

## Two Sentenced On Rum Law Charges

The probation of a Milan man was revoked and two Chicagoans were sentenced on liquor charges during proceedings before Judge George W. Sample of circuit court Saturday afternoon.

John Kleinhenz, Milan, on probation for some years after pleading guilty to a charge of illegal cohabitation, was the man whose probationary contract was set aside following a hearing. He was charged specifically with using obscene language in the presence of women. The court also entered an order, at the request of Prosecutor Carl H. Stuhberg, for the appointment of a commission to determine the man's sanity.

John Denison, 43, and Clyde Ryan, 45, Chicago, arrested a few days ago by state police as they were driving on US-112, pleaded guilty to charges of transportation and possession of liquor. Twelve cases of whisky were found in their car, according to officers.

Denison was sentenced to pay costs of \$200 and Ryan costs of \$100. Both were placed on probation for a period of five years.

William G. Boatwright, before the court on a writ of attachment for non-payment of alimony, was committed to county jail for six months or until such time as \$100 back alimony, \$50 attorney fee and \$10 motion fee are paid.

## State Farmers Win Checks At Chicago

Thirty Michigan farmers came back from the Chicago International Hay and Grains show with 94 checks awarded them on hay and grain.

A. W. Jewett, Mason, won first on white winter wheat and Emory Jewett, Mason, placed second in the same class. Second place on field peas was won by Charles Komp, Ewen. Michigan lost only one place out of the first ten on many field beans. John C. Wilk, St. Louis, had the best sample in this class, and Clarence Johnson, St. Louis, ranked next. Mr. Wilk also won first on other field beans and a championship on the navy beans which took first.

Second place on oats went to A. W. Jewett, Mason, Harvey Virginia, Afton, had the best sample of eastern alfalfa seed at the show and this exhibit also won a reserve championship.

Mason seems to have the hay making champions of the world as A. W. Jewett and Arthur Jewett won first and second on red clover hay. Emory H. Jewett and Arthur W. Jewett took the first two places on timothy hay, and Arthur W. Jewett placed second on soybean hay.

Howard Handy, Bay City, won third on barley other than six-row and Arthur W. Jewett took third on six-row barley.

First place and reserve championship on soybeans seed were won by John C. Wilk, St. Louis.

## Fritz Kreisler At Ann Arbor Tonight

Fritz Kreisler, the great violinist, who will give the fifth program in this year's Choral Union Series in Hill Auditorium, Thursday evening, December 13, is one of those rarely gifted men for whom success was certain whatever line of work he might have followed. His position among violinists for our time is, to say the least, second to none. In deciding to devote himself to the violin, if the testimony of such a man as Harold Bauer is to be believed, there was lost to the world in Kreisler an equally great pianist. In fact, he is still an admirable pianist and only a few years ago he appeared in London in such a capacity in a concert of chamber music. He had a brilliant career in Vienna when a youth, as a student of music. His father is a famous physician and Fritz, had he continued his work in medicine, undoubtedly would have become one of the great men of the world in that profession. When he was working with Massart in Paris he incidentally found time to go to the Beaux Arts and work at painting and his fellows who were then with him say that he showed a very decided talent in that line.

The interesting feature of this versatility is that it has not resulted in a scattering of his talent. If genius has a capacity for work, Kreisler is certainly a genius of the highest class. He is never idle. It was not until 1899 that he decided finally to make the violin his career. He overcame great obstacles and within two years had taken his place among the greatest artists of the world. Today he stands absolutely without rival in purity of style, beauty of tone and soundness of artistry.

**Use of Marl Saves  
Money For Farmers**

A saving of \$500,000 through the  
use of marl by Michigan farmers in  
1928 is the estimate made by the ag-  
ricultural engineering department of  
Michigan State College.

Members of the department believe  
that the average gain made is a dol-  
lar a ton and the farmers used a half  
million tons last year. Five years  
ago farmers in this state used only  
6,000 tons of this material.

The Geological Survey has complet-  
ed a study of the marl deposits in 14  
Michigan counties and it has been  
found that a plentiful supply of good  
quality marl is available for the use  
of a majority of farmers in those  
counties.

A great deal of the marl is in close  
proximity to the sandy soils which  
are the most acid of Michigan soils.  
The possibility of the economical use  
of marl is determined by its percent-  
age of calcium carbonate and the cost  
of getting the marl to the field.

Some deposits are readily acces-  
sible and the materials can be ex-  
cavated very cheaply. Other beds are  
inaccessible or contain marl with a  
low calcium content. Agricultural en-  
gineering specialists from Michigan  
State College have given excavation  
demonstrations at 150 locations in the  
state.

Ground limestone and marl are  
equally valuable for use in treating  
acid soils. Each farmer should find  
which is the cheapest for him to use.  
County agricultural agents and Col-  
lege specialists will assist in deciding  
which is the most economical.






# Face to Face With Santa



## Launch Second-Year Soil Fertility Project

Thirty-two local leaders attended a dinner at the Ann Arbor Y. M. C. A. Saturday noon, December 1, and completed arrangements for beginning the second year series of lessons. J. W. Simms, soil specialist, Michigan State College, addressed the local leaders, and discussed with them the soil program for the year. He announced that this year the subject matter to be discussed in the four-lessons given will be: 1, Tillage; 2, Crop rotation, as it applies to soil fertility; 3, Plant food balance; 4, Soil types and erosion.

The first part of each lesson will be given over to a review of last year's lessons. Review questions were distributed among the leaders, and they will be used as a basis for review work. The first series of questions will be a review of the subject of lime, which was the first lesson given last year.

Leaders representing 14 of the 16 groups carrying on this work were present at the meeting, and all reported that the work given last year had proved very valuable to them and to all members enrolled in these groups. That the interest in the local groups increased with each lesson. Meetings this year are scheduled for December 4 and 6; January 16 and 17; February 20 and 21, and March 13 and 14.

Groups reporting the first day represent the following communities:

Lyndon, Sylvan, West Lima, East Lima, Sharon, Freedom, Bridgewater, and Salem. Those reporting the second day are Augusta, York, Pittsfield, Superior, Scio, Webster and Milan.

**Chevrolet Production Schedule Announced**

The tens of thousands who have already placed orders can feel assured of early deliveries, Mr. Knudsen said, when they bear in mind that 90 days after the introduction of the 1929 cars more than a quarter million of them were on the highways in owner's service. He further recalled that by June 1 of the present year, five months after the January announcement, a half million cars were in use. And before October 1 the company established a record of building and delivering 1,000,000 cars which Mr. Knudsen referred to as the greatest single achievement in the history of the automobile industry.

Mr. Knudsen's optimism over the forthcoming year, he explained, has its basis in continued prosperity and in what he interprets as a well defined preference on the part of the public for the six cylinder car. "The coming year will find national prosperity solidly entrenched, and Chevrolet, with a new and improved product line, fully designed to meet public preference, is prepared to handle its full share of the coming year's business growth," he said. "All of our production facilities are being keyed up to meet the rising demand so that Chevrolet will be able to make deliveries as rapidly as our production methods permit."

"The year just coming is a close friend," Chevrolet preparing itself for the advent of the new six. Numerous expansions were brought to completion, adding to our facilities several hundred thousand feet of factory floor space. **Sells One Peach Tree For \$2,500**

James E. Markham, Fairfield, Ill., worked five years to produce a peach that would be of normal size but have a very small pit. His efforts so far encouraged him that six months ago he decided to sell his farm. There was no buyer, so he went back to his experiments.

"One day he found a tree full of peaches that in maturing had turned a vivid red color. He cut into some of the fruit and discovered the pits were no larger than those of plums."

A sample of the new peach was sent to a nursery with a penciled date

of explanation. The next day an executive of the nursery was at his farm and within a few hours had purchased the tree for \$2,500. A steel cage was built around the tree until its buds could be stripped away. Markham mounted guard for his customer.

Five bushels of fruit were taken from the tree. The peaches were slightly larger than the typical Illinois peach. "Nothing has been revealed concerning the development of the 'Markham peach,' as it is to be known, except that it is the result of a long process of pollenization and grafting. It ripens two weeks later than the Hale variety."



