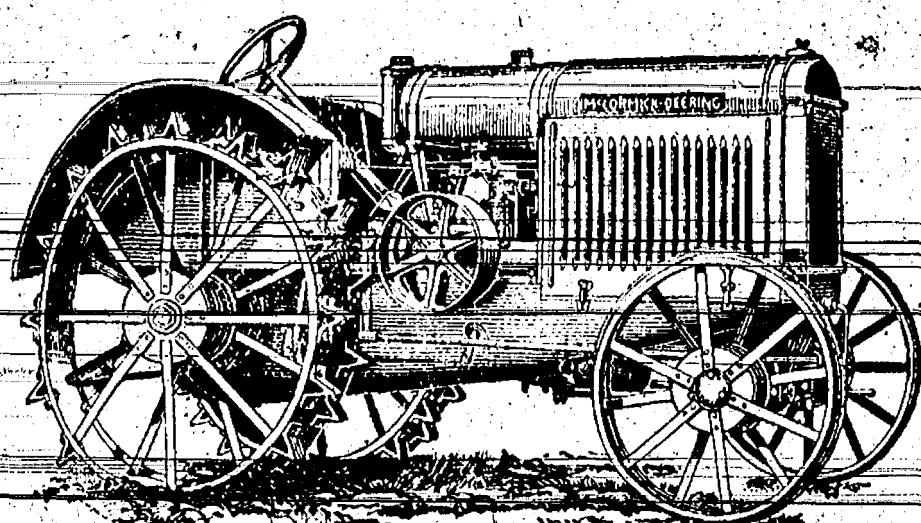

Sylvan Taxpayers

Public Acts 1929; Act Number 61 The People of the State of Michigan Enact:

Section Ninety-five of Chapter Sixteen of the Revised Statutes of Eighteen Hundred Forty-six, entitled "Of the powers and duties of townships and the election and duties of township officers," being Section Two Thousand, One Hundred Fifty-four of the Compiled Laws of Nineteen Hundred Fifteen as last amended by Act Number One Hundred Ninety-seven of the Public Acts of Nineteen Hundred Twenty-five, is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 95. The following township officers shall be entitled to compensation at the following rates for each day of ten hours actually and necessarily devoted by them to the service of the township in the duties of their respective offices, to be verified by affidavit, whenever required by the township boards:

First, the officers composing the township boards, board of registration, board of health, board of review, inspectors of election, clerks of the poll and commissioners of highways; five dollars per day and at the same rate for parts of days.

Second, the supervisor for taking the assessment and for all services not connected with above boards, five dollars per day and at the same rate for parts of days; provided, that any township having at least one thousand and four hundred separate descriptions of real property on its assessment roll and having a total assessed valuation of at least five million dollars, may, by resolution of its board, provide for a salary to its supervisor, of not to exceed twelve hundred dollars per annum.

Such resolution shall not be effective until it has been approved by a majority of the electors of said township voting thereon by ballot, at any regular township election, or at any special election called for that purpose. All votes on the question of approving such a resolution shall be taken, counted and canvassed in the same manner as votes cast for candidates voted for at said election in said township.

The vote upon the question of approving such a resolution shall be by ballot which shall be in substantially the following form:

The township clerk, as clerk of the board of commissioners of highways and of the township board of five dollars per day and at the same rate for parts of days; but no township officer shall be entitled to pay for acting in more than one capacity at the same time. Approved April 18, 1929.

PUBLISH LARGE BOOK

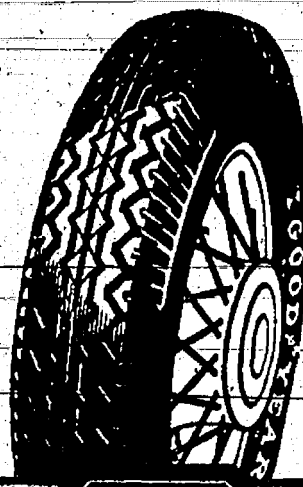

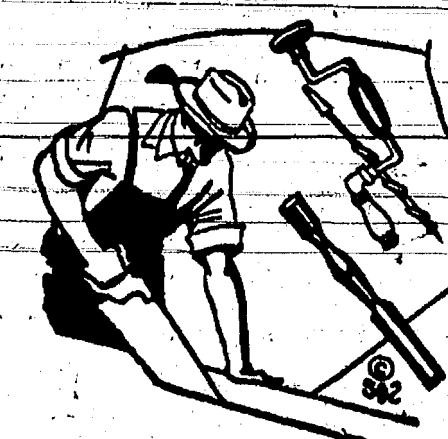

Despite High Finance
Ladies Hear About Russia
Two Engineers
Beautiful Women

Los Angeles—In spite of objections from highest financial authority, including Secretary Mellon, the senate and house approves overwhelmingly the bill to let veterans borrow one-half the value of their war certificates. If they borrow one-half, Uncle Sam will have to pay out more than \$1,500,000,000, and high finance says that will be ruinous.

As a rule, "big money," which means ability, should receive respectful attention, as does the captain of a ship. But high finance is sometimes mistaken. Big bankers said the federal reserve system would rule the country, because it kept a few men from controlling all the money. They were wrong. Without the federal reserve this country would have had a black panic long ago. They may be wrong in their idea that handling a billion dollars to those that need it, and carried it, will ruin us now.

American holy patriots, listening here for three hours are assured that Russia threatens our institutions, and this land is practically the last refuge of good government, as opposed to Red Russian ideas. Doctor Patton of California went to Russia, "to find the secret police," went just wherever he pleased, and saw things behind the scenes that Americans less intelligent never see. He saw young girls standing in bread lines "with babies born illegitimately under this Soviet system." He saw "wild children, offspring of free love, functioning by the Soviet system, running around, until they were killed by peasants by village and their bodies buried."

In his introduction to the writings of George Washington prepared for next year's two hundredth anniversary, President Hoover says Washington's engineering ability has never been fully appreciated.

Washington's methods were surprisingly modern. He reclaimed the dismal swamp in Virginia, was adviser and engineer on the Potomac and James River canal and first to make a combined highway and waterway from the Atlantic coast to the Ohio river.

The President describes his predecessor as "the most potent human intellectual force in the firmament of American intellect."

George Washington was the first engineer to occupy the White House. President Hoover is the second.

Hermosillo, Capital of Sonora, Mex. The Indian word Hermosillo means "little beauty," and his excellency, Francisco Elias, governor of this state, says it applies to the city and to each woman in it. On the streets, in stores, or at work in government offices, you see beautiful young girls. There is not a bobbed head or a shaved neck among them. Their dark hair falls naturally curly, loose on their shoulders and necks. Sometimes fastened with a ribbon. Their eyelids are lowered demurely, but when a young rancher from California asks one of them a question and she raises her eyes, his carefully prepared Spanish words are driven from his mind.

This is a beautiful old city, one of the most important and progressive in Mexico. The soil is so fertile that even with dry-farming of wheat it yields ninety bushels of crop for one bushel of sown seed. A soil expert sent by the British government to seek land for corn growing reported that the area west of Hermosillo has the fertility of the Nile valley.

The state and federal governments concentrate on three things—education of children, building good roads, and employment for the idle—while waiting for new schools. Governor Elias leases the biggest private houses available, turning them into schools. Six hundred children go to school in one such building, 300 in another.

Americans discuss an international highway from Canada through Mexico to the Panama canal, and perhaps on to Tierra del Fuego. That is pleasant talk. But in the meanwhile Governor Elias has gigantic machines scattered between Hermosillo and Nogales, 17 miles, and will have that road finished in a year or less. If he can get modern road machinery. Giant tractors and grading machines could be seen at work on the new highway south recently, hundreds of men with stump pullers and blasting material working ahead of the road machinery.

Doctor McGeehee, chemist at Emory university, Atlanta, says copper and iron in milk will correct anemic conditions because those two metals "taken in metallized milk, regenerate hemoglobin."

For a long time doctors have known that red blood corpuscles, consisting chiefly of iron, contain also a trace of copper.

This was long thought to be more or less accidental and unimportant. Now it is known to be necessary. Every plumber can tell the doctors what active results ensue when you put copper and iron together, as in attaching brass pipes to an iron furnace.

ADVERTISING THE DRIVE WHEEL TO BETTER BUSINESS

Roger W. Babson, the great writer on financial subjects recommends more advertising to encourage buying. When the surplus of mass production is consumed by mass consumption the retailers will begin to buy more from the wholesale merchant. Then the wholesale merchant will order from the factories. Then the factory wheels will turn to produce more and raw products will be needed.

Advertising is ideally fitted and competent to accelerate the circulation. It is the most effective known force for accomplishing the speeding up of money and thereby giving us more business at times when more business is the nation's greatest need.

There never was more money than there is today. Banks hold it, corporations hold it, the people hold it. That is the trouble, the money is held instead of circulated. A beautiful system of piping, a plentiful supply of fluid, but the whole mechanism fails to function for the want of the pumping power of publicity to tell the world of better goods, lower prices and greater service. We need a sound plan to reduce the choppy action of business and promote smoothness and steadiness of growth.

Advertising is the sorely needed governor of business. It requires no novel mechanism. All the apparatus is available. Though capable of unlimited improvement, the fundamental principles of advertising are clearly established, its practices is a well-known art.

The basic cause at which the jobless should shake their fists is not that too few mills are running, but that too few advertising campaigns are running.—Wm. A. Summerhill, Editor Record, Penns Grove, New Jersey.

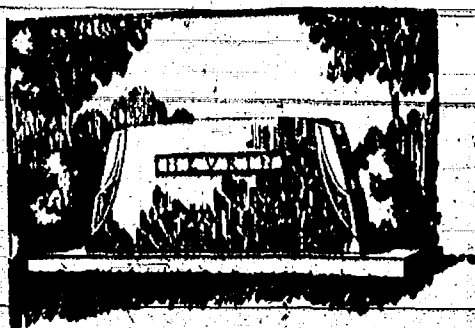

Baker of Royal Oak, \$92,144.50; J. A. Morel of Detroit, \$92,173.75; Cement Concrete Company of Birmingham, \$92,807.67. This includes the strip in the village on Tecumseh street which runs right around \$7,000.

Moose Calf Born To Cow In Minnesota

In an article appearing in the *Beulah* (Minn.) *Sentinel* last Friday, is told the unusual story of a moose calf being born to a Holstein cow near that place. The article, in part, is as follows:—

Details regarding the birth of a moose calf to a high grade Holstein cow belonging to Charles Link of the weather vicinity have been received by this paper in response to an inquiry addressed to Mr. Link and are indeed interesting. In fact, that unusual happening was considered of such importance that a group of Michigan men have bought the moose calf and plan to take it on an exhibition tour later.

Mr. Link reports that on Monday morning, February 2, he went to his barn just at daybreak to take care of his cows. Opening the door he saw about ten feet ahead of him what he thought to be a young nude standing erect and looking straight at him. The investigation he was at first unable to make out what it was. One of his helpers had freshened during the night but he could hardly believe she had given birth to this "fawful looking" creature which was there. The mother would not own the calf and had to have her legs strapped at feeding time. The calf would have gladly accepted any of the cows in the herd as his mother but no cow would have it around. In fact, when the calf bawled it sounded somewhat like a deer when it is badly wounded, only its voice was coarser.

If it took a spell to bawl at milking time, it had to be put out of the barn so the cows could be milked. On different occasions the biggest hunk of lumber when the moose calf started to bawl. All of the old timers who live in that community and have seen young moose from the time they were born to all stages of their life all agreed it was a perfect moose except that it had a white spot on its side about six inches long by two inches in width and white spots on all four legs. Otherwise it had the color of a moose and antlers were already starting to grow on its head.

Note: The paper was received by M. L. Turkhart, whose summer resort property is located near Beulah.

Milk Producers Fight To Keep Local Station

Considerable worry and anxiety was caused the farmers and milk producers of this locality when they received notice that the Ebling Creamery Co. would close their station at Chelsea on February 28.

They intimated in their notice that they would continue to take the milk produced by Chelsea members of the Michigan Milk Producers' Association if it were delivered to their stations at Saline or Grass Lake.

As the cost of all haulage from the producer to the distributor in Detroit comes out of the producer, it would cost the producers considerably more in their pick-up trucks had to haul to Grass Lake or Saline, and they pay tank truck haulage from there to Detroit.

A meeting of the Chelsea Association was called at Sylvan town hall on Thursday afternoon, February 19, which was largely attended by the local producers and by Mr. Hendrickson of Michigan Milk Producers' Association where it developed that the principal reason for the Ebling Creamery Co. closing their Chelsea and Dexter stations was not the extra expense caused by operating so many small collecting stations, so much as it was by the overproduction of milk at surplus having to be manufactured by distributors into other products and sold at less profit to distributors.

On Friday, Harry Knickerbocker, President, George E. Chapman, Vice President of the local Association, and H. D. Witherell, A. G. Hindelang and M. H. McGalligan of the Kiwanis club, went to Detroit and interviewed officials of the Michigan Milk Producers' Association, Ebling Creamery Co. and other distributors and offered to contribute part of the extra expense of hauling to Grass Lake or Saline toward the overhead expense of the local station in order to keep the local collecting station, all of which comes out of the producer.

It is reported that the National Association, under which distributors are working, made about \$25,000,000 in 1930 and this whole question seems to resolve itself into the same old theory "All the middle men must have their profit," which must be added to the cost of the consumer or deducted from the price paid the producer with very little, if any, regard to the cost of production.

It is hoped that some agreement can be made to retain the local station and also secure for local producers a price nearer compensate with the cost to the consumer.

WAYNE The huge Christmas tree still blooms so nicely in the Wayne village green. Christmas last year occurred on the 25th of December. If we remember rightly. Someone has suggested that in view of the present economic depression the tree be permitted to stand until next Yuletide. It probably will have sprouted roots by that time and we can use it perpetually. 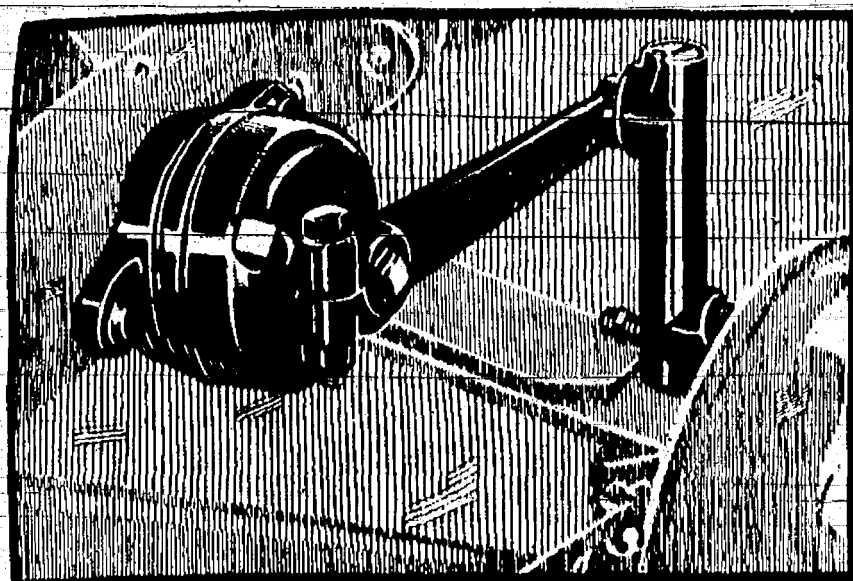

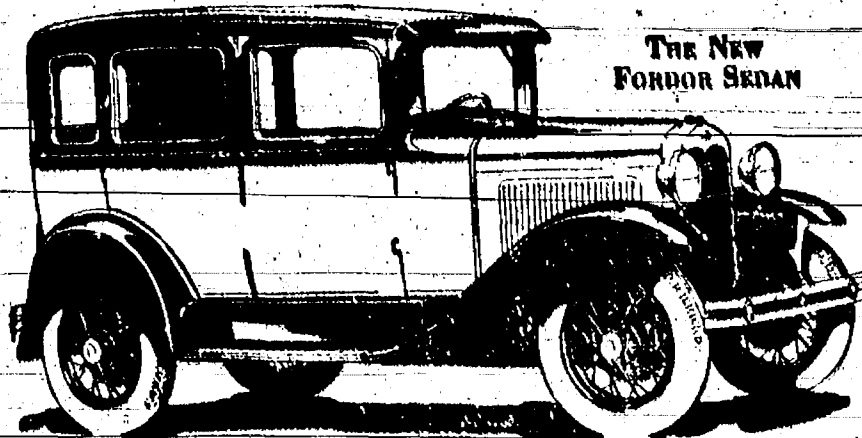

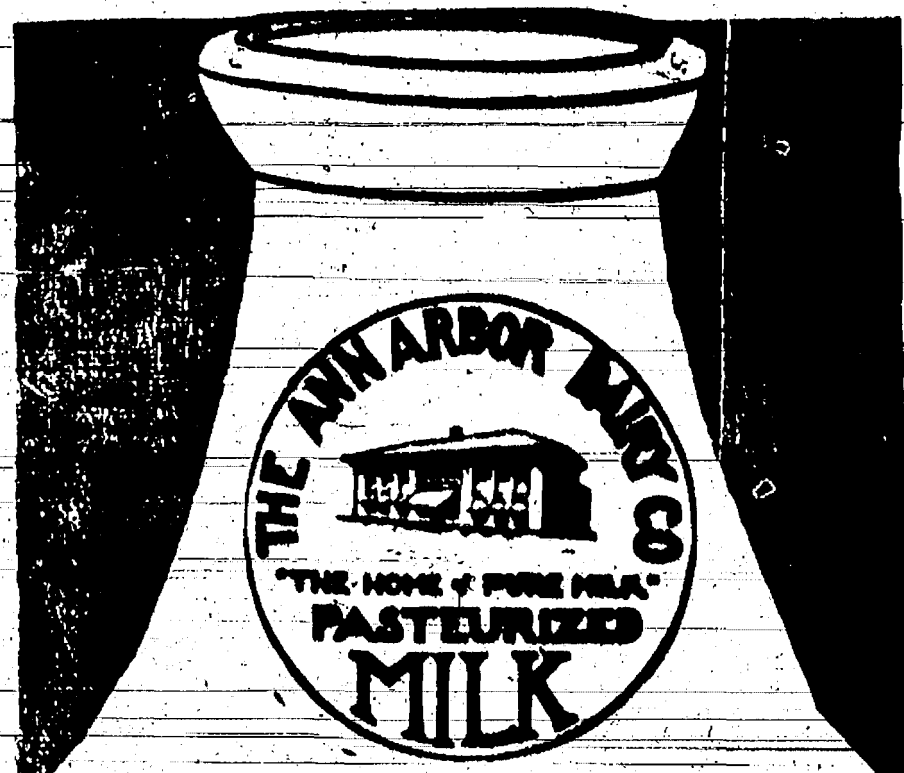
