Washington-Operation of the United States postal service for the fiscal year 1920 resulted in a deficit of \$17,270.422-the second largest in the history of the service -Postmaster General Burleson shows in his annual report to the president, in which the expenditures of the postolice depart-ment are placed at \$154,222.609 and revenues at \$437,150.212.
