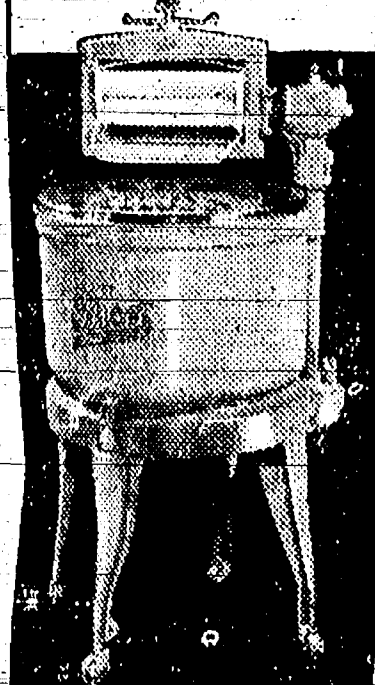

## Groesbeck To Speak In Chelsea Sept. 6

Alex J. Groesbeck, three times governor of Michigan and now a candidate for the Republican nomination for the governorship, will speak in Chelsea, probably on September 6, according to announcement made this week by the newly formed Chelsea Groesbeck committee headed by M. J. Dunkel.

The county committee in Ann Arbor announced that the former governor's party will visit Chelsea, Ypsilanti, Ann Arbor, Dexter, Saline, Bridge-water and Milan. Committees are being organized in each of these places and women will have their own organizations.

The date chosen for the Chelsea visit, September 6, is a tentative one. If any change is made it will be announced in the Standard.

The local committee is composed of M. J. Dunkel, John Kalmbach, Jacob Hummel, John Fletcher, Charles Clayton and M. W. McClure.

Attorney General Brucker, one of Groesbeck's opponents in the three-cornered race, is due in Chelsea Saturday morning.

Mrs. Van Linden and her companion helped in moving the victim and later reported the accident to the sheriff's office.

According to reports this morning, the young man is recovering as rapidly as can be expected.

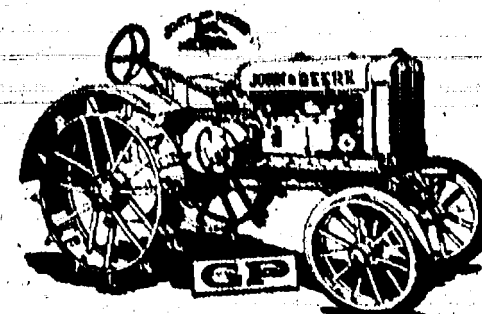

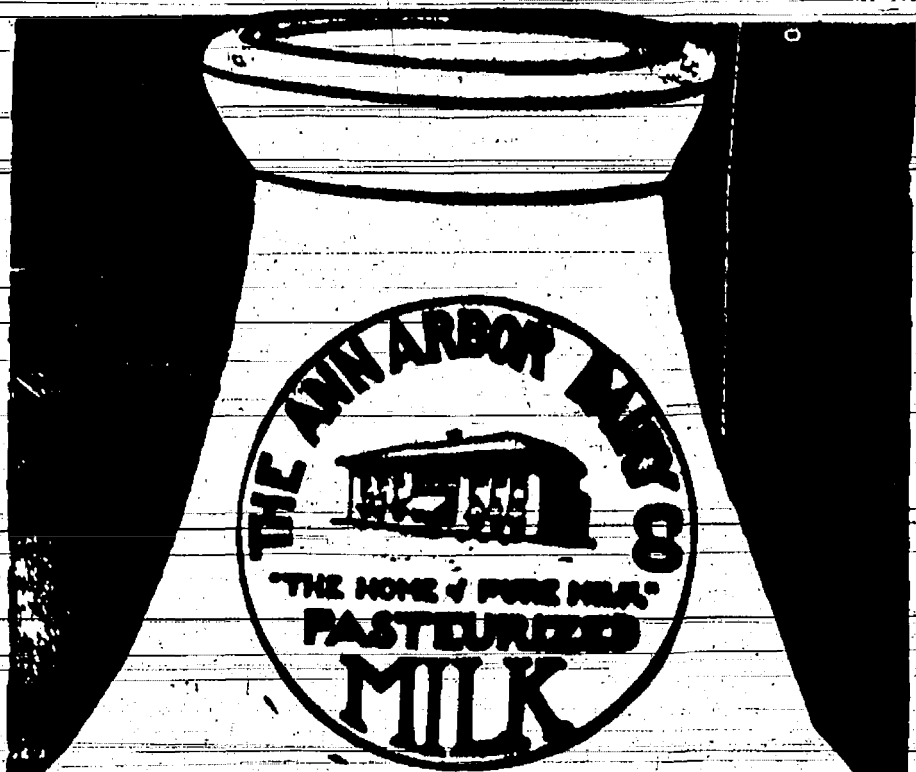

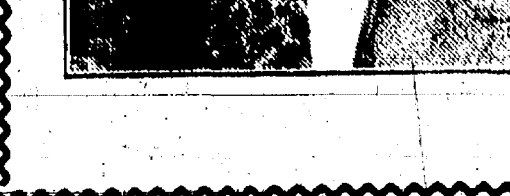

Ex-President Calvin Coolidge has joined the ranks of newspaper columnists. Will Rogers admits he'll be keen competition; Arthur Brisbane has not been heard from yet.

Under the caption of "Thinking Things Over With Calvin Coolidge," the ex-President packs a vast amount of wisdom into the following contribution on economic conditions:

"Faith without work is vain. Although many millions of people are enjoying record wages there are others who are unemployed, some of whom can live on their savings, while the rest will have to be supported directly or indirectly by those who work.

"People are out of work because the things they produce are not being bought. With all our wealth it is difficult to suppose that our consuming power has been greatly diminished. It is not being exercised. It will help somewhat to increase public and private consumption. But the principal consuming power in this country is in the people who have work. Unless they buy of the other fellow, he cannot buy of them.

"If those who are working and have the means would pay all their retail merchandise bills and in addition purchase what they need and can afford, a healthy commerce would quickly be created. Our nation has plenty of resources to support all its people comfortably through a mutual exchange of products if everyone will do his part. Those who have employment now run the risk of losing it by refraining from buying and paying within their means. No one who has money now can afford to defer settling his accounts."
