

Will Use Checks and Trade Accept

All Kinds.

Rochester, N. Y.—A large business house having headquarters in this city has undertaken to conduct its affairs entirely without the use of money. Instead of currency, it intends to use checks to make payments of every kind, including its pay roll. As the concern deals with more than \$89,000 individual customers, the result of the experiment will be watched with interest.

The company's reason for adopting this method is given as an effort to demonstrate a means of ending the epidemic of pay-roll robberies and "to show that unodern business may be conducted most ediciently without the use of 'small change,' thus leaving the mathob's money where it belongs, in the banks, to serve as the hasis of credit.

The announcement says even carfaires, noted bills and reliroad fares for the company's force of several hundred salescen and other sundries are to be paid by check.

All petty items, even the one-cent postage stamp, will be paid henceforth by check, and "no currency of any


