Editorial

HAVING "A GOOD FRONT"

"Run down at the heel"—it speaks
loudly; your character is judged large-
ly by it; your whole fortune may be
dependent upon it; so, young man,
young woman, start in right, and
never be "run down at the heel."
All of us owe it to ourselves, our
families and our friends to dress well.
This is not an advertisement for the
clothing merchant, or any other mer-
chant; it is a plea for better dress and
for what it means. Better dress does
not mean that we shall "flower out"
in a brand new suit every time that
fashion decrees a change; we can dress
well by dressing neatly and not fad-
ishly, and we can dress well without
expensive clothing. We can be neat
in appearance without a new suit; we
can be clean; our shoes can be clean,
and not run down at the heel—and our
hat can reflect good taste.
"The first thing I notice about a wo-
man is her hat and then I look at her
shoes," is the observation of a Chelsea
man, who dresses well, but not ex-
pensively, and whose wife dresses
well, but not expensively.
"A good front" gets one by; it car-
ries an introduction by itself; it in-
spires confidence; it brings business;
it is an ambassador of commercial
progress; it is vital to a young man
or a young woman; it is vital to the
middle aged; it is decidedly pleasing
in people of old age. We—all of us—
like to meet folks with "a good
front." We ought to cultivate the
habit of always having "a good front."
"A good front" will put a man or
a woman to the front in a commu-
nity, and "a good front" is never
"down at the heel." "A good front"
is slang for being well dressed.

THE MIGRATORY INSTINCT

That ancient and "world-wide" son
god, one of whose names survives for
the comfort of makers of cross-word
puzzles, has had another honor from
modern science. The sun is respon-
sible, it appears, for that mystery
which has kept so many scientists
awake at night, the mystery of mi-
grating birds. To follow the swallow
is not difficult, but what does the
swallow follow?
What man calls weather is no key
to the secret, for the migrations pro-
ceed relatively undisturbed in "cold
winters as in warm." The true key
lies in the number of hours of sunlight
in the day, in the opinion of at least
one naturalist.
The length of the day is a constant
astronomical phenomenon quite un-
related to weather variations or to other
accidental differences between years.
And for experimental purposes man
can lengthen or shorten the day un-
reasonably within a limited space.
This has been done through artificial

lighting and has proved quite con-
clusively that the variation in the length
of the day controls the migratory im-
pulse. This impulse may come from
glands which have been observed to
enlarge or shrink under some stimulus
imparted by the hours of light.
Many laymen are not interested in
a scientific reason why birds go South
in winter and North in summer, but
even they detect an interesting con-
nection between mankind and the
gland and light theory. That the sea-
sons affect man's feelings is a com-
monplace with poets, if not with sci-
entists. "Is it improbably that some ob-
scure stimulus of the lengthening days
of spring is behind the wanderlust?
Is there any connection between mod-
ern illumination and the fact that
many, who formerly felt the lust for
wandering only in the spring, now
must resist it the whole year through
if they cannot afford to submit to it?"

ENTHUSIASM

Personality, good clothes, polished
shoes, good looks and the gift of gab
are undoubtedly aids in salesmanship,
but none of them holds a candle to
enthusiasm. He who lacks the others
may still sell goods, but no one ever
made good as a salesman who lacks
enthusiasm.
For enthusiasm is the sort of thing
that makes you believe the costly cash
register you sell is the prime requisite
of business, that the automobile for
which you are the agent is the best at
any price, that your store offers the
best quality at the lowest price and
that the town you are trying to sell
to others is the best in the world.
It is the enthusiasm of the lawyer
that convinces his client and his
cause are always right. It is the en-
thusiasm of the doctor that makes his
diagnosis accurate and his treatment
effective. It is the enthusiasm of the
insurance man that persuades him he
is doing a service to all he explains

OUTLINE CORN BORER

1928 CLEAN-UP AREA

The 1928 European Corn borer clean-up area covers 32 entire counties and portions of five others, according to the quarantine recently promulgated by Herbert E. Powell, State Commissioner of Agriculture.

Comprising this territory are the entire counties of Alcona, Alpena, Arenac, Bay, Barry, Branch, Calhoun, Clinton, Eaton, Genesee, Hillsdale, Huron, Ingham, Isosco, Jackson, Lapeer, Lenawee, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Montgomery, Oakland, Ogemaw, Osceola, Presque Isle, Saginaw, Shiawassee, St. Clair, Tuscola, Wayne and Washtenaw.

Selected townships in Cheboygan, Gladwin, Kalamazoo, Midland and St. Joseph counties are also included in the clean-up area.

According to the regulations drawn up by Commissioner Powell, all corn stalks and corn stubble in farm and condition to harbor living corn borers must be disposed of within this area prior to May 1. Coarse-stemmed weeds in corn fields must also be destroyed while corn stubble not over two inches in height in clean corn fields are exempted.

Whether or not farmers will be paid this year for their extra labor incident to the clean-up depends upon the action taken by Congress. Commissioner Powell says. An act to provide such payments has recently been introduced in the House of Representatives.
