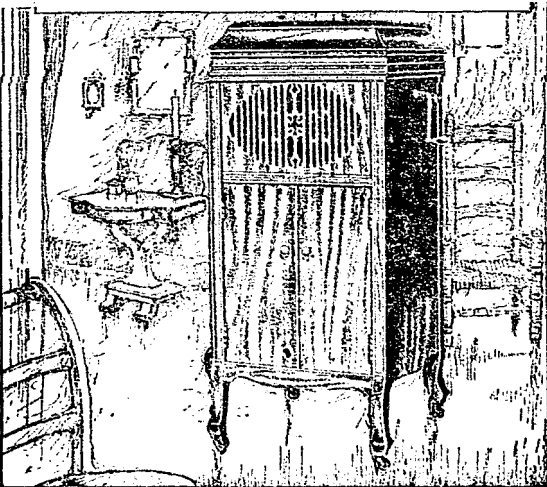

Made Excellent Showing International Poultry Show in Detroit.

Chester breeders of fancy poultry made an excellent showing at the International Poultry Exhibit in Detroit, the past week and brought home a liberal bunch of premiums.

Exhibits were present from all sections of the country, also from Canada. The judges were Mr. Wells of Madison Square Garden, New York, and Mr. Hill of Chicago, acknowledged to be the best in the United States.

James Geddes had eight entries of bantam chickens and took eight first premiums, and was awarded a special silver cup for the best male bird at the show, also a bronze medal from the American Poultry Association for the best variety of birds at the show. The male bird mentioned above was an English Birchen Game Bantam.

Robert Collins showed his Single Comb White Leghorns and was awarded: First on young pen, third on old pen, and second on cockerel.

transferred in an order handed down by Judge Charles C. **Declare Dry Law is Failure.**  
St. Louis: The Volstead law, as it now stands, is a failure, declares an "Executive" pamphlet, mailed by the Auburn-Lynch Brewing company to President Harding, all members of the senate and house and to Secretary of the Treasury Mellon. The pamphlet argues for a modification of the dry act so as to permit the manufacture and sale of light wines and beer. Disrespect for the Volstead law, the pamphlet declares, is breeding a disrespect for all law.

### Declare Lower Taxes Necessary.

Washington. Further revision of the tax laws, with a reduction of the maximum of income tax rates to 20 or 25 per cent and adjustment of the rates on bonus, profits and estates, is suggested by Secretary McMillin in his last annual report transmitted to Congress. The secretary announces that the treasury is preparing with respect to that part of the "collected" means is unbalanced and urges prompt funding of the two billions of dollars of foreign loans.

**Install Baths After 486 Years.** Cambridge, Eng. Undergraduates at Catherine's College will soon have the luxury of an occasional bath. The college buildings, It is 486 years since the college was built. Students had to bathe as best they could in their room or get a bath elsewhere. **Loan Correspondence Made Public**

Washington, July 15.—Publicity is to be given to the voluminous government correspondence—much of it relating to the allied loan which filled 16 large packing cases when sent to the senate judicial committee by the treasury department. The correspondence was printed for the confidential information of senators and the senate, at the request of Senator Reed, Democrat, Missouri, and an edition for general distribution for public information, it being no longer secret.

**Hold Out For Larger Cut.**  
Washington. — Western states awarded a 16 1/2 per cent cut in freight rates on grain, grain products and hay in order to accept the voluntary offer of railroads to cut rates 10 per cent generally on all agricultural products available, according to a protest which Clyde M. Reed, chairman of the Kansas utilities commission, says the management committee of the state's concerned, arranged to file with the interstate commerce commission last week.
