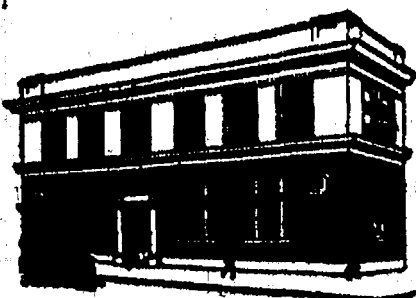

Editorial

WHO PAYS?

The indifference of the American people toward taxes is one of the evils that grow out of our system of collecting taxes.

As it is at present arranged, in many states and communities of America, there are thousands of people who think they pay no taxes. There are people everywhere who think they are contributing nothing through the tax collector's office for the sustenance and maintenance of their government; local state and national.

As a matter of fact every man who produces anything contributes something to the payment of taxes. Every man who consumes anything contributes something to taxes of all kinds. There are very few of our people who do not consume or produce. There are very few, then, who do not contribute to the payment of taxes.

Every time you buy an automobile you pay something to the government for the privilege of buying that car. Your tax contribution does not stop there. Taking Henry Ford, for an example. It is a toss-up, who pays the most income tax to the Federal Government—Henry Ford and his business enterprises, or the Rockefeller and their enterprises. We will say that Ford pays \$15,000,000 a year in income taxes. Where does that fifteen millions come from? It comes from those who buy and use his cars, of course. The Rockefellers pay fifteen millions income taxes. Where do they get it? From the consumer of the oil and gasoline, as a matter of course.

The consumers pay the price for these commodities, and the price produces a profit for the automobile manufacturer, and out of these profits comes the net income, and out of the net income comes the income tax. It comes directly from your pocket, Mr. Automobile Buyer and Mr. Gasoline Consumer.

These two examples are cited not for the purpose of directing attention especially to those two citizens and their wealth, but to show how simple is the statement that the producer and consumer pay all the taxes.

You may not own a dollar's worth of property, and yet you may pay considerably more in indirect taxes than the man who owns very considerable property.

It is therefore important to you, and to every producer and consumer in the land, to watch the growth of taxes—to do what you can to see that efficient men are in public offices, and that your government, municipal, state and national, is managed by the best brains you can employ to do it.

It is your duty to yourself to go to the polls, after making a study of political conditions, and of the men offered for office and make your selection just as you would make a selection for a man to work for you at a given task for which you needed to employ a man or men.

This year you will elect assemblymen, state senators, a governor and other state officers, also congressmen and senators. What are you doing by way of giving the situation attention, and scrutinizing the men to see if they are of the right material? Are you doing your duty to yourself, to your family and to your country?

Are you indifferent to the manner in which settlement of foreign debts are made? Are you willing that debts be cancelled and further tax burdens thrown upon you? Are you willing that your country should enter into a hostile World Court where a demand might and could be made upon you to take the burden of the debts of other nations upon your national shoulders and increase the amount you pay every year, directly or indirectly to the government, to pay debts you do not owe, and that you never should be made to pay?

Think it over. Go to the bottom of all taxes, and you will readily understand that you are indirectly contributing largely and liberally to every tax collector in the nation.

It were high time we were thinking of these things in terms of our own pocketbooks. That is where the rub is coming now, and where the burden will fall more heavily, unless we change our national trend to be the international good angel of the world.

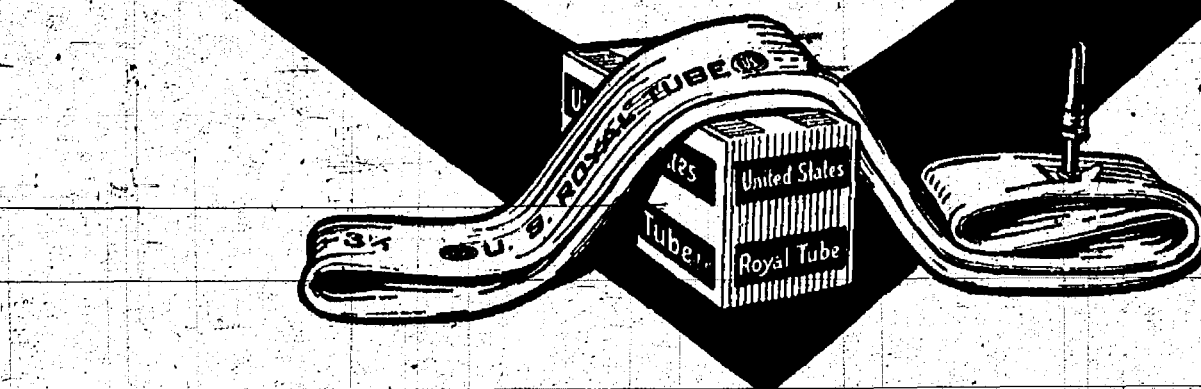

BREVITIES.

STOCKBRIDGE—The annual reunion of the Sharp family will be held at Joslin Lake on Saturday, August 21.

DEXTER—The business men of this village have agreed to close their places of business Thursday afternoon and evening, September 2. This is done so the merchants and their families can attend the county fair.

STOCKBRIDGE—Just the other side of the county line, on the hill east of Ed Farmer's, in Livingston county, several men in uniform are stationed to enforce the corn borer quarantine. These officers have been there since Monday and will remain there for several weeks.—Brief-Sun.

MANCHESTER—Domestic science will be taught in the Manchester high school. A teacher has been secured and provisions for installing equipment will be made at once. A new boiler will be installed to take the place of the cracked one of the heating plant.—Enterprise.

PINKNEY—A Colon man who has a private fishing preserve claims to have so tamed the blue gills there so that they will eat out of his hand. Now we don't want to brag, but Barney Lynch claims to have tamed two bull heads in the Pinkney Mill Pond so they will come to him when he whistles. He has named them Joe and Pete.—Dispatch.

BRIGHTON—William Rouston of Genoa and Ernest J. Hall of Howell made a record catch of fish from Pardee lake in Genoa Monday. They caught three pike and three black bass, the total weight of which was almost fifty pounds. The pike weighed 12, 11, and 7 pounds respectively. There was one six-pound bass and two that weighed four and one-half pounds each. That's pretty good for one day.—Argus.

CHARLOTTE—John H. Jeffries, 311 Kalamazoo street, Battle Creek, has a family ticket for the Eaton county fair issued by the Society in 1866. The ticket was issued to his father, A. J. Jeffries. Mayor Benedict was in the Jeffries neighborhood the other day when he heard of the souvenir and at the mayor's suggestion, Secretary John A. May is sending the son a complimentary ticket to the 1926 fair.—Republican.

BROOKLYN—The corn borer quarantine is being more firmly established in this locality as the crop of corn is maturing. Cars are being stopped on the main roads between Brooklyn and Jackson to ask aid in keeping sweet corn from passing the line. The borer has been found in a few places in this township. Edwin Hoeg who took a trip into infested eastern districts last year was called to inspect May Thompson's sweet corn garden a few days ago where he found some of the worms.—Exponent.

MANCHESTER—The attendance at Chautauque averaged better this year. Although the programs averaged at least as good as heretofore and some were especially pleasing, there came the old hard work to get pledges for tickets for another year. The deficit this year was about \$50, which made it \$1.00 each for the guarantors. The list of guarantors for next year contains 75 names, which were secured without much trouble. With business as good as this it is figured there will be nothing for the guarantors to pay.—Enterprise.

SALINE—A movement is on foot to purchase a chemist engine for use by the village and the territory surrounding. The village will pay a certain proportion of the cost and the balance is being raised among the farmers who will be benefited. As we go to press about half of the required subscriptions have been received. This is one of the most laudable enterprises ever put before the people concerned, and is being successfully put over in great many of the villages of the state. Scarcely a week passes but what we read in some of our exchanges where this is being done, and where it has been called upon to fight a fire in the country we notice the machine accomplishes all that is expected of it.—Observer.

HOWELL—C. O. Larrabee of the U. S. department of agriculture, opened headquarters in the old Hal Erwin training stable on Sibley St. Monday morning, in charge of the quarantine enforcement against the European Corn Borer in Michigan. Quite a force of students from M. S. C. are employed for this work during the summer vacation, and others who have been employed reported for duty Monday, and were assigned to their positions. Corn borer has been found in roasting ears on Detroit market, and it is proposed to see that no more gets through. Men under Mr. Larrabee's direction will patrol all the direct highways, and state police will supplement this force. While the government proposes to be very drastic in all cases necessary, the policy is to co-operate with the farmers who really are most interested, for the common good of all. In every case necessary, arrests will be made of everyone who violates the quarantine regulations.—Republican.

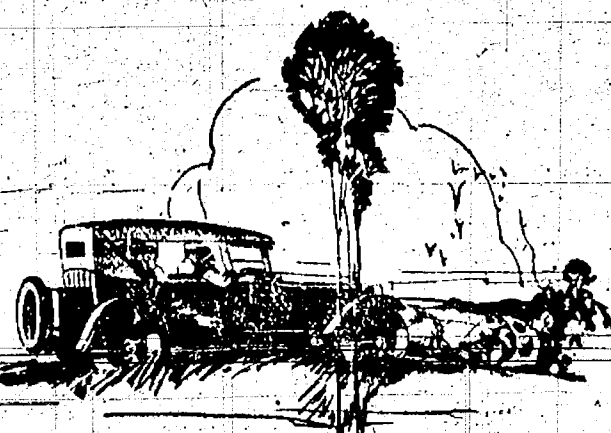

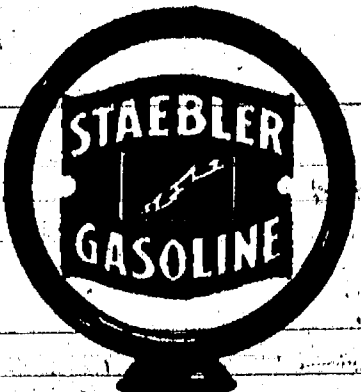
