**First Settlement Was In Henrietta**

Henrietta township's float in the coming centennial celebration in Jackson will be a reproduction of the log cabin home of John Baptiste Berrard, the first settler in Henrietta township and the first settler, by many years, of Jackson county. He is said to have come to what was later to be Jackson county in 1816 or about 13 years before the settlement was started in Jackson.

Considerable time has been given by the committee in charge of Henrietta's part in the coming celebration to the various details relative to authentic date of the first settler in the county. Berrard had his home on the east side of the lake, then known as Baptiste lake but now better known as Betteese lake. He was an Indian trader and his stock of goods at his trading post was said to be greater than that carried by the Jackson stores following the settlement of that village. A grandson of the old trader still lives in this vicinity and although he is past 80 years, old he will attend the coming centennial celebration if he is able.—Grass Lake News.

**Chevrolet Breaks All Past Records In May**

May was the biggest month in the history of the Chevrolet Motor Company. Production for the month totaled 161,214 cars and trucks, breaking all records.

Under pressure of the greatest demand in Chevrolet history, its 16 giant factories in May experienced the busiest period the company has ever enjoyed. Factory wheels turned with all the speed consistent with Chevrolet's precision manufacturing methods to accommodate the demand for cars that poured in from Maine to California and from Washington to Florida.

May was the third consecutive month to set a new all-time monthly production mark. It far surpassed the March record of 147,278 units and topped the April achievement of 157,522 units.

To accomplish this record performance Chevrolet plants averaged 7,000 cars and trucks daily; an average of 777 cars and trucks were built every hour; an average of 13 were built every minute, and one was built every 4.6 seconds!

From present indications the same relatively high level of production will be maintained in June to keep pace with the demand, which officials report unabated. Dealer stocks are still below normal due to the necessity of filling orders as fast as cars are received. Unfilled orders are over 300 per cent ahead of this same period last year. It was announced definitely that June production would break all records for the month.

**Michigan Shows Way On Holstein Cattle**

Michigan breeders of livestock can take just pride in the report from the national Holstein sale at Philadelphia which shows that two animals from this State topped the list when the cow Royal Ormsby sold for \$6,300 and her seven months old bull calf for \$10,100.

These animals were offered for sale by E. M. Bayne, Romeo, and were

bought by the Winterthur Farms, Wilmington, Delaware. Another lot of nine animals consigned from Michigan sold for an average of more than \$1,000 a head.

At the 44th annual convention held by Holstein breeders at the same time as the sale, the announcement was made that Michigan ranked second in the number of breeders who had joined the association during 1928, and this State led all others in the numbers of breeders who had entered their herds in herd improvement registry tests.

Several excellent animals were purchased by Michigan men at the national sale, and these animals will be used to maintain the State's rank as a producer of excellent Holsteins.

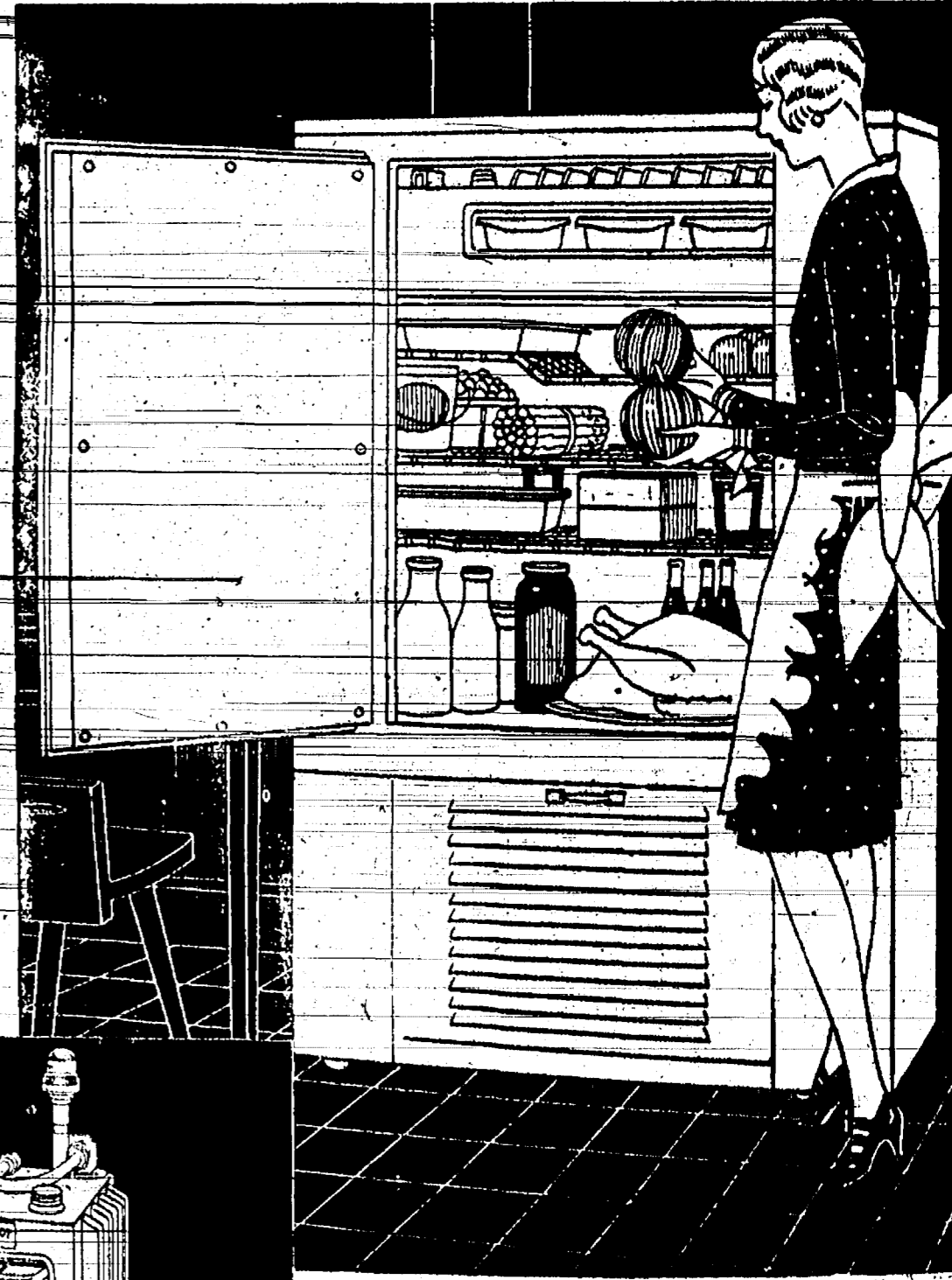
