THE HOPE FOR FUTURE CITIZENRY

The American farm home offers the unit from which may be developed a higher type of governing citizenship. Secretary Work declared the other day in an address before the association of Land Grant colleges. Faith can be placed in Mr. Work's assertion because even to the most casual observer it is apparent that it is in the country that most of the typical Americans are found today. There is something about getting close to the soil that seems to breed men and women of staidward morals and physique. Nature probably has freer play. Not so stifled in its workings as in the congested communities.

It is true that on the farm too much of the race's burden has been placed upon the women. They have had their full half of the day's work to do besides caring for the family including father.

But civilization is trying to correct this inequality, as Mr. Work says "one of the most advanced movements of the time is the campaign" to introduce motor driven labor saving machinery into the farm home for the relief of the woman there.

"Out of this should come the reading mother; the home teaching the children; a more hygienic environment; a better physique; a stronger mentality; a more responsible moral sense and the nation's greatest present need, contentment of mind and time for reflection.

"The modern American home is not found in the cities. It must be cultivated and fostered in the country, for from it must continue to come the men who will do the thinking of this great nation.

"If our social fabric is to be renewed the necessary coloring must be done in the home and that too, in the farm homes where there are 7,700,000 children under 10 years of age.

"I would make a plea for the farm family unit. For the six million women on farms; that their load might be lightened, their hours shortened, recreation enjoyed and their minds rested; that they be helped to take their place as character builders, to build the home life around them."

Never was a better plea made for the race than this. Not something spun out of fancy, but truths placed before us by one who has a proper regard for his fellows.

OUR COST OF GOVERNMENT

How much of your hard earned money is being spent for government? The tax question is coming to the front again, so here's a summary of the tax spenders supported by the taxpayers.

There are 2,700,000 public servants on the payroll of national, state and municipal governments in America, and their pay 3500 million dollars a year, according to a check up by the national industrial conference board.

This huge figure doesn't include the 670,000 pensioners and other inactive persons receiving support—the whole lot collecting 320 million dollars a year.

So taxpayers are supporting 3,370,000 tax spenders—or, as a wag calls them, "tax eaters." And the cost of the whole lot is not far from four billion dollars a year, for salaries alone.

The public payroll costs every man, woman, and child in the country an average of \$91 a year. The cost is \$91 a year for every American over 10 years of age.

Furthermore one person out of every 12 over the age of 16 in America is a public employee. In other words, every 11 taxpayers are supporting one tax spender.

The cost of state, county and municipal governments has increased tremendously since the war. William P. Helms Jr., an able authority, estimates that state governments alone cost 1,443 million dollars in 1932. That figure includes all items of expense—salaries, interest on debt, etc.

The really important question, of course, is what taxpayers are getting for their money, rather than how many are getting it.

Many things on the stage are both immoral and stupid, intentionally, but never the less very stupid. Women, as now presented to the public, are about as interesting as so many "cans of dressed beef hung up in a butcher shop. Managers ought to know that.

A few years ago, even Henry Ford wouldn't have thought this possible. He will talk, through the air, from his WWI station at Dearborn, using his 300 metre wave, across a thousand miles of this continent, three thousand miles of the Atlantic Ocean, to men and women "listening in" in England.

That miracle would have astounded those living when the Old Testament was written.

Let's hope that in a few thousand years with every human being able to talk at will with any other on earth, men will decide to stop murdering each other, and follow Joseph Pulitzer's advice, "Don't fight; advertise."

Young ladies of Chicago's "Co-ed" University decide that "all men are talkers" and are all dull. Some, with dullness, combine seriousness, others froth, others triviality, but all are dull.

Nothing new in that truthful statement. The miracle is that women have endured men's dullness, pretending to be interested in their conversation, for so many centuries, from dull modern man back to Adam. He must have had nothing at all to say, being so freshly made and having no gossip to bring home to his wife. You do not wonder that, in the despair of boredom, she talked to the snake.
