DEATH CLAIMS O. C. BURKHART, PROMINENT RESIDENT OF CHELSEA

Dies Tuesday, After Illness of Several Months; Was Active in Local and County Affairs.

Orrin C. Burkhardt, prominent citizen and life-long resident of this vicinity, died Tuesday, November 26, 1929, after several months' illness.

Mr. Burkhardt was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Burkhardt, and was born November 12, 1856 at North Lake in Dexter township. He acquired his education in the Chelsea public school and as a boy edited a paper in North Lake Grange.

He was united in marriage to Miss Cora Cummings, who with their infant child died in 1881. December 31, 1883, he was married to Miss Angie Dancer, and for fourteen years they made their home in Lima, coming to Chelsea to reside in 1897.

For many years Mr. Burkhardt was associated with the business affairs of Washenaw county, serving as a member of the board of county auditors and of numerous appraisal boards in the county. He was a member of the

Washenaw County Fair Society, having recently been re-elected to that office for the tenth term.

He had served as assessor of the village and had held various other village and township offices. He was a director of the Farmers' and Merchants Bank of Chelsea.

Mr. Burkhardt was a member of the Knights of Pythias, Lafayette Grange, Western Washenaw Farmers' Club, Washenaw Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance Co., of which he was formerly secretary-treasurer, the Washenaw County Pioneer Society, the Black Top Delaine Merino Sheep Breeders' Association and the Standard Delaine Sheep Breeders' Association. He was a member of the Methodist church and of the official board of the Methodist Old People's Home.

Mr. Burkhardt is survived by the widow, two daughters, Mrs. Elmer E. Whians, of Chelsea, and Mrs. Ezra Koebbe, of Columbus, Nebraska; two sisters, Mrs. Hattie Sharp, of Perry, and Mrs. Edward McDaniels, of North Lake, and nine grandchildren.

The body will lie in state at the Methodist church Friday from 10 o'clock to 2:30. Funeral services will be held at the church at 2:30, Rev. F. I. Walker officiating. Burial will be in Oak Grove cemetery.

The First Forty Years With Webster Pioneers

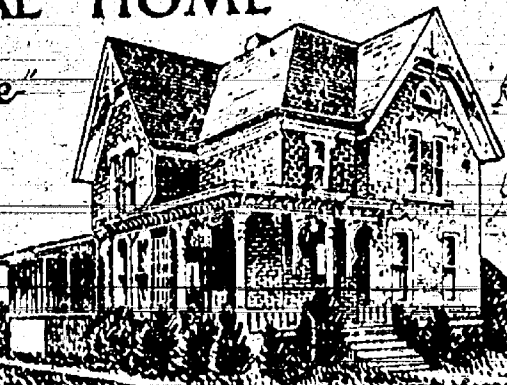

This has been termed: "The Sermon on the Mount."

The program is an entertainment with both humor and tragic things interwoven, and is also followed many times by beautifully colored pictures of wonderful scenes and of wild animals at large.

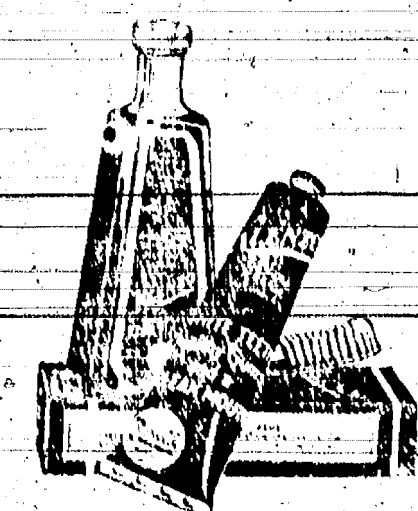

Dairy Cow Should Set Her Own Value

Whether a dairy cow is worth more for beef or butter fat is a problem which should be solved by the cow, according to M. S. G. dairy specialists who suggest a method of determining actual value.
According to Michigan Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, feed cost amounts to from 50 to 65 per cent of the total cost of keeping a dairy cow for a year. The remaining 35 to 50 per cent of the cost is overhead and includes such items as labor, taxes, depreciation and interest on investment, amounting approximately \$45 per year for a grade cow.
The method which has been suggested for determining value is to add the net profit for three years to the value of the cow as a beef animal.
Using \$75 as the beef value of the average dairy cow, two examples taken from Dairy Herd Improvement Association records will illustrate the method. A cow which produces 203 pounds of butterfat in a year returned \$59 over the cost of feed. Subtract the overhead from this amount and it would leave \$14 net profit per year, or \$42 net profit for three years. Adding the beef value of \$75 to the three-year net butterfat profit makes this cow worth \$117.
A cow which produced 446 pounds of butterfat per year with a three-year net profit of \$351 would be worth \$426.

Question And Answer Dept.

Ques.—I wish you would tell me if you can what caused the estrangement between the Pope and Mussolini, the dictator of Italy, and whether or not Mussolini is a Catholic? If he is why has he been so unfriendly to the Vatican?

Ans.—Mussolini has never been unfriendly to the Vatican. He is a Catholic, and while he embraces that faith, he considers his first interests are to Italy. The only point at which there was a clash between the Vatican and Mussolini was over Fascistism in the education and training of youth. Control of the child is one of the prime principles of the church, and when the Fascists began the organization of all boys and proceeded to train them to be good Fascists, there was a

conflict.

Ques.—I would like to ask you this simple question: "Can a cat fish?"

Ans.—No; but a tomato can.

Ques.—To settle an argument will you please answer if there was ever a queen of England who never was in that country?

Ans.—The wife of Richard the Lion-Hearted, Queen Berengaria, was never in England. While Richard was taking part of the third crusade in 1190 and while wintering in southern Italy, Berengaria was brought to him and their marriage took place. While Richard was imprisoned off the coast of France, they became estranged, and she died in 1250 without ever having seen England.

Ques.—We would like to ask you if a tomato is a fruit or vegetable? Is a watermelon a berry? Should I be on my hands and feet, according to the laws of nature?

Ans.—"Vegetable" is a name ap-

plied interchangeably with the word "plant," but applied in a more restricted sense to any plant that is used as an article of food, such as corn, peas, onions, cabbage, carrots, potatoes, beets, beans, lettuce, etc., etc. Fruit is a mature ovary of a plant which contains seeds, especially those plant products that are pleasant to the taste and eaten by man and animals. Hence, tomatoes, watermelons, apples, peaches, plums, cherries, etc., etc., are classified as fruit. (2) Many scientists of Europe claim that in pre-historic times man's usual mode of locomotion was on all fours, and that in the series of evolutions that have taken place in the past millions of years he is now erect. However, this opinion is not shared by a vast majority of the white race who maintain that people to inhabit the earth, and that they were created in the image and likeness of God, and further that their carriage was the same at that time as it is in our own state of civilization. Hence your question is unanswerable only from a given viewpoint.

Ques.—Why doesn't the United States recognize Russia as a nation and represent it in our country?

Ans.—There are three reasons given for non-recognition. First is that during the war the United States loaned Russia (then a monarchy) more than \$300,000,000. When Russia overthrew the monarchical form of government and established their present form of soviet regime, they repudiated that debt which was contracted by the monarchists. It is a matter of opinion between soviet Russia and the United States as to who is liable for this debt. Second, the present government of the United States looks with disfavor upon their dissemination of Communist propaganda.

Ques.—I would like to ask you if there are more girls or boys born in Canada and the United States?

Ans.—More girls than boys are born in Canada and the United States. The death rate, however, is greater among the males.

Ques.—Will you please answer in your question department the exact width of the Amazon river at its mouth?

Ans.—The Amazon river at its mouth proper—Cabo do Norte to Ponta Patilora—is 187 miles wide.
