Autoist Held After Fatal Crash On US-12

One man is dead, another seriously jured and a third held in the county jail at Ann Arbor as the result of a head-on auto collision about 9:30 a. m. Tuesday on US-12, five miles east of Chelsea.

The dead man is Charles Mueller, 44, of Michigan Center, driver of one auto. Immediately after the accident he was taken to St. Joseph hospital, Ann Arbor, where he died without regaining consciousness. His companion, David Lawrence of Vandercook Lake, is a patient at University hospital. John Daugherty, colored, of Jackson, driver of the second car, was arrested. Dr. Palmer of Chelsea treated the latter for minor cuts.

Daugherty, who was said to be intoxicated, will be charged with negligent homicide, according to Prosecutor C. H. Stuhrberg. Some months ago he paid a heavy fine for reckless driving.
