MRS. EHLERT NOTTEN MEETS INSTANT DEATH AT CROSSING

Obstructed View at Notten Road Crossing, Five Miles West of Chelsea, Believed Cause of Fatality.

Failure to see an approaching fast train which bore down from the west, is believed to have caused the death of Mrs. E. N. Notten, Chelsea, who was instantly killed when the train crashed into a car driven by her at the Notten road crossing five miles west of Chelsea about 6:30 Saturday evening. News of the tragic ending of this well known woman caused a distinct shock to be felt in the community at large, where suddenness of the catastrophe left friends and acquaintances in a stunned state of mind.

Mrs. Notten had been spending the afternoon at her farm adjacent to the railroad crossing where the accident happened, and left for home ahead of her husband, who also was at the farm. Mr. Notten intended following soon after in another car. Fred Notten, whose home is on the opposite side of the tracks, saw the car approach the crossing, not knowing who its occupant. The car stopped before being driven on the tracks, and apparently approach of the train was not noted because of high banks which cut off the view in either direction. Mrs. Notten then proceeded across the crossing, according to the eyewitness, and was within a few feet of clearing the trucks when the flyer from the west struck the rear half of the car carrying it and its occupant for approximately 100 feet and throwing it through a wire fence at the side of the tracks. The train was brought to a stop and train men assisted in extricating the body of the dead woman from the wreckage. The remains were brought to Chelsea on the train.

Justice of the Peace E. J. Steiner, who was called to the scene as acting coroner, decided an inquest was unnecessary.

Mrs. Notten was a daughter of Judson and Helen Freeman, and was born in Columbia, Jackson county, June 20, 1872. She was united in marriage to Ehlert Notten April 2, 1908, and for several years they resided on the farm near Notten Road, moving to Chelsea where they have resided for seven years.

Mrs. Notten was a member of the O. E. S., the Rebekahs, W. R. C., Francisco Cleaners, Cavanaugh Ladies' Grange, and Ladies' Aid Society of Salem St. E. church.

Surviving are the husband, her mother, Mrs. Helen Freeman of Chelsea, and one brother, Carlton Freeman of Kalamazoo.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:00 at the Congregational church, Rev. A. E. Potts officiating, assisted by Rev. Fred Ross, of Salem St. E. church. Burial was in Oak Grove cemetery.

TECUMSEH K. OF P. WILL HOLD COMMUNITY PICNIC AUG. 11

CODLING MOTH SPRAY. SAID DIE THIS WEEK

Fruit men of the southern counties of the state are being advised to spray their apple trees on or before August 6, for the control of the codling moth.

Observation cages, maintained throughout the state by the Michigan State College entomology department, have shown emergence of the adult of the moth during the past few days.

"The larvae of the second generation are due to commence entering the fruit about August 6," says Professor H. H. Pettit, head entomologist at M. S. C. "The department therefore recommends that the final arsenical spray be applied to standard winter varieties on or before August 6."

Use three pounds of arsenate of lead and two and one-half gallons liquid lime-sulphur to 100 gallons of water. The spray dates given apply to counties south of and including Ottawa, Kent, Clinton, Shiawassee, Genesee, Oakland and Macomb. Dates will be given out as determined for northern counties.

STATE POLICE TO AID BUS AND TRUCK LAWS

Twelve state police officers will be detailed at once to aid the public utilities commission to enforce the laws relative to the operation of motor busses and common carrier trucks, it was announced Tuesday by Oscar G. Olander, commissioner of public safety.

According to Carl J. Sheill, secretary of the utilities commission, violations have become so numerous the utility force of inspectors is unable to cope with the situation. The most frequent violations are disregard of village and city ordinances, excessive speed, failure to stop at railroad crossings and contempt for road courtesies.

ATTEMPTS TO SAVE WIFE

Lester W. Scott, 53, Detroit, was drowned at 12:30 Saturday afternoon at Edison Belleville pond near the Washtenaw-Wayne county line in Augusta township while attempting the rescue of his wife.

Mrs. Scott, and five of her eight children were fishing from a raft which tilted, throwing the group into the water, sheriff's officers report. The children clung to the side of the raft but Mrs. Scott was thrown clear of it. The husband, who witnessed the accident from the bank went to her rescue but disappeared in deep water, while the son, Eugene, one of the party on the raft, assisted by Morell Pi-dett, Detroit, saved the mother.

The body of the drowned man was recovered at 4:30 in the afternoon. Mrs. Scott was taken to Roger Memorial hospital, Ypsilanti, where she remained Sunday. Dr. E. C. Ganzhorn, coroner, was called to the scene.

MENACE OF NOTTEN CROSSING SHOULD BE ELIMINATED

The fatal accident of Saturday evening when Mrs. Ehlert Notten met death at Notten Road crossing, five miles west of Chelsea, brings to mind several accidents, fatal or nearly so, which have occurred at this particular crossing, one of the worst in this section of the country, because of lack of vision either direction from either side of the tracks. In addition to its danger, there is no warning bell by which motorists may be guided, and for the most part, people who frequently use the crossing may count themselves fortunate that they have not been caught in the same manner as was Mrs. Notten. If it is impossible to cut down the embankment at the side of the road and track, there at least should be some contrivance erected which would give motorists some slight warning of approaching danger before they drive into it.

TRAINS FAIL TO WHISTLE FOR SOME ROAD CROSSINGS

That both freight and passenger train engineers on the Michigan Central fail to blow the whistle at some of the railroad crossings was confirmed Tuesday of this week when a representative of the railroad and others visited the scene of Saturday evening's fatal accident at Notten road crossing, five miles west of Chelsea. While at the crossing two freights and one passenger train passed and all of them failed to sound their whistles, according to those present. This, in a measure, confirms statements by witnesses that the train which struck and killed Mrs. Notten did not whistle for the crossing and may perhaps have been partially responsible for her failure to note its approach.

CHELSEA BOY HURT WHEN EARTH CAVES IN ON HIM

Los Walsh, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Walsh, of Chelsea, suffered painful injuries while laying an underground cable at Pontiac Friday, when the ground caved in upon him, breaking both legs and injuring his back. He is in a Pontiac hospital. Mrs. John Walsh and Mrs. Anna Dvorak, mother and sister of the injured man, were in Pontiac Sunday to see him.

PUBLIC INVITED TO PRACTICE TRAP SHOOTING AT YPSILANTI

An invitation has been received locally for anyone who is interested in trap shooting to attend some of the shoots of the Ypsilanti Gun club. Practice shoots which are public, are scheduled for August 3, 7, 14, 17, 24, 28 and 31. The club is located about two miles west of Ypsilanti, on East Michigan avenue, at Lay's crossing, north side of the road. Everybody is welcome.

SEITZ FAMILY REUNION

The 7th annual meeting of the Seitz families was held Sunday, July 31, at Recreation Park, Ypsilanti, with about 100 members present from Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti, Saline, Detroit, Chelsea and California.

A picnic dinner was served at noon. The afternoon was spent in visiting and playing of games. Also a fish pond was provided through a collection last year, and was enjoyed by both young and old.

A business meeting was held, at which time Adolph Seitz of Lima was elected president, Mrs. Fred Seitz, secretary, and Mrs. Herman Herzog of Ann Arbor, treasurer, who is to provide for the next year's fish pond. The next meeting is to take place the last Sunday in July, 1928, at the same place.

ESTABLISH PATROLS FOR BORER CONTROL

With the arrival of sweet corn on Michigan markets, particularly shipments from Ohio, road patrols have been established by the State Department of Agriculture on all highways leading out of the corn borer area to regions where the pest has not yet been found. The aim is to prevent roasting ears from infested localities entering borer-free territory and possibly causing new infestations of the pest.

State and federal quarantines prohibit the shipment of all corn on the cob outside of the quarantined area, according to Herbert B. Powell, state commissioner of agriculture, and embargoes have been placed on such shipments by transportation companies.

Tourists, hucksters, and other human agencies, however, have been found to constitute a real menace to control of the borer, says, by not complying with quarantine regulations.

Because sweet corn matures earlier than field corn, the corn borer seems to prefer it. For this reason, roasting ears are very likely to contain living borers. If the unrestricted movement of sweet corn spread to all parts of the United States, Commissioner Powell says.

Large signs have been erected at patrol points to caution people against carrying sweet corn outside of the borer area. Automobiles and conveyances, upon approaching a quarantine line, will be required to come to a full stop. The inspectors will be questioned by the patrols and any corn on the cob which is found, will be confiscated. At night, torches and flares will serve as a signal to motorists that they are approaching a patrol.

The importance of road patrol work is stressed by corn borer officials. In Ohio and Michigan during 1926, 7,546 dozen ears of corn were taken from automobiles. Corn containing living corn borers was confiscated from tourists bound for Florida, Missouri, and Iowa. The intervention of this corn undoubtedly prevented the introduction of the European pest into these states, Commissioner Powell asserts.

THE CODE OF THE FRONTIER

During the period when the lumber companies were taking their terrific toll from the forests of Michigan, another sinister force was at work, a force to which present profits meant everything and future dependency, nothing. These were the interests of the great fur companies who established buying stations throughout the north country. Through these agencies the citizens of the frontier found an easier method of living than that offered by tilling the ground. Many of those who moved into the forest country first sold the timber stumpage on their farms to some lumber company and then depended on their traps and rifles to provide a living for them during the succeeding years. Fur-bearing animals were trapped at almost any season of the year. Deer were killed in season or out, their flesh was eaten and the hides sold. Ducklings and partridge chicks were killed as soon as they would make a good fry. Fish were caught by the wagon loads and sold to the chickens. Hunters from the east invaded the state by thousands and moose, deer, bear, and other large game were slaughtered in great numbers. Few hunters went back without their full quota of big game, because if they could not get it themselves the local woodsmen could get it for them. The code of the frontier was to kill all the game you wanted because there was plenty of it. Now the day of reckoning is at hand. We of today are paying for this lack of vision just as those who follow after us will be made to pay if we lack vision now, in the preservation of fish, game and wild life that we now have. Help the Michigan Department of Conservation in the great work of reforestation that is now under way. Leave to your children the heritage of natural resources that so rightfully will belong to them.

CONTENT BLINDS US ALL

When one is born into this world naked, with no place provided in advance for shelter and no provision made for food, such person, if he have a grain of intellect, becomes a reformer. He questions the right of the more fortunate to be born to downy cradles or frescoed ceilings. He is earnestly bent on an equal distribution of the good things of the more fortunate or the better born.

On the other hand, he who is born rich or attains to riches soon learns that all the gorgeous creatures in their fine houses and automobiles, silks and laces, diamonds and furs, are chasing in the same race with himself after the unattainable. The real aristocracy, like the foot of the rainbow, vanishes as he approaches.

GIRLS WITH BRAINS

According to statistics compiled by women's colleges in England, brains are now rare in the marriage market. Waiving the point that brains may be handicapped in competition with superficial beauty, it is fair comment to remark that brains and hearts are separate and distinct and often are unrelated. FORESTS

One of the Eastern United States is a community forest. It has been adopted from Europe. In the towns own forests they are used as playgrounds and which through careful management provide raw material perpetually for small mills nearby. In one city in Germany the citizens went tax free for many years because the forest paid the tax for them. In Massachusetts the community forest idea is being worked out successfully, and Fitchburg, the first city in the United States to establish a true city forest, is a splendid example of what may be accomplished. This forest has been carefully managed over a period of years. It paid expenses soon after it was established. It now turns in a profit that will grow in the years to come.

In Michigan the development of municipal forests should be a comparatively simple proposition. Seedlings of native trees could be produced in great numbers once a market was created for them. In addition to being valuable as woodlots, or plots from which timber could be sold, they would also become parks and public playgrounds or would help to attract tourists. The community forest idea should be given serious thought as in this way it would be possible to reforest thousands of acres.

OUR DEPENDENCE ON SCIENCE

Reverting to the question of the teaching of science in our colleges, it may be well to emphasize our dependence on scientific methods, and to recall the other fact that union labor has been one of the most positive forces against the introduction of scientific methods in industry and the use and utilization of labor-saving devices. The inventions of our American citizens have revolutionized industry throughout the world and finance has become the handmaiden of invention. Without an intelligent appreciation on the part of those who control money, our inventions would be nothing more than pieces of marked paper or models in the patent office at Washington. But farseeing Americans have understood what the development of these labor-saving devices meant and they have backed the brain work of the inventors with the hard cash of capital—which is nothing more than the savings of a people. Thus industry in its present development is the result of the genius of our people and the courage of our capitalists. Yet we know that capitalism is divided, and inventions are opposed because of the short-sightedness of union labor leaders who see their power slipping from them through the genius of others. These are things that are worth remembering when capitalism is on trial and when reaction by labor leaders is promoted through the instrumentality of self-serving politicians.

QUICK THINKING

If every human being could be in full possession of all the faculties that control self-preservation, there would be no safety problem. But civilization has numbered those faculties. And that will be the only method of establishing safety where highways and railroads cross.

Now if the newspaper men can get the druggists and the lawyers to see that the government stops printing envelopes at less than cost, we shall be happy.

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BRITAIN ENVIROUS OF AMERICAN TELEPHONES

The telephone service in Great Britain has failed to satisfy some of the more progressive Britishers, judging from the frequent complaints in English newspapers and the fact that a private organization has been actively agitating for a more widespread use of the telephone. The Manchester "Daily Dispatch" recently estimated that "the total number of stations in the Post Office system is roughly 1,500,000." That is, that in the whole of Great Britain there are fewer telephones than in New York State, which has two and a half million.

The "Dispatch" might have added that telephones in farmhouses are almost unknown, outside of Canada and the United States.

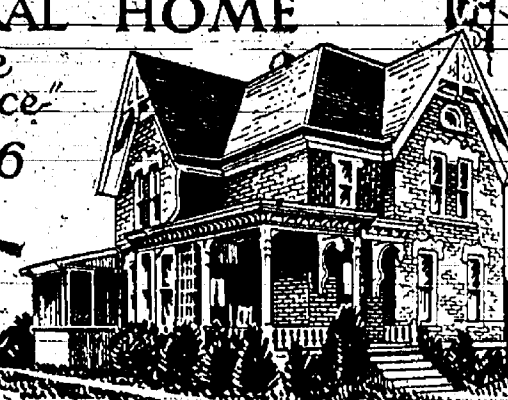

TESTING ENTIRE HERD
PAYS GREATER PROFIT

Hundreds of Michigan dairymen saw the results that may be obtained in building up a dairy herd by means of a program of testing cows for production and rigorously weeding out low producing individuals, at the four Dairy-Day meetings held recently, according to the dairy department at Michigan State College.

Large groups of dairymen at Pontiac, Kalamazoo, Ionia, and Traverse City were told by Professor O. E. Reed that every cow in the herd should be tested and that the test records must be used as a basis for selecting breeding animals, if the dairymen are to secure a maximum profit.

Crow's Peculiarities

So far as scientists have been able to ascertain there is only one counter-fitter in the animal kingdom. This is the English-cuckoo. It was so classified because it lays eggs, cleverly disguised, in other birds' nests. Although crows are thieves at heart they hold courts in which they try their own criminals. At the close of the court two or more crows fall upon the culprit and punish him—exchange.

Gave Name to Volcanoes

In the mythology of ancient Rome, Vulcan was the god of fire and the forge. He made the armor worn by several of the mythical heroes and gods. Vulcan's seat was fabled to be in Mount Etna, which, therefore, received the name volcano, a name afterward extended to all similar mountains.
