

SHARON BOY ASSAULTED.

Fatally Injured On Shipboard In New York Harbor.

Charles Burch, former Sharon boy, son of Dan Burch, was fatally injured Saturday in New York harbor. He was chief engineer of the merchant vessel Half Moon and had discharged a subordinate on account of drunkenness. Later, the discharged man waylaid Mr. Burch, striking him on the head and knocking him down a stairway, resulting in a fracture of the skull which caused death about five hours later.

Mr. Burch left Sharon about 20 years ago. He served in the navy during the Philippine war and being on the naval reserve was called to serve in the World War, and was made chief engineer on the naval steamship Martha Washington, which transported troops to and from France. He had only recently received his discharge from the navy and had just returned from a six months trip to the far east.

NEW CANCELLING MACHINE.

A new stamp cancelling machine was placed in service at the Chelsea postoffice, Monday, and the old "armstrong" cancelling outfit has been put away for the long, long sleep.


