Will Organize Volley Ball League Monday

It is planned, according to Mr. Bahnmiller, to limit the league to four teams, so that all teams can play each Monday evening during the winter months.

Residents Urged To Buy Christmas Seals

Michigan residents were called upon by Governor Fred W. Green to support the nationwide sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals in the following proclamation, issued Tuesday: "It is most fitting that all citizens of Michigan should at this season of the year give thought to those of our number who have the misfortune to be afflicted with tuberculosis, and that we should accept the opportunity afforded through the sale of Christmas seals to support the organized campaign against this dreaded disease. 'I would urge that universal support be given the Christmas seal fund, campaigns of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association and the various local tuberculosis societies in order that their efforts for better health may be continued and expanded.' Adult and child health education, service, free chest clinics, and nursing service for tuberculosis patients are three phases of health work carried on throughout the year by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association with funds raised in the Christmas seal sale. When the smoke of the battle cleared away, Gallup was given the decision over the 38-pound trespasser, and now has the animal imprisoned in a cage at his home.

He leaves to mourn their loss his mother, a sister, Gertrude, a brother, Carl, his grandmother, Mrs. Gertrude Swickard, and two aunts, Mrs. Edgar Long and Miss Elizabeth Swickard, of Detroit. The funeral was held Saturday morning at 9 o'clock at St. David's church, Detroit, Rev. Father Murphy officiating with burial in Mt. Olivet cemetery, Detroit. Those from Chelsea who attended the funeral were Matthew, Carl and Henry Swickard, Raymond Clark and Mrs. Wm. Stark.

Lilley State Bank At Tecumseh Is Closed

The Lilley State Bank, a 75-year-old bank in Tecumseh was closed Saturday by order of the State Banking Department. According to a statement issued by an official of the State Banking Department the closing was a precautionary measure taken in order to give the State Department and bank directors time to work out a plan to protect the deposit liability. The bank was established 75 years ago by Lucius Lilley. At the present time R. A. Hession is president, and P. S. Temple cashier of the institution.

Hunting In Michigan To Close December 31

With but two exceptions, hunting in the woods and on the waters in Michigan will come to a close until next fall at sunset, December 31st. The bagging may be caught until February 1, and the rabbit may be killed in the upper peninsula until January 31st. Whether any section of the state will be open to beaver trapping during the winter or spring is still to be decided by the Conservation Commission. The muskrat and duck seasons throughout the state and the rabbit season in the lower peninsula end the night of December 31. With the close of the duck season the seasons on geese, brant, Wilson snipe and coot also end. The trapping season for raccoons closes in the lower peninsula December 16. The open season also closes December 16. It is necessary within five days after the close of the various seasons for taking furbearing animals for persons having raw hides of protected furbearing animals at the close of the season to make a report to the Director of Conservation, stating the kinds and number of hides in his possession. It is also the duty of any person selling hides to report to the Director of Conservation the name and address of the person to whom such hides were sold and the kind and number of hides sold.

St. Mary's Basket Ball Teams Are Organized

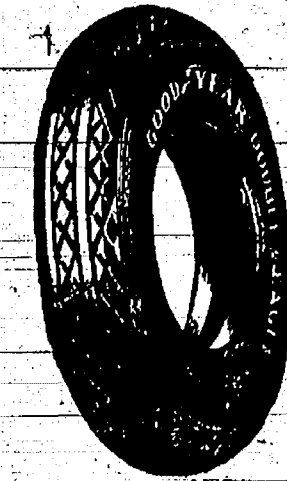

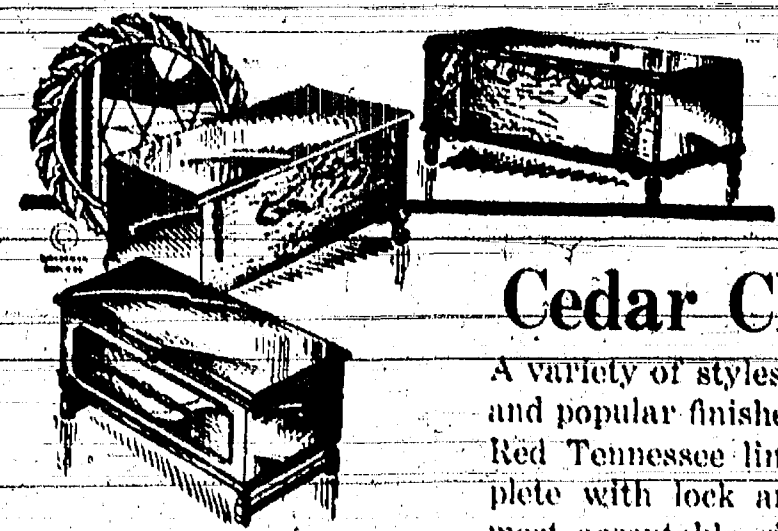

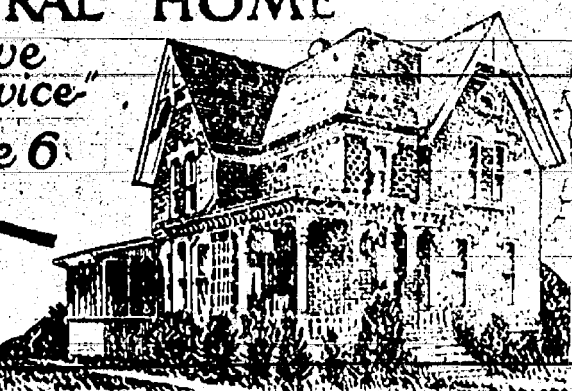
The First Forty Years With Chelsea Pioneers

Question And Answer Dept.

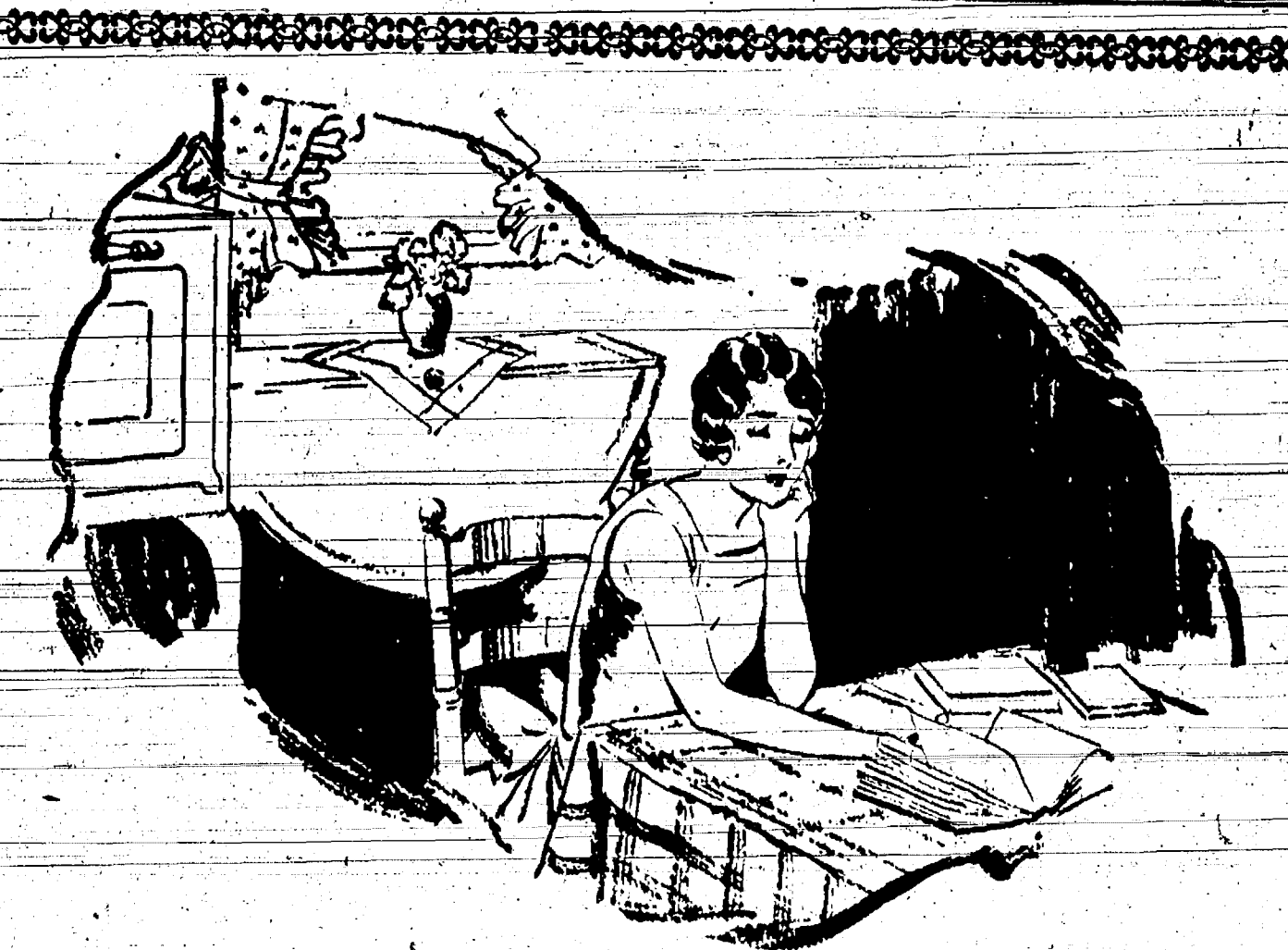

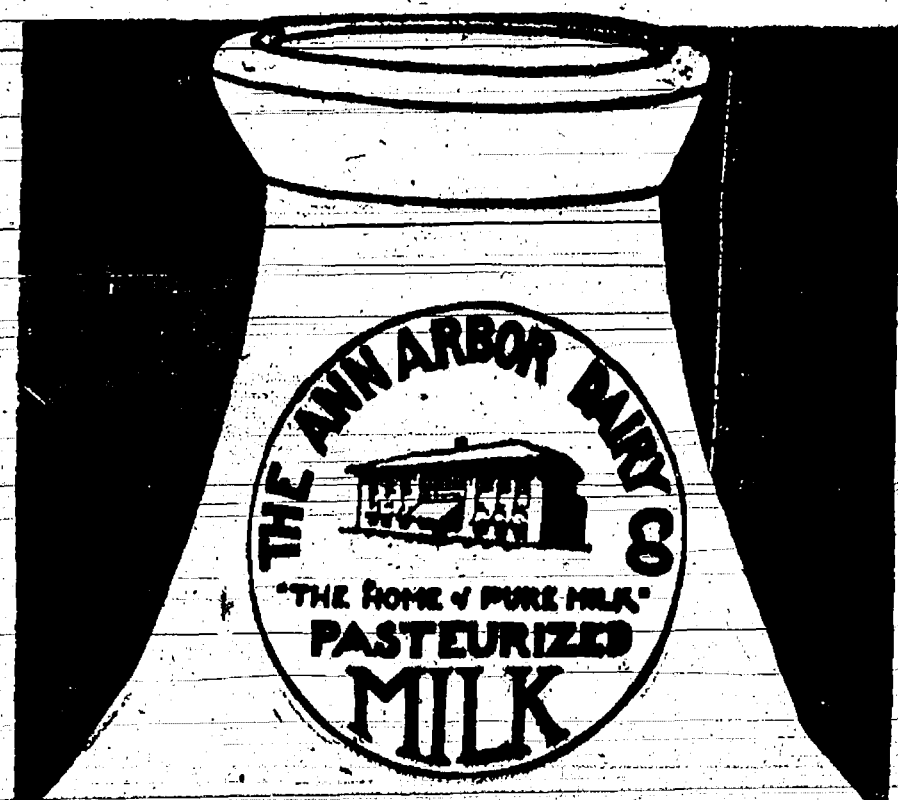

DON'T BITE AT IT

Along about this time of year the mails are burdened with goods sent out "on approval" by mail-order houses. They buy a lot of addresses from firms making a business of selling them and then they proceed to send out an assortment of neckties, socks, Christmas cards or allied silk stockings to every name on their mailing list. With the goods is a form-letter suggesting that the recipient inspect the contents of the package, and if they wish to retain them to send a stipulated amount. Otherwise they are instructed to return them.

The practice will be kept up this year, and Pawlerville residents will receive this stuff "on approval" from time to time. Those who do not return them in the specified time will also receive some caustic and threatening form letters. For their benefit we want to state that there is no reason for accepting these threats seriously. Of course, no honest person wants what does not belong to him, but the concern that sends out goods that are not ordered or requested does so at its own risk.

If postage comes with the goods shoot them back in a hurry. If it does not, toss them aside and wait until postage is sent for their return and take your own sweet time about it. Uncle Sam is with you for he has not much use for this kind of merchandising. And if they get too obnoxious, it is an easy matter to file a complaint with the postal department through your local postmaster.—Pawlerville Review.

Pooling Helps Sell Surplus Herd Bulls

Dairy farmers who belong to the Saginaw Valley Dairy Herd Improvement Association have found that the

pooling of interests pays in selling surplus bull calves as well as in testing their herds for production.

Ten bull calves were sold for an average price of 100 dollars at a consignment sale held at Hemlock. The records of the dams of these bulls had been determined by the testing work and each buyer of a calf knew just what he was purchasing.

Buyers from five nearby counties attended the sale. Top price in the sale was obtained for a calf consigned by A. C. Tassin, Hemlock, and sold to John Young, Reese.

The value of bull club work which enables the owner to determine the worth of a herd sire before he is sold to the butcher was shown in this sale where eight of the ten calves were sons of one excellent sire. The top price calf was one of the eight and his dam had a production record of 999.49 pounds of butterfat in one year.

A member of the bull club, William Watson, Hemlock, acted as sales manager. A. B. Love, Saginaw County Agricultural Agent, and J. G. Hayes, East Lansing, Holstein-Friesian fieldman, assisted with the sale.

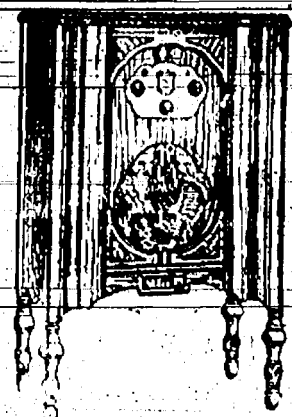

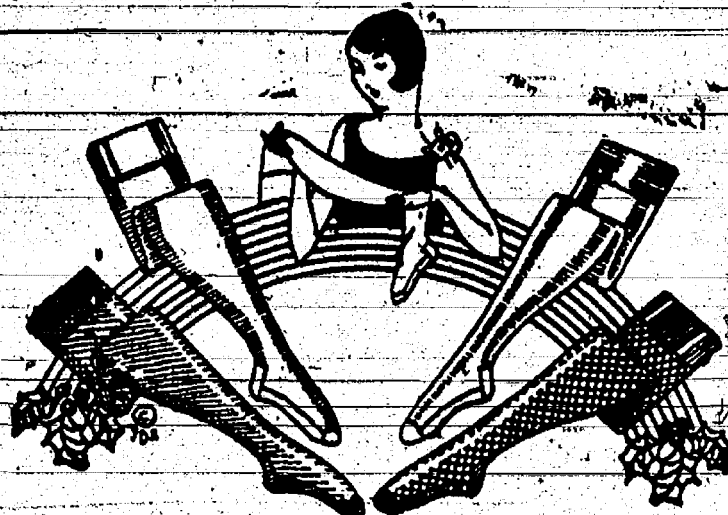

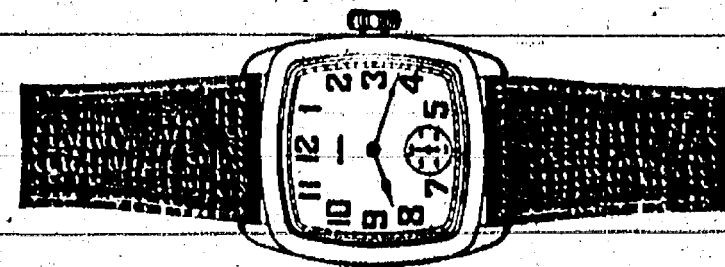

Hunters Violate Many Conservation Laws

Sixty-two conservation laws were violated during the month of October by 608 men arrested by Conservation officers according to a report issued by the law enforcement division of the Department of Conservation.

The 608 violators paid fines and costs aggregating \$17,349.95, the highest amount for any one month in the history of the Department. In addition to fines, conservation law violators served a total of 400 days in jail.

Increasing severity of sentences for violations of conservation laws, a fact that has been noted by the Department for the past several months, continued in October. During that month the average penalty was \$28.77. During September it was \$27.01; in August, \$20.30, and in July \$19.95. The total fines and costs paid in October were practically double the figures for the previous month.

According to the records of the Department, during October, 1928, 437 were arrested for breaking conservation laws.

The 62 conservation laws violated during October, included everything from killing bears to destroying property of the Department.

Several men were convicted and sentenced for using muskrat traps that did not bear metal tags which bore the names and addresses of the owners. This was in violation of one of the acts of the 1920 legislature.

The majority of the violations were for shooting of pheasants, for shooting the birds out of season or for shooting hen pheasants. Fines for shooting the latter ranged from \$50 to \$100.

The most severe penalties were imposed on two Detroit men who were fined \$100 each and were sent to jail for 60 days each for killing song birds. During October the Department of Conservation confiscated 155 rifles and shotguns, used in committing game law violations. In addition the Department confiscated two automobiles and a canoe; innumerable muskrat and beaver hides; a quantity of venison and a quantity of fish. Several men were taken.

Explanation Of Rules For Spearing Fish

Fishermen are permitted to spear suckers, redhorse, haddock and grass pike through the ice during the months that ice is found on inland lakes. Under the new state law, no definite time is set.

It is also permissible to use live lines. All kinds of fish may be taken during their respective season. Ice lines cannot be left unattended for more than an hour. Those left longer than that time will be regarded as set lines and therefore unlawful. Ice lines may be used under the same rules as spears.

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Michigan Livestock Competes At Chicago

Michigan will be represented by champions of former days and new contenders in the show ring at the International Livestock Show to be held at Chicago on November 30 to Dec. 7. The Michigan State College exhibits will include horses, cattle, sheep and hogs, in addition to exhibits to be entered by outstanding individual livestock breeders of the state.

The college exhibit of horses will include six Belgians and five Percherons. The Percheron group will be headed by Sir Laet, champion stallion at the International last year. Maple Grove, Leila, twice grand champion at the International, and three colts will complete the Percheron group.

The Belgian exhibit will be headed by Preston Wolfe, the first prize two-year-old stallion at the International last year and winner of the King Albert trophy. Another outstanding Belgian will be Belle Phoenix, first winner at Chicago and grand champion at the Ohio and Michigan State Fairs last year. A yearling and two foals will complete the Belgian exhibit.

The college animal husbandry department is planning on exhibiting 113 steers, 34 sheep, and 30 hogs. With the exception of seven breeding sheep, these animals are commercial stock and will be sold after the show.

In view of the fact that some of the steers won prizes this year at the State Fair and prizes, as calves, last year at the International, this group is expected to make a good showing.

Alcohol Plays Part Of Water Detective

Alcohol is now acting the part of a detective in a method which was perfected by members of the soils department at Michigan State College to determine the amount of moisture in a soil.

Old methods of measuring the quantity of water in the soil required that the soil be taken to a laboratory and dried in an oven for twenty-four hours. The new method permits the investigator to tell in five minutes in the field how much water the soil contains.

No matter how fertile a soil is, plants can not grow unless there is water present in the soil to allow the plant food to go into solution so it can be taken up by the plant. Clay should contain 35 per cent moisture, sand should have 12 per cent, and loam soils need 20 per cent of water to enable plants to make rapid growth.

Soils which are low in water content can be improved by an application of organic matter, or the soils can be tilled by methods which build dust mulches on the surface. Organic matter increases the soil's water holding capacity and a dust mulch decreases the amount of water evaporated from the soil.

Soil bacteria, especially those which fix nitrogen in the soil, multiply most rapidly in moist soils.
