ANSWERS FINAL CALL

Thomas Leach Died Monday At Home
On Harrison Street; Funeral Services Wednesday

Thomas Leach was born in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, in 1845, and died at his home on Harrison street, Monday, December 10, 1928.

For a number of years he worked with his father, who conducted a boot and shoe business in the block now occupied by Adam Faist and Wm. Wheeler. Later he, with Thos. Wilkinson, as partner, conducted a boot and shoe business in the place that is now occupied by the Schenk dry goods store.

He was married in 1868 to Miss Mary Goodyear of Dexter township. To this union were born four children, Alonzo, Lucy, Mabel and Minnie. Alonzo and Minnie died several years ago. Mr. Leach purchased the farm now owned by Gottlieb Bollinger and the family lived there until the death of the mother in 1916.

He again married in 1916 to Mrs. Delta Denman, and has made his home in Chelsea for the past twelve years. Besides the widow he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Lucy Moore of Ontario, California, and four grandchildren, Mrs. Mabel Artz of Chelsea, four half brothers, Dennis Leach of Jackson, Alvin Leach of Beaverton, George and Robert Leach of Chelsea, one half sister, Mrs. Margaret Norton of Battle Creek.

He was a familiar figure upon the streets of Chelsea and had a smile and good word for everyone. He will be missed by the community at large. Funeral services were held Wednesday, 2:00 o'clock at the house and 2:30 at the Congregational church, Rev. A. E. Potts officiating. Burial in Oak Grove cemetery.

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WASHTENAW COUNTY FAIR DIRECTORS MEET AND ELECT OFFICERS

Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Burkhardt Entertain Officials at Dinner Party; Manager Presents Report.

Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Burkhardt entertained the board of directors of the Washtenaw County Fair Association at a dinner party in the Congregational church last Thursday evening.

Following the dinner hour the party went to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Burkhardt, and officers were chosen for the coming year, as follows:

President: Chas. J. Hutzel, of Ann Arbor, was re-elected for the seventh consecutive term; secretary, C. J. Sweet, of Ann Arbor; C. D. Finkbeiner, of Saline and C. Frey, Staelber of Ann Arbor township, were re-elected as vice presidents; President Hutzel appointed B. E. Pryer, of Ann Arbor, as

R. C. McFetrich was tendered the position as executive manager for the coming year. He has filled that position the past year.

The other directors aside from the officers are: O. C. Burkhardt, Chelsea; William L. Henderson, Ann Arbor; Robert H. Alter, Ann Arbor; Griffith S. Cossar, Ann Arbor; John Lawson, Milan; Frank Melane, Ypsilanti, and Benjamin Stein, Scio township.

The directors have decided to construct a hog barn as the major improvement for the coming year.

The annual report as submitted by the manager is as follows:

The assets of the association include \$60,000 in value of real estate; \$50,000 in value of buildings, \$3,000 fencing, \$4,000 lighting plant, gas and water mains; \$25,000 racing plant, track and barns, \$14,565 as bills receivable; a total of \$132,514.55.

The liabilities include \$20,000 in mortgages, \$11,500 in notes and \$836.34 as bills payable; a total of \$32,336.34.

The receipts of the 1928 fair included the following items: \$12,148.64, gate and grandstand; \$289, class entry fees; \$467, speed fees; \$4,804.22, midway concession fees; \$825, rental of booths in merchants' building; \$698 ground rent; \$1,800 in advertising in premium book; \$550, rental of buildings; \$106.50, membership tickets; \$4,000, board of supervisors appropriation; \$3,855.31, state and banks' appropriations; \$55,500, loans from banks; \$275 deposit on 1929 midway space; \$351.56, miscellaneous receipts; total of \$86,756.96.

The expenses of the 1928 fair included the following items: \$3,217.20, office supplies, office help, expenses of members, salary of manager; \$6,070.66, class premiums, \$2,279, race premiums; \$4,728, band music; \$9,096.64, repairs, replacements, roads, new buildings; \$1,385.19, printing of premium books; \$976.44, advertising in newspapers; \$932.34, outdoor advertising; \$320.68, postage on premium books; \$210.50, judges; \$162, police; \$249.09, expenses of superintendents; \$1,717.12, labor at gates, traffic park.

\$889.12, miscellaneous and insurance; \$211.51, equipment; \$1,875.38, interest on loans; \$1,500, loans paid; total of \$36,756.96 including cash on hand counting all checks paid.

Music was furnished during the banquet by Earlake's Hawaiian orchestra of Ann Arbor, they also furnishing music for the dance following the program. A number of club songs led by P. F. Niehaus, were also enjoyed during the banquet.

Monday evening's program and arrangements were in charge of George Wood Hayes, local Kiwanian.
