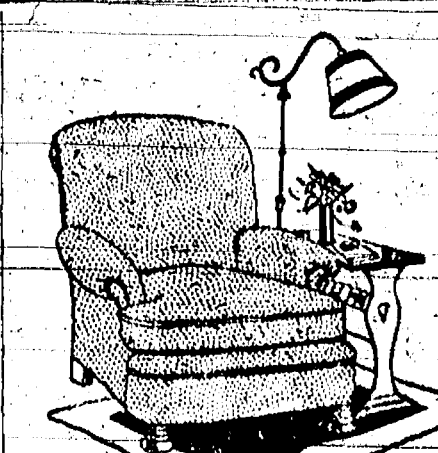

PAYS GRANGE TRIBUTE

At a meeting of the National Grange recently held in Washington, D. C., President Calvin Coolidge made an address in which he paid the organization the following deserved tribute:

"While other organizations were committing their life and their reputation to the promotion of panaceas for the relief of all the ills of the farm, some rejected, and some proven a delusion, the Grange has continued to hold a sound position and conservative position and to grow steadily in influence and in the public estimation. It has been an inspiring example to the other successful farm organizations now in existence. The Grange has steadily given its support to the movement for better roads and better schools to developing agricultural colleges and experiment stations and to the general improvement of life in the farm home. It is entitled to great credit for the vast improvements which the last 50 years have witnessed."

BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS

Governor Fred W. Green has issued a proclamation in which he urges the people of Michigan to purchase Christmas seals.

"For many years it has been an annual custom of the Michigan Tuberculosis association to place on sale Christmas seals. Again this year the people of Michigan will be asked to buy these seals. With the funds realized, the work of the association and its affiliated branches will be carried on."

"In view of the fact that there are thousands of cases of active tuberculosis in Michigan, and any amelioration of their affliction is in the common interests of humanity, I am sure there is continued deep sympathy with the work of the state tuberculosis association and the many sanitariums throughout the state."

"To the end that this activity may be furthered to the greatest extent possible, I earnestly bespeak a generous public support for this Christmas seal sale."

THE FARM OF THE FUTURE

Electricity is solving many farm difficulties. By doing away with slow, expensive and inefficient physical labor it is today bringing about an agricultural revolution similar to the great changes that took place during the period when power was introduced into industry.

A practical experimental farm established in Illinois is a good augury for the future. It is of 80 acres, stocked with cows, hogs and chickens, the three great enthusiasms of those who advocate diversified farming.

All of the cow's needs are supplied cheaply and quickly by power. The hay is pitched by an electric motor, and the water is pumped into automatic drinking cups. Electricity cuts the feed and lifts it into bins. Electric milkers do the arduous milking job and electric refrigerators cool the milk.

Flies are kept away from the cows by an electric killer that attracts them with bait, and when they touch it, it electrocutes them.

The feed for the pigs is likewise electrically prepared and their house is warmed by an electric stove.

Electricity operates the incubator and young chickens are treated with ultraviolet rays to prevent sickness. By use of electric light the hen's working day is lengthened to as much as 15 hours, increasing winter egg production.

The farm house is equipped with almost every known perfected electrical labor saving device.

This farm, established as an experiment, is proving an outstanding practical success. Unless all signs fail, it is a model for the future.

HOLIDAY FIRE PREVENTION

When using a candle in your window, be sure it is an electric one, properly wired, as they are generally safe.

If you have a Christmas tree, set it up securely so it cannot topple over. Don't place it near heating or lighting fixtures.

For trimming the tree, use only non-combustible materials such as metal tinsel, flake asbestos and powered mica for snow effects.

For illuminating the tree, lighted candles should never be used. Properly installed electric lights are safer and give colorful effects, but safest of all is a colored spotlight focused on the tree.

Again it is necessary to caution the smokers to be careful with their cigarettes and matches, to keep them out of reach of small children.

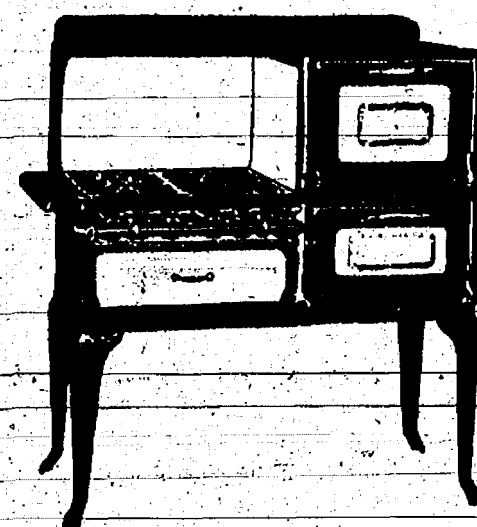

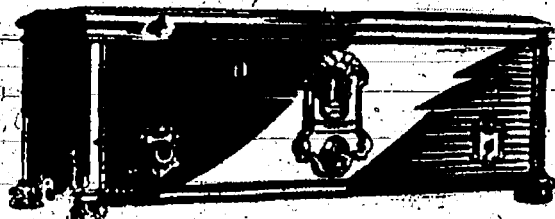

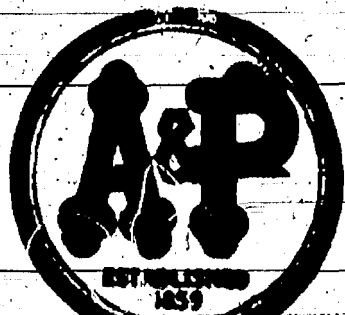

STUDYING DUCK

LIFE IN MICHIGAN

Dr. M. D. Pirnie, ornithologist with the department of conservation, is making a thorough study of wild ducks this fall. He has patrolled several of the favorite haunts of the bird, studying their feeding habits, learning their choice foods, determining characteristics of their migration and daily flights. He spent much of his time in Wild Fowl Bay, an arm of Saginaw Bay, one of the duck population centers of Michigan. He has requested duck hunters to send in the stomachs of ducks that they shoot in order that a study may be made of the food. The ultimate goal toward which the investigation leads is that of providing conditions that will result in more ducks for Michigan game. If these gamesters of the air can be enticed to Michigan, Dr. Pirnie is going to accomplish it.

THE ELECTRIC NATION

The United States has about one-half of the total world capacity of public utility plants; for only three other countries—Germany, Canada and Switzerland—has the output per capita greater than the United States, but much of the Swiss current is exported or used by heavy traction electrifications, while in other countries the paper-making and electrochemical industries consume large quantities.

The United States is far ahead of any other country in the general household use of electricity. In Japan which shows the next largest number of domestic consumers, the situation is quite different from that in Europe and America, for in the far east a consumer may be represented by the installation of a single light.

Conservation Chief Says Hunters Did Not Break Laws

H. M. Agler, assistant chief conservation officer for the department of conservation, believes that the deer hunters in Michigan during the season just closed were not guilty of breaking the laws to any degree. The record accomplished in the district where Agler had direction of the game wardens would indicate this. Last year this particular section yielded 32 does, all-sized from hunters who chose to break Michigan's buck law. Such activity demanded attention. Agler personally took over the direction of the work in that section this season with the result that only one doe and one fawn were seized.

Use of the fire wardens as assistants to game wardens in the deer hunting country has helped greatly, Agler believes. Men who fight the forest fires are required to know every inch of their territory and this knowledge is invaluable in covering the district during the hunting season.

Rapid Growth Noted Number Mich. Fur Farmers Licensed

Approximately 650 fur and game farm licenses have been issued by the department of conservation. The activity in this field has been pronounced during the past few years although its growth has been gradual and this year there has been no undue increase in the number of applications for licenses. It is estimated that half of the total number of permits are for muskrat farms.

The conservation department takes an interest in this fur and game industry. Experts study the conditions surrounding the field and are taking steps to secure information that will

be of assistance to the individuals engaged in the work. For instance, the muskrat, subject, like all other animals, to particular diseases or afflictions. Some 20 species of worms are known to parasitize wild muskrats. The department has secured as much information as possible regarding these parasites and has a circular letter prepared that describes them. It is available to all parties interested. The zoological department of the University of Michigan cooperates with the state in studying the diseases and afflictions of the animals. Specimens of rats that are victims of disease are put under the microscope with a view of learning more about the rat's enemies.

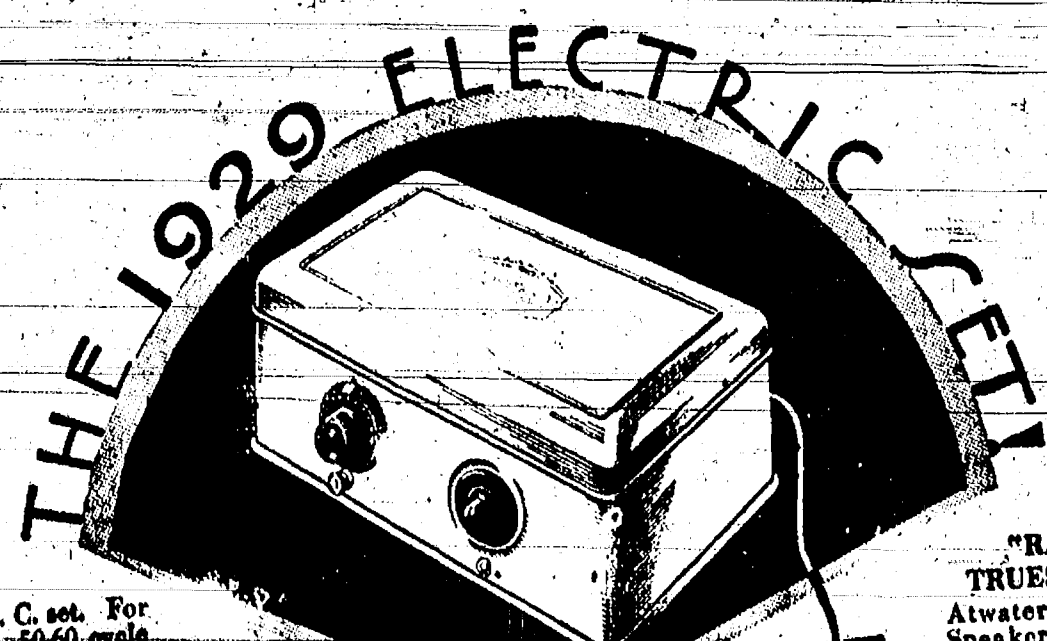

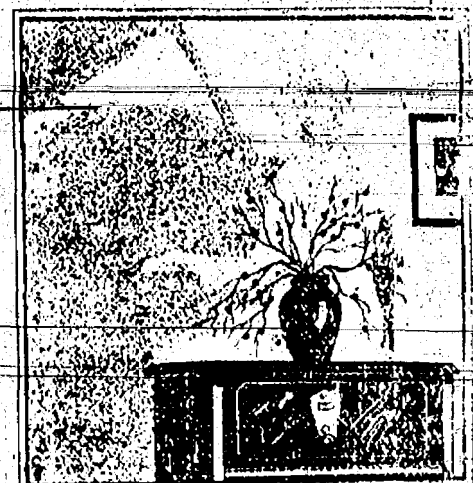

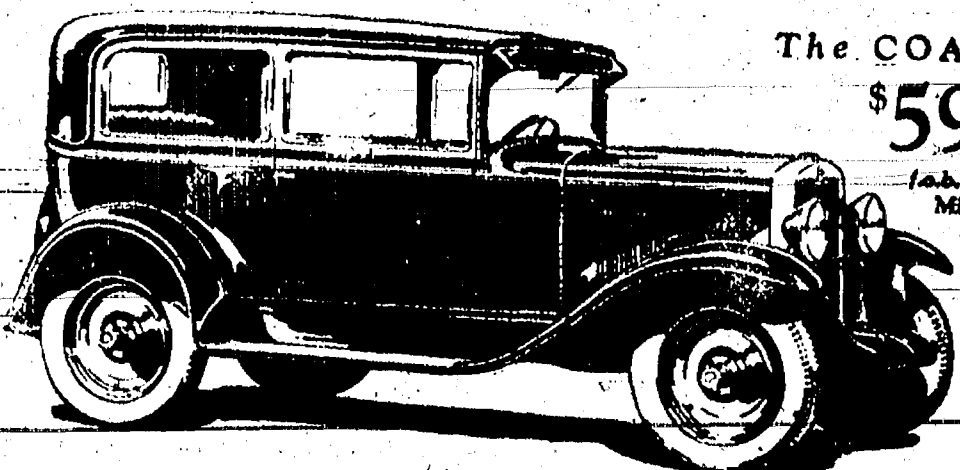

"Put them on the backs, not the fronts of letters," he says. "The use of any other kind of label than a government postage stamp on the address side of envelopes confuses postal employees and delays the mails."

Although sale of the Christmas seals was not begun by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association until Friday of last week, Mr. Hoover reports that many letters handled at the Chelsea postoffice already bear the stamps. The brilliant colors of the 1928 seals are in harmony with the approaching Yule season. Blue, green, and red predominate in the design, which features the "Ship of Health" and the double-barred cross, symbol of the crusade against tuberculosis.

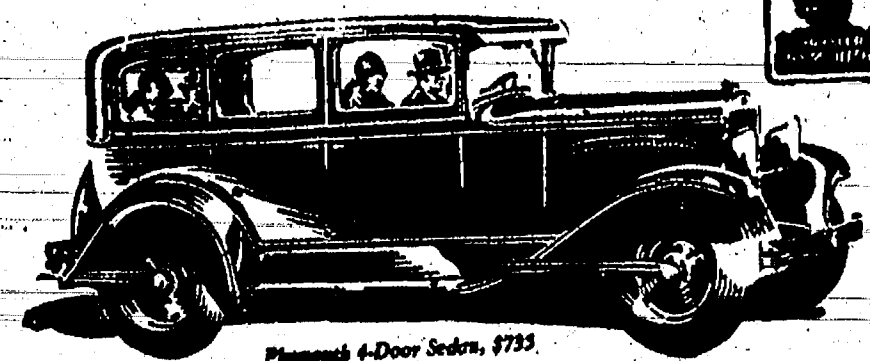

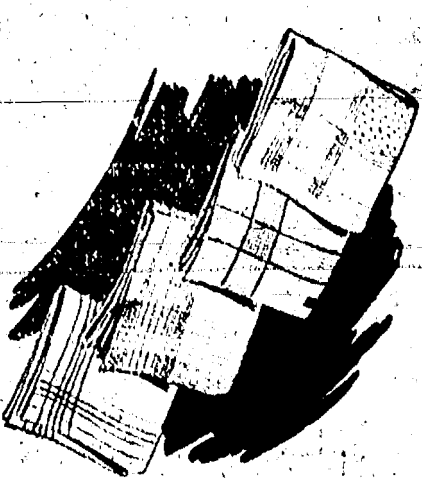

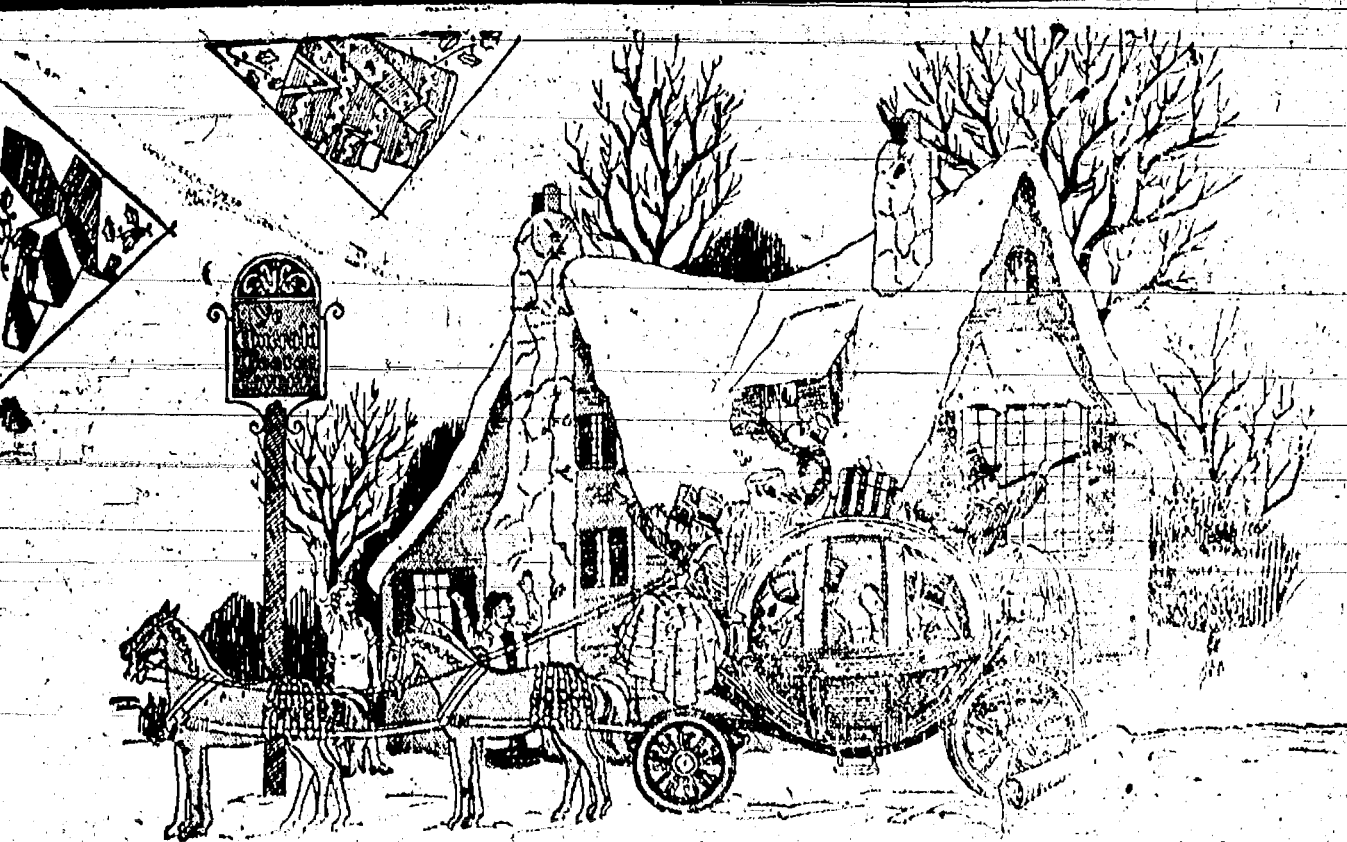

University of Michigan Gifts Total \$395,000

Anonymous Donor Renews \$35,000
Pledges for Near East Expedition.

Gifts received by the University of Michigan and reported to the board of regents during the year 1927-28 are valued in the university's inventory at approximately \$395,000. This estimate is conservative, as the value of numerous items, particularly of books, is not included.

Among the larger items included in the total is the renewed pledge of \$35,000 a year for three years from an anonymous donor, being used in continuation of the Near East research expedition, now working at the site of the ancient Karanis, in Egypt. Another of the larger items is the mycological library, collected and presented by Dr. Howard A. Kelly of Baltimore, valued at \$100,000.

Contributions of Robert P. Lamont of Chicago, to the astronomical work in South Africa were more than \$20,000 during the year. Mr. Lamont has not only furnished the telescope and erected the observatory at Bloemfontein, but has also assured the payment of salaries to the staff and the current expenses.

Another large item covers concessions-in-price of materials and actual gifts amounting to \$50,854 from individuals and firms in connection with the new architecture building.

Gifts of the Detroit alumni, who made possible the acquisition of the site of the new women's dormitory and the bequest of the late Avery Hopwood for the encouragement of student authorship are not included in this year's report.

A total of 67 gifts, ranging in value from \$50 to \$100,000 are listed for the year.

STATE FARMERS GROW RECORD BEAN CROP

Two Eaton county farmers apparently have the "low down" on the proper methods for producing good crops of beans, and one of them, P. A. Smith of Milliken, gives his receipt for record crops.

Mr. Smith had two acres of ground upon which he secured 18 1-2 tons of beans to the acre five years ago. The field was then planted to alfalfa which was left for five years.

Last spring the field was plowed, 500 pounds of 20 per cent acid phosphate was broadcast per acre, and certified Robust beans were sown at the rate of 35 pounds per acre.

From the two acres of ground, Mr. Smith harvested 96 bushels of high quality beans. This production is equal to the average crop on eight acres.

Mr. Smith modestly says that he is just learning the bean growing trade, and that his neighbor, Simon Cramer, really understands the business. Mr. Cramer secured 99 bushels of Robust beans from an acre and one-half of ground, but his methods of production have not been given out.

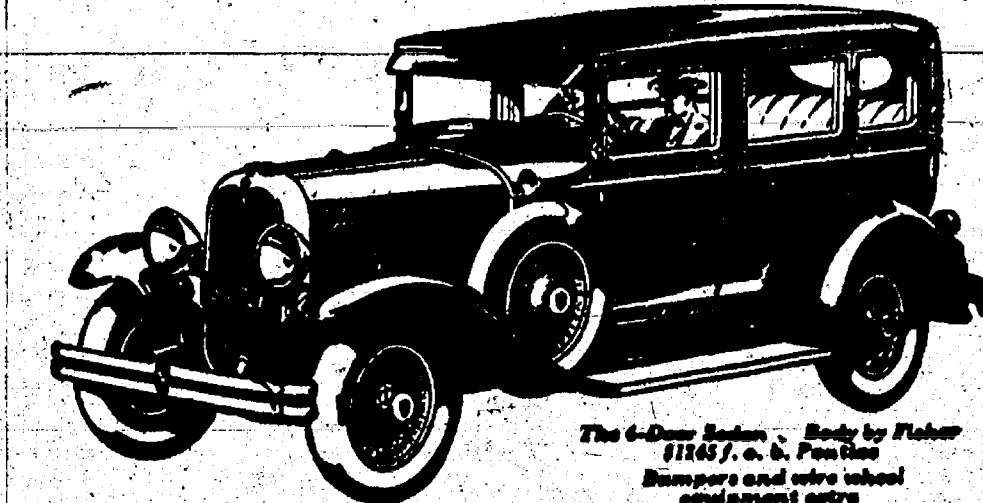

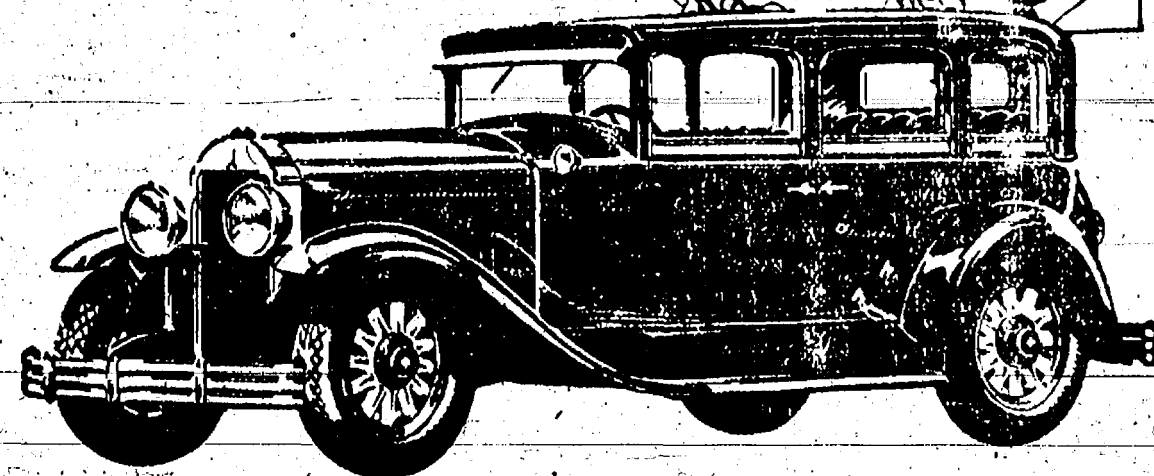
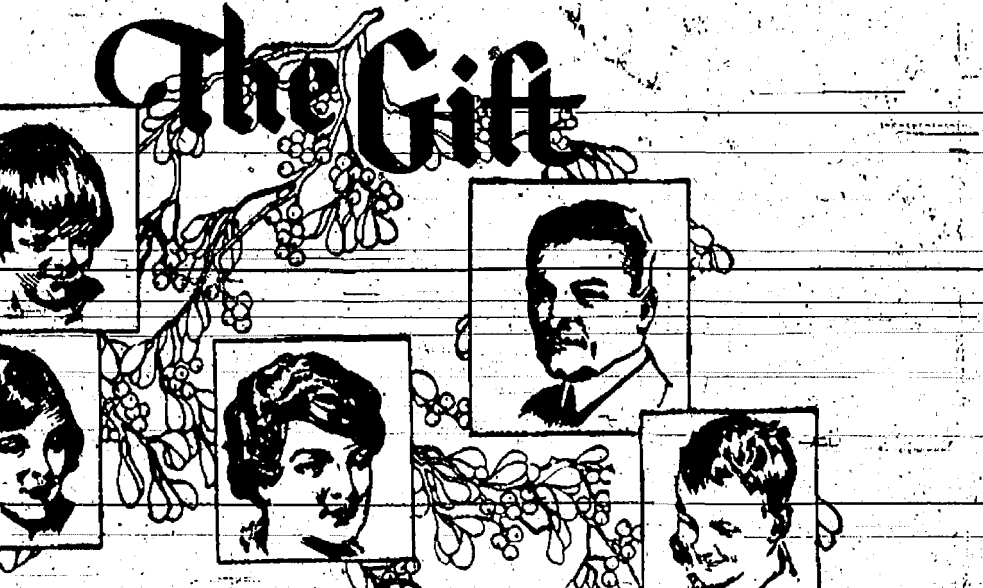

They harvested 701 bushels of beans, by weight, from 23 acres. Thirty seven bushels were kept for seed and the rest of the crop was sold for \$2,929.50.—Press.

Manchester—One thing Manchester has to be thankful for is the pavements on Jackson, Exchange, Place, Railroad, Jefferson and Ann Arbor Streets, with curbing and boulevard lights on four of them. Those streets are beautifully lighted and are the pride of the residents and are praised by strangers visiting here. Brooklyn—A new troupe flag for the Brooklyn Boy Scouts signaled an enthusiastic meeting of the scouts Monday evening. It was a surprise to the boys, who were not expecting its arrival until later. Deputy Scout Commissioner C. F. Stewart and Doris Turk of Jackson were of great assistance and gave the boys good talks. The troop now numbers 22 members and nearly all were present.—Exponent.

Jackson—Detective Inspector L. H. Scott claims to have confessed that they robbed several safes here recently from Theodore H. Maynard and Lawrence B. Maynard, returned last night from Toledo, where they were arrested. In nearly every recent safe robbery the combination was drilled and knocked off with heavy instruments. The police found in the Maynards' automobile an electric drill and a quantity of heavy tools and other equipment which it is believed was used in the robberies here. Several hundred dollars were obtained from cash and lumber yard offices.—Exponent.

Howell—At a recent meeting of the stockholders of the Livingston County fair, held at Howell, the report of the treasurer showed that the society was in a prosperous condition. They paid an indebtedness of \$1,000 this year and still have about \$800 in the treasury.—Exponent.

Saline—Mint machines have been in good demand in some parts of the country of late. Unadilla—B. A. Jackson has been drawn to serve as a juror at the December term of the Livingston county circuit court. Dr. J. A. Jackson took place at Round Lake Sunday, when two young men, one of Redford, the other of Detroit, attempted to cross the lake in a canoe. When well out, the canoe capsized and its occupants while able to keep afloat for a short time, soon became exhausted from cold. Their cries for help fortunately attracted attention and Charles Chase, nephew of Dr. Jackson, a resident at the lake, went to their assistance. His timely rescue saved the boys' lives as they were nearly helpless when taken from the water.—Averus.

REGARDING THE GAS CONSUMER

The American Gas Association has built a large laboratory in Cleveland for the sole purpose of testing the safety and efficiency of gas appliances before they are placed on the market. It is stated that 60 per cent of the burners and water heaters, 60 per cent of the space heaters and 70 per cent of the gas ranges produced now leave the laboratory's seal of approval. In all 11,000 different appliances have been approved and it is expected that before another year has passed that appliances without the approval seal will be conspicuous and difficult to market. This is in line with the general progress that is being made by the gas industry.

MICHIGAN CORN BEST IN TESTS OF YIELDS

Michigan corn varieties outyielded other strains of corn in yield tests conducted in Indiana by the extension division of Purdue University.

Clements White Cap and M. A. C. Yellow Dent, two corn varieties developed in Michigan, stood first and second in production of shelled corn when tested in Huntington county with eight other varieties commonly grown in Indiana. Clements—White Cap yielded 59.4 bushels and M. A. C. Yellow Dent 54.03 bushels.

The same two varieties stood second and fourth in a similar test conducted on another farm in the same county, and the variety which stood first produced only four-tenths of a bushel more per acre than Clements White Cap. The yields in the second test were higher; the leading variety produced 63.3 bushels per acre.

The Michigan corn is listed as early, ninety-day varieties in Indiana, but both sorts fail to ripen in ninety days in Michigan. These varieties are recommended for use in central and southern Michigan counties by the farm crops department at Michigan State College.

Clements White Cap was developed by Paul Clement, Britton, and M. A. C. Yellow Dent is a variety originated by plant breeders at Michigan State College.

THE NEW PONTIAC

Preparations for the building of the first Pontiac sixes for 1929 were under way this week at the plants of the Oakland Motor Car Company with the completion of inventory-taking and the soaring of employment figures to the highest December level in history, according to W. R. Tracy, vice president in charge of sales.

By the middle of the month, it is expected that cars will be on their way to distant points so that dealers may have in hand display models when details of the line are made public around the first of the year, Mr. Tracy stated.

Promised as a "bigger, smarter, more powerful and more luxurious Pontiac bringing big car features within the range of the small six," this newest creation of the fast-growing Oakland division of General Motors has given rise to many rumors and much speculation here because of the phenomenal volume growth of the Pontiac six.

Introduced on the market for the first time at the New York Automobile Show in 1926, the car in less than three years has topped all former sales records for a new make of car, and during the height of the past selling season out-sold every other make of six cylinder car in the domestic market for several months.

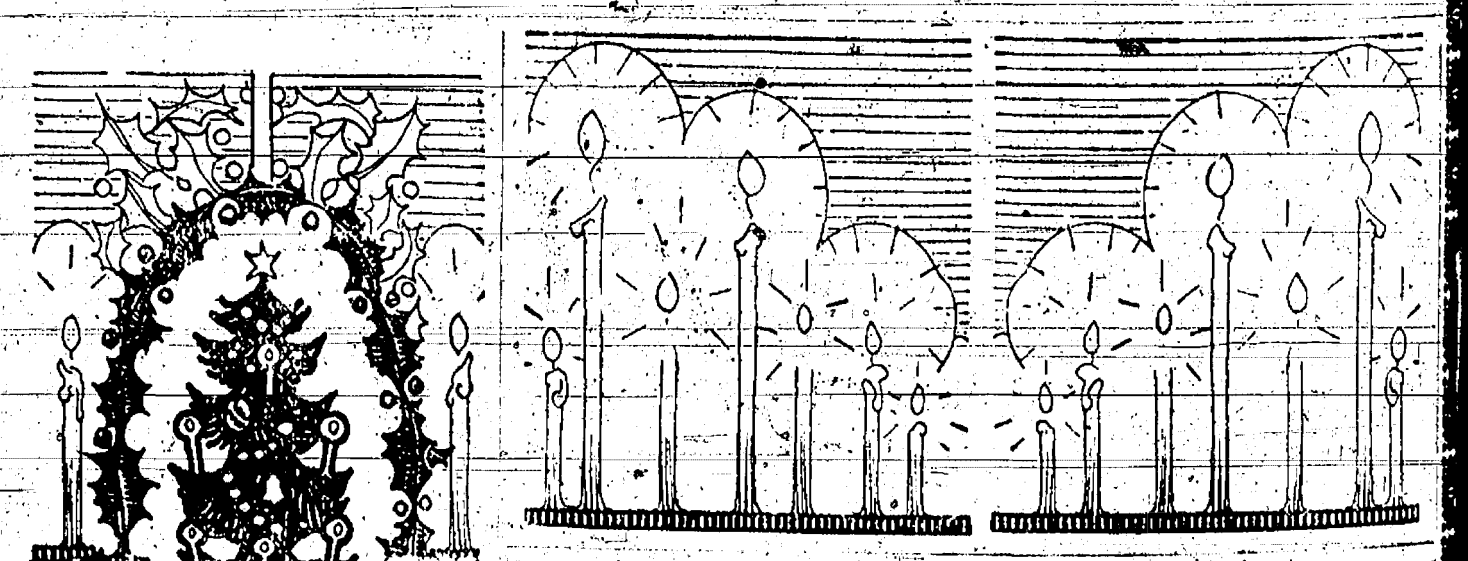
