Armstrong And Bareis Injured In Accident

Word was received here during the past week of an accident involving Ransom Armstrong and Fred Bareis, who left Chelsea on December 16th for their winter quarters at Houghton, La.

While traveling near Goodman, Miss. on December 19, the car occupied by the two men from Cavanaugh Lake and piloted by Mr. Bareis, was struck head-on by a car driven by a lady who was learning to drive, and accompanied by another lady and a small child.

Armstrong and Bareis were severely injured, the former being in an unconscious condition for about two hours. Fortunately, however, their injuries were not of a serious nature, and they expected to start on the remainder of their journey on January 3. The car was considerably damaged, necessitating extensive repairs before the journey could be resumed. Occupants of the other car also escaped serious injury.

Welsh Singers Return Here Next Thursday

Announcement is made by the Senior class of the Chelsea public schools that the Welsh Imperial Singers have been booked for a return engagement and will appear at the public school auditorium Thursday evening, January 15.

The Welsh Singers appeared in a concert here a few months ago and their concert met with such hearty approval of all who heard them that it was decided to again bring them here so that everyone would have the opportunity of hearing this world-renowned group of fourteen musicians. Because of the limited time for advertising the booking when the singers appeared before many who desired to attend were unable to do so but expressed the desire to hear them, and many who did attend plan to again attend this musical event.

Welsh Imperial Singers have been acclaimed Britain's greatest male ensemble. For five years they have been the singing sensation of Europe and Canada. Their first American appearance was at the Rotary Silver Anniversary convention which was held in Chicago in June, 1930.

R. Festyn Davies, celebrated conductor and organizer of this group of singers, made his musical debut in the United States in 1908 as soloist with the famous Filipino Constabulary Band. He has conducted some of the biggest musical festivals of this country, the biggest of all being the Great Festival at Stanford University Stadium where he conducted a chorus of 10,000 voices accompanied by six full bands, before an audience of 50,000.

On Monday evening, January 19, the Ramos-Mexican Orchestra will appear at the auditorium, also under the auspices of the Senior class. This group consists of Senor Hesiquio Ramos, his son and three daughters, all being both instrumentalists and singers. Their concert is sure to meet the approval of local music-lovers.

ADAM G. FAIST KILLED BY FAST M. C. TRAIN NEAR CEMENT PLANT

Waits For Eastbound Train And Drives Into Path Of Westbound; Funeral Held Tuesday.

Adam G. Faist was instantly killed Thursday afternoon, January 1, when his automobile was struck by Michigan Central westbound express train No. 139, as he was crossing the east track near the cement plant, two miles east of Chelsea.

The accident happened about 4:00 o'clock as Mr. Faist was returning to his home, after spending the afternoon at Four Mile Lake. He is said to have waited for an eastbound train to pass, after which he drove on the tracks and was struck by the westbound express.

H. B. Turnbull, justice of the peace, was called and impaneled the following jury: Paul Conlan, Robert Howie, Reuben Hieber, Waldo Kusterer, M. Lestation and Julius Stricker.

The inquest was held at the town hall at 10 o'clock Saturday morning, and the finding of the jury was that "Mr. Faist came to his death by accident, by being struck by train No. 139 at the east cement plant crossing." The jury recommended that the crossing be protected either by lights or bells.

Mr. Faist was born March 18, 1868, in Sharon township. He was the son of David and Agatha Faist, and was married October 25, 1908, to Miss Mary Schable. For 35 years he had been engaged in business in Chelsea, conducting a woodworking and machine shop, and for several years was engaged in the garage business.

He was a member of St. Paul's church, and was affiliated with Olive Lodge No. 156, E. & A. M., Olive Chapter, R. A. M., and the Order of Eastern Star.

He is survived by the widow, three daughters, Mrs. Oscar Lindauer and Mrs. Otto Lucht of Lima township, and Ruth, at home; two sons, Arthur, of Los Angeles, Calif., and Austin, at home; one sister, Mrs. J. L. Klein, of Chelsea; a half-brother, Michael Kusterer, and two granddaughters. Funeral services were held at the residence at one o'clock Tuesday afternoon, Rev. P. H. Grabowski officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove cemetery, with Masonic rites.

Farm Account School To Be Held Tuesday

A farm account school will be held Tuesday, January 13, at 10:00 a. m. in the supervisors' room in the court house, Ann Arbor, for the purpose of giving instruction to all farmers interested in beginning to keep farm records for 1931.

This school is for those who have never kept records in the farm account extension project. However, anyone interested is welcome to attend. The meeting will be in charge of H. A. Berg, extension specialist in farm management, Michigan State College. Mr. Berg came to the college from Illinois where he had carried on very successful farm-account work.

More than 1,000 Michigan farmers are now cooperating with Mr. Berg in farm-account work. Ten Washtenaw county farmers cooperated with him in 1929; 40 in 1930, and County Agent Osler expects practically all old cooperators to continue in 1931, and quite a large number of new names to be added to the project for the coming year.

At the meeting next Tuesday farm record books will be available for those desiring to keep records. Beginning inventories will be made, and the method of keeping the records will be explained by Mr. Berg.

Dogs Kill Sheep On Dexter Twp. Farm

Five sheep were killed and one badly injured by dogs one day last week on the John C. Schultz farm in Dexter township.

Mr. Schultz killed one of the animals, which was a large police dog with no license tag. The other dog escaped.

Justice C. D. Johnson of Dexter township was called to the Schultz farm to adjust the loss.

Motorists Warned Not To Follow Fire Truck

As a result of serious irregularities in regard to local traffic when a fire alarm is sounded, Village Marshal Wm. Atkinson issues a warning to those who have continually been guilty of violation of traffic laws at the time of fire in the village.

The Michigan law states that "it shall be unlawful for the driver of any vehicle other than one on official business to follow any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm closer than five hundred feet or to drive in or park such vehicle within one block where fire apparatus has stopped in answer to a fire alarm."

Local firemen have reported that when an alarm is sounded some motorists retard the progress of fire fighting apparatus by preceding the firemen, hesitating and sometimes stopping, thus causing unnecessary delay in reaching the scene of the fire, and at the same time endangering lives of both the motorists and firemen. Some also insist upon following the truck dangerously close.

Mr. Atkinson states that unless the above quoted section of the law is obeyed, prosecutions will result if reported by the firemen.

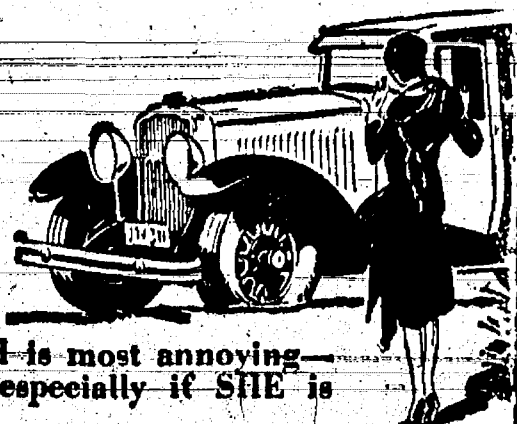
TOWNSHIP BOARD CUTS SNOW SHOVELING RATE

Comfort in Bigness
There Is Improvement
Canaries' Malaria
Radio Fights Poison

Sometimes, when things seem to go wrong, it is a comfort to be reminded that nothing matters very much. If the earth fell toward the sun it would melt like a flake of snow falling on a red-hot stove long before it could reach the sun.

And if, in turn, our gigantic sun, a million times as big as the earth, fell toward some of the really big suns in space, it also would melt before it could reach that sun's surface.

Professor Shapley, with his forehead high and his eyes low down, the best arrangement, tells you that Harvard Observatory has found and measured "about 18,000 new galaxies, each an island universe."

An island universe contains millions of suns. One little group, called the "Large Magellanic," has 200,000 suns, every one 150 times brighter than our sun, and 2,000 suns that are 10,000 times as bright as ours.

Under such circumstances, will you please tell us what difference it makes whether Amenda-copper goes up or down?

It says in Ecclesiastes: "A fool also is full of words; a man cannot tell what shall be."

Nevertheless, men of wisdom tell us that better conditions have started already.

Mr. Lamont, secretary of commerce, sees a distinct upturn in business, and, also important, the conductor of one of the busiest Central Railroad of New Jersey trains says: "I know times are getting better. I can see it in the faces of passengers, business men that have traveled with me for years."

Two thousand scientists gathered at Cleveland continue their contribution of amazing information.

Canary birds have a peculiar malaria of their own. German scientists investigating this disease developed plasmoquin, a drug that cures human beings. The new remedy is a synthetic product, called by chemists "N-diethylaminoisopentyl-8-amino-6-methoxyquinoline," which you should remember in case you want to order some.

Our problems are trifling compared with those of Great Britain. A Labor government that was to find employment for all has twice as many idle men on its hands as when it started, and for nine months of the fiscal year.

Just ended has a deficit of \$103,000,000—\$58,000,000 more than a year ago.

Many have shivered with fear lest a comet should strike the earth.

It probably wouldn't do much harm if it did and you would know nothing about it except that, if a comet did sideways our atmosphere in passing, you would detect a strong smell of almonds.

Science finds in the tails of comets "cyanogen," which has the almond smell.

Bacteriologists are told that violent diphtheria poison, the toxin carrying the disease that has killed so many millions of children, has been successfully attacked by treatment with short radio waves.

These waves, with a frequency of from 80,000,000 to 158,000,000 per second, reduce the strength of the poison by one-half. It is difficult to exaggerate the importance of this scientific announcement.

With flint, bows and arrows and high-powered rifles, such have succeeded after 25,000,000 years in conquering their huge four-footed enemies—tigers, lions and bears. They may be able now to destroy their invisible and infinitely more deadly microscopic enemies with electric projectiles.

While deeply religious believers, knelt in the snow, praying, soldiers of the Russian government tore down a cathedral on the bank of the Indigorka river, making bonfires of sacred pictures, images and vestments of priests. This action of Russia's government comes under the heading worse than a crime—a blunder.

In old days, a man with \$1,000,000 was a "millionaire." That modest phrase no longer means anything. A "millionaire" in the new financial language, is one who has \$1,000,000 more of yearly income.

In 1928, 511 Americans told United States they had incomes of \$1,000,000 or more. Several have \$50,000,000 a year, and at least two or three have more. They represent the beginning of our billionaire class. There are probably six or seven hundred men in the United States worth a billion.

A report of General Foods company for 1930, issued by Colby M. Chester, president, shows that its business increased many millions in 1930 thanks to aggressive advertising, plus good management. And best news of all—no workers have been discharged and no wages reduced.

The man who advertises courageously in a time of depression may see his profits diminish temporarily, but he holds his business and the loss in profit is not as great as it would be without the advertising.

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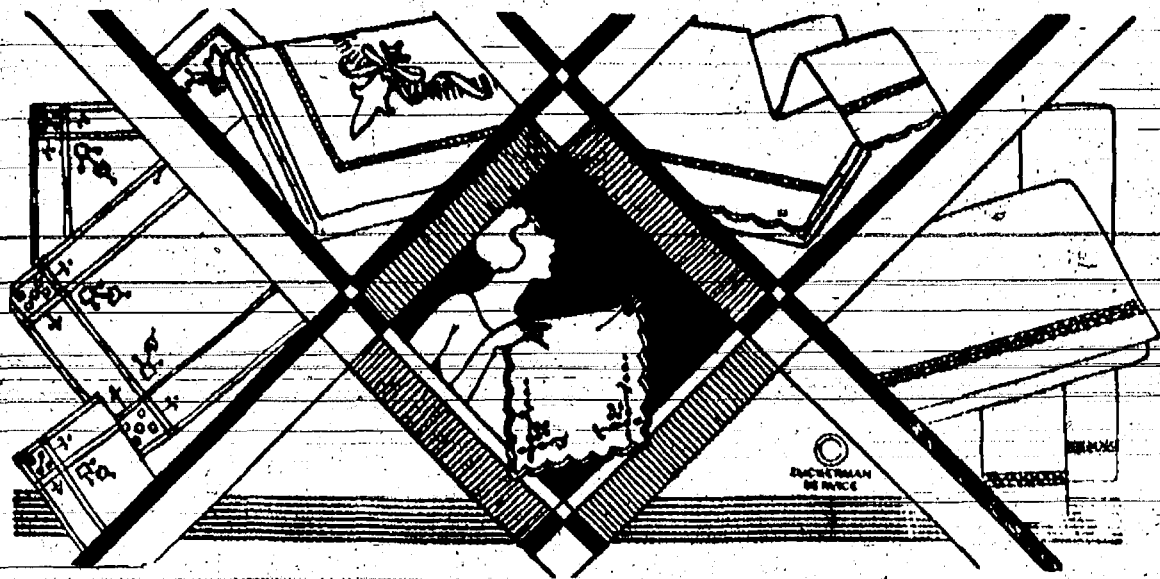

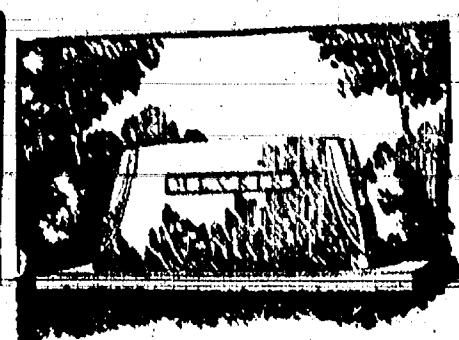

ASK AID IN PROTECTING HEALTH OF CHILDREN

An urgent call to help maintain the health of Michigan children during the present financial emergency has been issued to school officers, parents, teacher associations, and similar organizations by a conference of state health and education groups, meeting here to discuss ways and means of preventing possible lifelong handicaps originating in present-day circumstances.

That school boards may give financial assistance to indigent children so that they can attend school was a significant point made at the meeting by the Department of Public Instruction.

The law giving this authority, passed by the State Legislature in 1927, states in essence that when a child is unable to attend school because his services are required for the support of himself or others, the school board may grant such relief as is necessary to enable the child to attend school during the entire year. It can pay up to \$3.00 a week to the family having such a child, and up to \$6.00 a week for the children of any one family.

Proper food in sufficient quantities to meet the needs of growing boys and girls was seen as a particularly pressing need by the conference. It recommended that "every possible step should be taken to provide in the schools milk and other desirable appropriate foods for all school children, in order to meet any deficiencies which may be present in the child's diet because of straitened financial conditions in the home."

Groups represented at the meeting, including the State Department of Health, State Department of Public Instruction, Michigan Tuberculosis Association, Children's Fund of Michigan, and the state teachers' colleges, pledged themselves to devote as much of their attention as possible during the coming year to child health.

MILAN Three midnight robberies within a week marred the happiness of the holiday season in Milan this year. 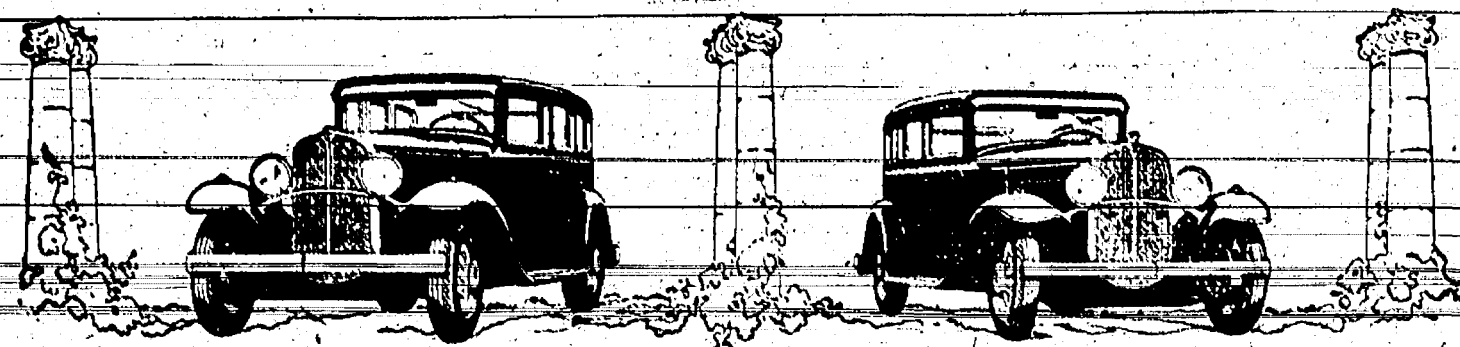

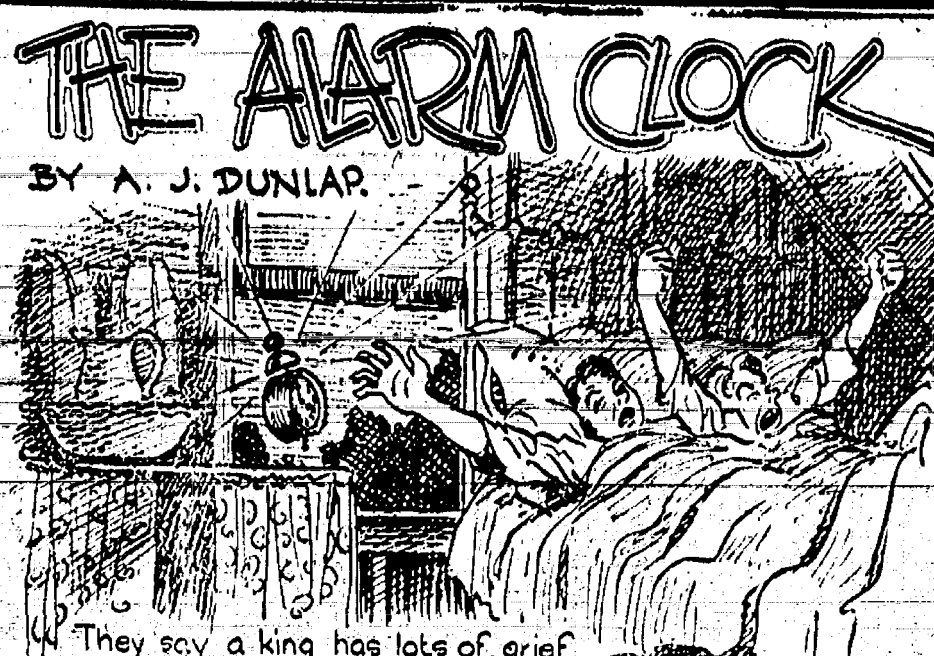

Ans.—The "carpet-baggers" were corrupt and often ignorant politicians—mostly from the North—who flocked to the South during the period of Reconstruction after the Civil war. They were responsible for much of the racial hostility that disgraced that period of the history of the South.

Ques.—I am curious to know why cigars are called by that name?

Ans.—Cigar, of course is Spanish. When tobacco was introduced into Spain from Cuba the Spaniards raised the plant in their gardens which were called cigarrais. When one offered a smoke to a friend he would usually say "Es de mi cigarra," which is "this is from my garden." Hence the English corrupted it into cigar.

Ques.—Can you tell me if sodium chloride is poisonous?

Ans.—No. Sodium chloride is the chemical name of common salt.

Ques.—Will you please tell me in your question department the mottoes of the following states: California, Michigan, Pennsylvania and South Dakota?

Ans.—The mottoes requested are as follows: California is "Eureka," and means "I have found it." Michigan: "Si queris peninsula amicum elegeris," meaning "If thou seekest a beautiful peninsula, behold it here." Pennsylvania: "Obverse: None. Reverse: 'Bath' can't survive." The State Coat of Arms bears the motto "Virtue, Liberty and Independence." South Dakota: "Under God the people Rule."

Ques.—When it is 12 o'clock noon Eastern Standard Time in the United States what time is it in the Philippine Islands?

Ans.—It is exactly 1:04 o'clock in the morning of the following day.

Ques.—How many feet does it take to make a rod, and also how many feet are there in a mile?

Ans.—There are 16 and one half feet to a rod and 5,280 feet to a mile.

Ques.—What is the origin of the custom of having colored eggs for Easter? And why are they called "rabbit's eggs"?

Ans.—This custom originated from the old German legend of a white hen stealing into the house on Easter eve and secreting a number of beautifully colored eggs in odd corners for good little children. Of course, in America the hare is practically unknown, but the custom has been transferred to the rabbit, its nearest relation. Hence colored eggs are popularly referred to as "rabbit's eggs."

Ques.—Is there such a thing as a flying fish? Or is it a myth?

Ans.—Yes. There are about twenty species, but they do not have wings, as you might suppose. They can sustain themselves for a limited time in the air by means of their large pectoral fins, and can pass through the air sometimes as much as 200 yards, which it does to escape from the attacks of other fishes. Their velocity is acquired in the water when it will suddenly emerge and soar through the air, giving the appearance of a fish flying. Hence they are called flying fish.

Ques.—What is the value of a Russian ruble in United States money?

Ans.—The ruble is a fraction over 50 cents in United States money.

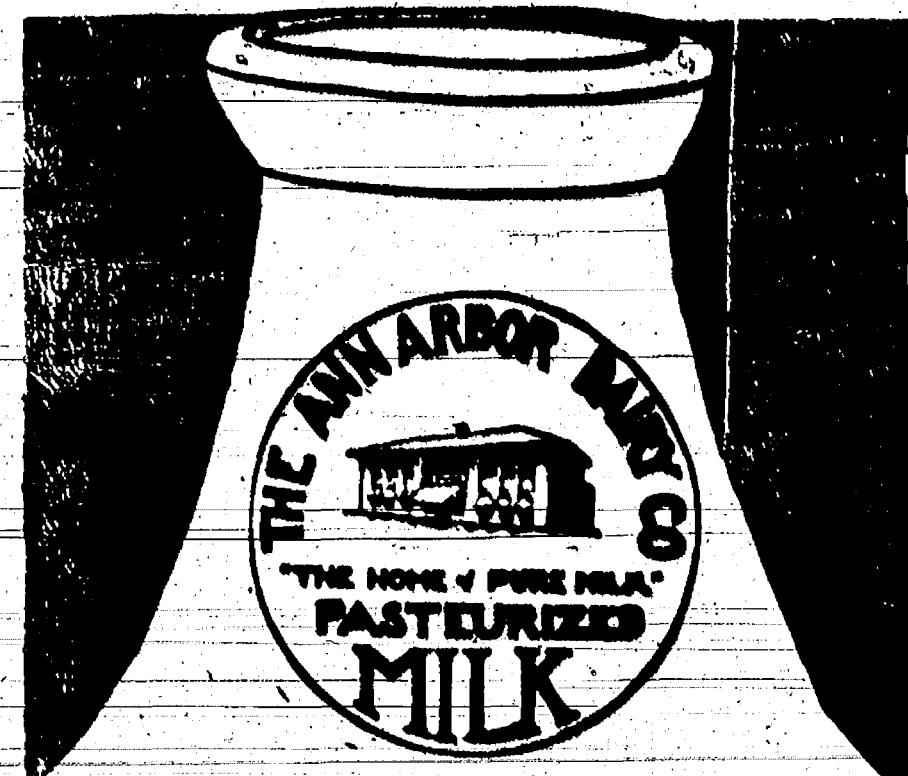

Michigan Happenings

Every inch of the 114,000 square feet of exhibition space available at the forthcoming national aircraft show has been sold. Ray Cooper, manager of the Detroit Board of Commerce aircraft bureau, announced in that city. The show does not open until April 11. It will be held in the municipal hangar at Detroit city airport and will continue until April 19. The hangar provides a total floor space of 200,000 square feet and during the show only 86,000 square feet will be reserved for commercial ships regularly stored there.

Mrs. Frances Van Dam was boss in her home, Judge John Vanderwerf decided at Muskegon, and her husband had little to say. As a result, Mrs. Van Dam must serve seven months to two years in the Detroit House of Correction for violating the liquor law. The husband, arrested on the same charge, was placed on probation and will remain at home with the three children. "I am certain you rule the home and your husband has little to say, so I am sending you and not him to prison," the judge said in passing sentence.

According to the Conservation Department at Lansing, Mrs. Vivian Hepler, of Battle Creek, was the only woman hunter to be arrested for a deer law violation in 1930. The deer was found by conservation officers, hanging by the camp where Mrs. Hepler was staying, and noting that it bore no seal, they investigated and discovered that the deer was killed before Mrs. Hepler obtained her license. She pleaded guilty to the charge when arraigned in court in Muskegon and was fined \$50, with costs of \$7.

A group of six Port Huron high school seniors have been elected to the Port Huron chapter of the national high school honor society, the selection being based on scholarship, character, service and leadership. The group includes Margaret Phyllis, Helen Treffery, Margaret Tiesie, Edward Gaines, Fred Kaine, and Neil Davis. Members of the Michigan chapter of the society will initiate the Port Huron students on January 9 in the Port Huron high school.

Work on the deepening of the Saginaw river channel will begin early in the spring. It was indicated at Bay City after announcement that Saginaw banks had underwritten one-third of the expense of dredging, their share amounting to \$100,000. A government appropriation of \$800,000 will be available for this work in 1932, but by means of the loan, work will begin at once. The deepening will enable lake steamers to navigate the river.

A Watervliet youth was shot and killed by one of two Negro bandits as he ran to the rescue of a South Bend couple who had been kidnapped by the bandits and brought to Watervliet in an automobile. The bandits were under arrest. The youth was Victor Moser, 19-year-old, who was graduated from Watervliet High School last June after winning local recognition as an athlete.

Daisy Morrell was paroled from prison the day before Christmas by Governor Fred W. Green but she has been given a terrible handicap—for a woman. She must never enter a store unless accompanied by her husband. Mrs. Morrell was serving a four-to-five year sentence imposed in 1928 in Flint on a charge of shoplifting. It was her second offense.

Two youths who cut Christmas trees without permission on the farm of Percy Denlow, 16 miles northwest of Adrian, paid costs of \$3.75 each when brought before A. J. Allen, Clinton, justice of the peace. The youths, Charles Billings and Shirley Still, both of Springville, pleaded guilty to destruction of property. They also paid for the trees.

The report of the board of public works shows that the Niles municipal electric plant in November made a profit of \$14,000, bringing the surplus in the electric fund to nearly \$150,000. The common council recently declined the offer of the American Gas & Electric Co. of \$1,100,000 for the plant.

The Rev. A. G. Spiegel, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church at Abdon, escaped with an involuntary bath in the Kalamazoo river, when his car skidded off the road and onto the ice. When he tried to drive back to shore, the car broke through the ice.

Pile destroyed the Charlevoix Lumber Co. plant and threatened several adjoining structures. The blizzard, which started in the dry kilns, was fanned by a strong wind. The loss was placed at \$50,000, partly covered by insurance.

Ray Johnson, a Grand Rapids salesman, whose automobile was taken to police headquarters early in the year because he ignored four parking tags, was assessed \$50 and costs by Police Judge Frank A. Hess when he admitted that he had failed to settle for six more tags.

Surrounded by their children and grandchildren, the Rev. C. C. Garrett, retired Methodist minister, of Durand, and his wife, who have devoted more than 50 years of their life to religious work, celebrated the 65th anniversary of their marriage recently. Rev. Mr. Garrett has held pastorates in Cheaning, Oakley, Davidson, Swartz Creek, Ventura, Coopersville, and Shelby, building new churches in the last named towns. In 1911, Rev. and Mrs. Garrett came to Durand, but a few years later, he retired due to poor health.

As an emergency measure, the Royal Oak city commission decided to allow all delinquent taxes to be paid until Feb. 1 without penalty or interest. The commission hopes by this method to raise the percentage of taxes collected, as an aid in borrowing more money needed to operate the city. Some taxpayers will save as much as 11 per cent interest, it was pointed out by R. J. Whitney, city manager. The loss of penalties and interest will not seriously affect the budget for the year, he said.

In its annual report the Detroit Police Department Dog Pound shows that 30,513 dogs were picked up on the city streets during 1930. Of that number 17,169 were killed, because no one claimed them; 4,829 were sold and eight escaped. The balance were returned to their owners. The amount realized from sales was \$21,723.50. According to the report of the mounted division of the Detroit Police Department, that division impounded nine horses and caught five runaway dogs during the year.

Ruling a billiard cannot be held on a body warrant for failure to satisfy a judgment in a damage suit, Circuit Judge Clarence M. Browne, of Sackville, freed Frank C. Santino, 14 years old, who has been a prisoner at the city detention home since Nov. 19. The boy was committed to the detention home by Judge James E. McDonald, in Municipal Court, at the request of an automobile accident insurance company, which had obtained a judgment of \$1,500 against him.

Final population figures for Jackson, issued by the Census Bureau at Washington, have enabled that city to pass Kalamazoo among Michigan municipalities and take eighth place. The count now accorded Jackson is 55,187, while Kalamazoo, in ninth place, has 54,786. The population of Jackson County as finally recorded is 92,303, representing a gain of 20,000 in the last 10 years. The gain of Jackson in the last decade, however, was only 7,000.

Receivers for the Goodrich Transit Co. will continue operation of the steamer Alabama between Chicago and Muskegon throughout the winter. It was announced at Muskegon. Plans had been made to discontinue operations for the winter, but Muskegon shippers protested. The Alabama is one of the few boats able to break the heavy ice in the Muskegon harbor and if it had not operated it is likely the harbor would have been closed to all shipping.

An epithet that William Johnson of Moss City, applied to Judge George O. Driscoll, of Ironwood, in the Ononagon Circuit Court, will cost Johnson two years in the Michigan State Prison at Jackson. As Johnson was being led from court, he applied the epithet to the judge, adding, "He certainly landed me a Christmas present." Judge Driscoll overheard the remark, returned to the bench and made Johnson's sentence three to ten years.

Benjamin Noel, a Primary Township farmer, collected bounty at Escanaba on a big white she-wolf shot on northern rim of Delta County. The wolf measured over six feet from tip in tip and stood waist high. Noel said it looked as big as a heifer coming toward him out of a swamp at dusk. His shot broke the wolf's back, bounties paid at Escanaba on wolves and coyotes average more than one a day.

Three men failed in an attempt to rob the office of the Hart & Howell Popcorn Co. in Brooklyn. One of the bandits struck Roland Lovelace, an employee, in the face. Lovelace picked up a piece of timber and knocked out one of his assailants with a blow on the head. The unconscious bandit was dragged from the office by one of his companions and they, with another who had remained in the car, fled.

A peanut which lodged in her throat caused the death of Donna Phillips, two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Phillips, Jackson. The child was taken to a hospital and the peanut was promptly removed, but complications followed, causing her death.

Albert Yates, of Sparrowville, sentenced at Port Huron to serve 30 days in jail for stealing a car and an automobile.

Hurtled through the windshield of the car in which they were riding, and then through the front window of the home of Daniel Vlascher, two miles south of Kalamazoo, Ray Spencer, 27 years old, and Miss Gladys Carlton, both of Kalamazoo, are in a hospital, where their injuries are being treated.

George Borgen of Trimountain lost his automobile, gun and spent 60 days in jail for hunting partridges without license in the closed season.

MICHIGAN BELL HEAD ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR 1931

PRESIDENT FORAKER SAYS YEAR'S EXPANSION IS ENGINEERED ON BASIS THAT CONDITIONS WILL IMPROVE

NEW PLANT PLANNED WILL APPROXIMATE \$22,000,000

MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION WILL COST LIKE AMOUNT. PROGRAM ADDS MATERIALLY TO INDUSTRY OF STATE

The Michigan Bell Telephone company has planned for 1931 an expenditure of approximately \$22,000,000 for new construction, Burch Foraker, president of the company, announces. This work has been engineered on the basis that business and industrial conditions will improve as the year 1931 advances.

The contemplated expenditure will be made from new capital, entirely for new plant and equipment, Mr. Foraker said, and he expects the program will be followed unless conditions unforeseen arise.

In addition to the construction expenditures for new telephone plant planned for 1931, there will be spent approximately \$22,500,000 for maintenance and operation of the company's service in Michigan, making total expected expenditures of approximately \$44,500,000.

The telephone program engineered for this year includes the completion of new buildings at various points, construction of additional long distance lines and cable, and installation of considerable direct central office apparatus and other exchange equipment, for the purpose of extending facilities and further improving the present high grade of service.

Building construction planned for 1931, will cost, including sites, \$1,000,000, and new central office and subscribers' telephone equipment will cost \$1,400,000. New exchange plant expenditures planned will total \$6,100,000, including \$1,125,000 for pole lines, \$1,500,000 for aerial cable, \$1,600,000 for aerial wire, \$685,000 for underground conduit, and \$1,685,000 for underground and aerial cable.

Long distance telephone plant on erection projects, contemplated total \$1,000,000, including \$300,000 for additional circuits in stormproof cable. Material requirements for the year under this program will include 41,000 poles, 500,000 pounds of bare copper wire, 3,400,000 feet of wire strand, 1,175,000 feet of clay conduit, 25,000 crossarms, and 1,601,000,000 conductor feet of wire in cable.

It is planned to place new central offices in service during 1931 at Saginaw, Genoa Harbor, Big Rapids, Detroit, Scottville, and Escanaba, large additions to local exchange facilities are contemplated at many points, among them being Detroit, Ann Arbor, Battle Creek, Grand Rapids, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Ypsilanti, Bay City, Saginaw and Marquette. Among the long distance facilities projects under consideration are the building of a cable between Saginaw and Reese, and completion of that now under construction between Grand Rapids and Big Rapids.

The Michigan Bell company now has 678,000 telephones in service, of which 292,000, or 42.5 per cent, are direct-dial. A net gain of 25,000 in the number of telephones in service is anticipated during the next twelve months.
