DRAIN MAY BE USED FOR SEWAGE DISPOSAL

Recent Act of State Legislature Permits Use of County Drains for Sewage Disposal by City or Village.

Questions arising over the possibility of cities or villages being permitted to use county drains for the purpose of sewage disposal are definitely answered in the following excerpt from Chapter 17, House Enrolled Act No. 174, enacted by the last legislature. Section Five reads:

"Any county drain may be used for sewage disposal by any city, village or township for which it shall be available, and shall be kept clean and out or enlarged as the county drain commissioner shall determine to be necessary for the carrying off of the sewage and the natural flow of said drain at the expense of the city, village or township using the same, and if used by more than one, the expense to be borne by each shall be determined by the board of supervisors."

The Act bears directly on the situation facing Chelsea and vicinity at the present time in the proposed widening and deepening of Mill Creek drain from the Lima township line to the railroad west of town. Question had arisen as to whether Chelsea would be permitted to empty sewage into the drain if the matter was called to the attention of state authorities, and the foregoing quotation alleviates to the extent that the village need not fear for its sewage outlet.

However there is a decided advantage in having the present outlet widened and deepened. In a number of visits to Chelsea Clayton E. Deake, county drain commissioner, has pointed out the folly of permitting the dredging in Lima township to stop at the township line when expenditure of a few thousand dollars additional would extend it past the village and to the railroad west of the Old People's home. Not only would the village have an excellent outlet, but a large quantity of land would be made available for farm purposes.

Present indications are that before the end of this week a petition for the drain extension will be in the hands of local parties and the ten necessary signatures secured.

WARNS THRESHERS

Michigan state department of conservation is calling the attention of threshers to the state law which requires every owner of threshing or other portable steam engine to have efficient spark arrestors on their engines at all times when in use. Officers are required to arrest every person violating the law, and to stop the use of such engine until the law is complied with. The law also provides that no person in charge of such an engine shall deposit live coals or hot ashes from his engine in any place without putting them out or covering them with at least three inches of earth before leaving them.

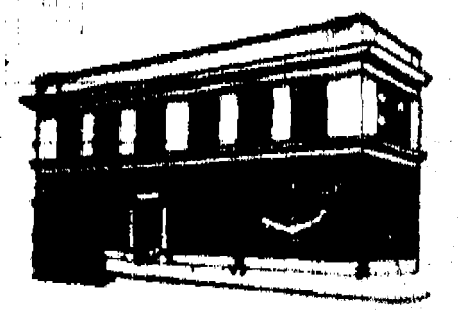

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A COMMON SENSE REPLY
 Recently, a writer on national affairs, sent out a questionnaire to 500 of the leading business men of the United States asking this pertinent question: "What is the chief public need today to increase business prosperity?"
 Among the replies received, was one so filled with old-fashioned philosophy and common sense, that it should be made the keynote of every public and private endeavor, especially in these trying days when we are all vitally concerned in getting the nation back to a safe and sound basis, devoid of violent business depressions and inflations. This business man said:
 "We have passed through a period of violent fluctuations due to readjustments following the war, and have now settled down to a worldwide condition of intense commercial competition. We are in need of such a situation by the practice of economy and efficiency both by the individual and the corporation."
 "The individual should pay for his home before he buys an automobile. His wife and daughters should buy fewer silk and more cotton stockings. These things simply as illustrating what I mean by thrift and economy. Above all we should not mortgage the future in order to buy luxuries. The present day plan of buying largely on credit is most unsound, but it is probable that only an industrial depression will clearly demonstrate this fact."
 "A change in Federal taxation is equally important. Federal income taxes must be reduced to a point where ordinary business investment will be just as attractive as investment in non-tax securities. Death taxes must be either abolished or reduced to a point where they will not force a man to withdraw money from his business and put it into marketable securities at the time of his death. Judgment and powers. No overnight change may be expected as a result of any action the American people may take. We must get down to the fundamental ideas and practice them. The result may be somewhat slow, but it will be absolutely sure."

BRITISH ISOLATIONISTS LOSE
 The new treaty proposed between France and Great Britain to guarantee the peace of Europe, is reported to have been endorsed by the British public. The isolationists who favored keeping aloof from any alliance which might in the future draw Great Britain into war, have lost out. The treaty, it is reported, will be adopted and the way paved for peace in Europe.

Amateur Sales "In Reverse"
 Auctioneers, in which the property is offered at a certain price and lowered by degrees until a bid is forthcoming, were once common and still are in some countries. A few of Henry VIII's time, afterward confirmed by Charles I, prohibited the conducting of auction sales by any person except certain licensed officials known as outcriers.

Editorial

TUESDAY

The price of crude rubber has been boosted sky-high by English men who control the rubber production of the world, and the price of automobiles will go up next month. The manufacturers say the increase will be from ten to fifteen per cent to tire users. Fifteen per cent would yield an increase to English capitalists of about \$152,000,000 a year. On this increase the British government would collect about \$35,000,000 income and other war taxes. The British funding of her debts to America provides for the payment of 3 per cent interest until 1932. This would amount to about \$127,000,000 annually.

Great Britain is to reduce her indebtedness to the United States at the rate of \$25,000,000 annually at present. Interest and debt, then, would be about \$140,000,000 annually collected from British taxpayers who own three-fourths of the world's rubber supply. Very little difference between what the increased cost of tires to American users that will go into the British treasury, and the amount the American government will collect on interest and principal annually from Great Britain.

The British funding plan left the American people paying one and one-half per cent of the interest in the British debt, because of the difference between the interest the British government is to pay us, and the amount the United States government pays on the money borrowed from the American people to lend to England.

MORE RUSSIAN GEMS
 We have another from Russia to the effect that gems belonging to Prince Felix Youssouf have been discovered, and that they are worth some \$5,000,000. Looks like another press agent's story to enable foreigners to unload more of the crown jewels of Russia, on an unsuspecting American public. If all stories are true, there have already been sold to foolish Americans billions of dollars worth of crown jewels of the Romanoffs, more than were ever possessed by the Russian ruling family.

NO SECRET PACTS
 Baron Shidehara, minister of foreign affairs for Japan in an interview with a reporter for the Chicago Tribune declares emphatically and unreservedly that Japan has no secret pact with any country. He denounces specifically, international whispering that Japan has a secret pact with Russia and also with Germany.

TO TALK UNDER THE SEA
 The United States Navy is testing apparatus for communicating with submarines at the bottom of the sea. If the apparatus works, tests indicate it may it will solve the matter of controlling undersea boats from land, or from capital ships equipped with radio. It would add very much materially to the danger of a submarine in case of war, and would make them much more flexible as fighting ships.

FIGHTING THE REDS
 The International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union has declared war on the reds, seeking to bare within labor organizations in this country. Morris Sigman has declared that all soviet and communist propagandists must be barred from this union. Labor in America knows its book. No where in the world has labor ever been as well off as it is in America today. Labor can only prosper as industry and commerce prosper. A system which destroys capital, industry and commerce can not do otherwise than destroy labor.

ELECT WINDOW TO CONGRESS
 John Jacob Rogers, republican congressman from the Fifth Massachusetts district, died in office. A movement was made to elect his widow to serve the balance of the term for which he was elected. In the special election Tuesday, Mrs. Edith Nourse Rogers, the congressman's widow was elected by an overwhelming majority. She will be New England's first congresswoman. Women will come into their own in sharing high public office with the men. It will not be long until New England will have several women members of congress.

Finance Minister Cailleux of France presented a bill providing for an increase in the French bank note circulation of 6,000,000,000 francs, was passed by a large majority last Saturday, when the socialists decided not to vote on the question, after having their proposal for a capital levy defeated in the Chamber. The value of the franc went up instead of down, but a franc is still worth less than an American nickel.

CONTROLLING TRANSPORTATION
 Reports last week end were to the effect that the Yellow Taxicab Business was to be merged with General Motors in another great step toward controlling transportation. As long as Henry Ford lives, or as long as his policies are carried out, controlling the motor car situation will be an exceedingly difficult task for any combination of manufacturers or capitalists.

EMPLOYMENT OF VETERANS
 Washington has sent out statistics to the effect 92,000 veterans are now serving the government in various capacities. An act of Congress requiring that veterans be given preference over all other in filling vacancies in the public service examination to fill government positions. It strikes the casual reader that 92,000 is a small number of veterans on our service payrolls, considering the large number of men who enlisted on were drafted. The men who served in war, are entitled in justice to the positions in peace, which would provide the best pay and opportunities. There ought to be more than 92,000 on the payrolls.

FORD SHIP SAILS
 The first of Henry Ford's ships, to sail for Europe was the Oneda, which sailed Saturday from Hoboken to Antwerp, Bordeaux and Copenhagen. It was loaded with Ford cars, Ford parts, Fordson tractors and parts. It is the first of Ford's newly acquired ships to sail. It will establish the manufacturer's line of ships that will carry his products to all parts of the world—and it is predicted Ford will make it pay, without a subsidy.

Protection for Big Game
 Sleeping sickness and malaria fever will perpetuate big game in Africa; the realization has been forced on hunters that they cannot defy microbes when they invade the haunts of the big mammals.

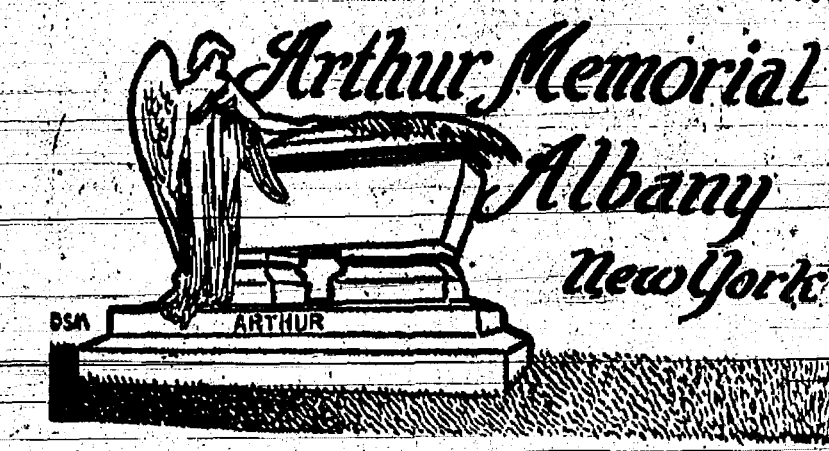

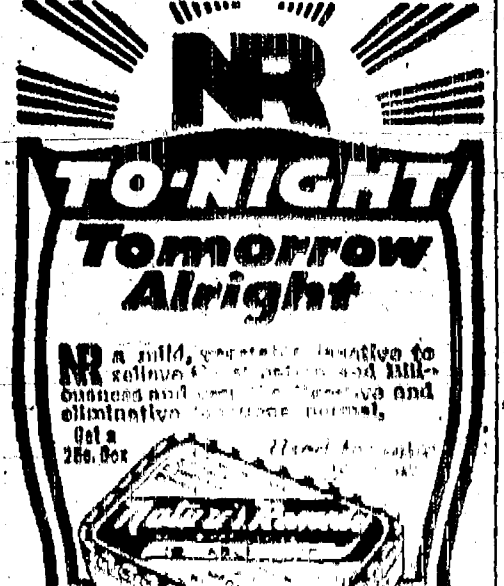
