out in the Francis street school here shortly after noon, Tuesday, believed to have been caused by a defective chimney. The 500 children were marched out in the fire drill without excitement. Damage to the building was confined largely to the roof, which was badly burned. The flames were under control within a few moments of time of the arrival of the fire department.

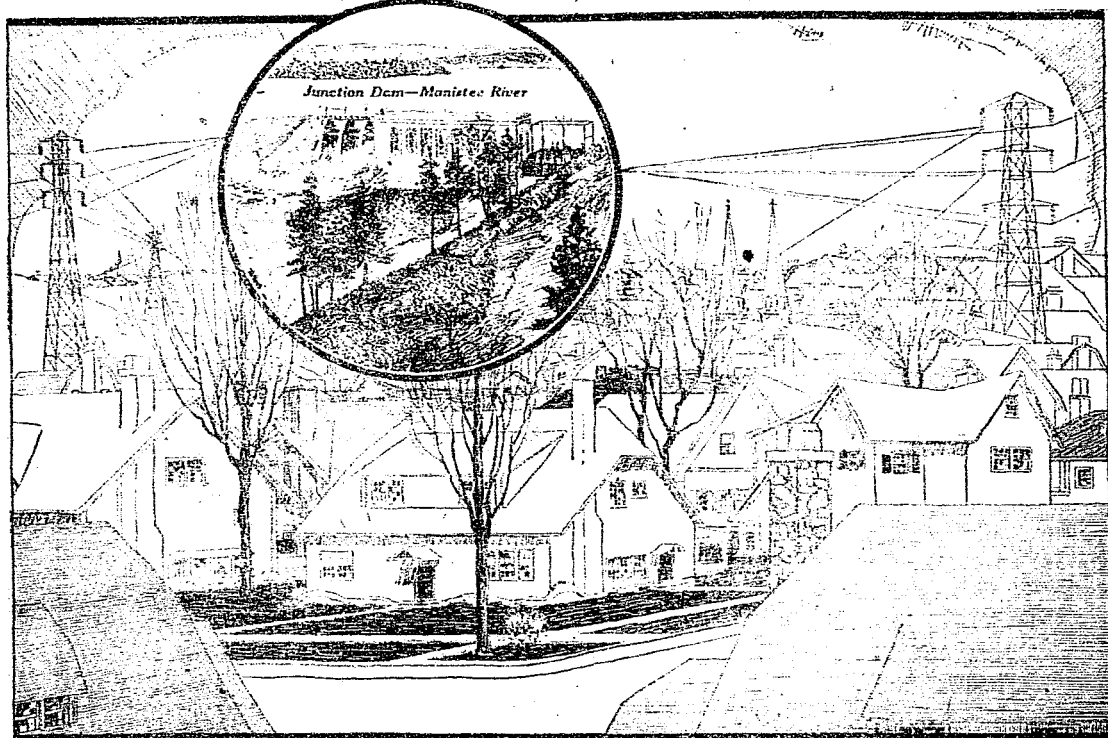
