Chelsea Stores Will Close Decoration Day

That the respect and honor paid our dead, practically all business in Chelsea will be suspended on Saturday, Decoration Day. Those who have passed on, whether they died in the tumult of battle or in the peace of their home are entitled to the respect of everyone on Memorial Day. With this sense of duty in mind, a petition was circulated by interested business men during the past few days in an effort to have Chelsea business men close their stores as is being done in other surrounding towns and cities.

The result is that nearly all stores will be closed. Groceries and meat markets will be open until 9 o'clock in the morning, most of the other lines of business having announced their intention of remaining closed for the entire day. All business places, with the exception of the banks, will be open Friday night.

In order that the usual results will be forthcoming from advertising, The Standard is being mailed on the rural routes Thursday morning and is being distributed in the village earlier in the day for the benefit of everyone doing their usual Saturday buying on Friday and Friday night.

Former Chelsea Man Accidentally Killed

Albert H. Bauer, 28, formerly of Chelsea, died Friday, May 22, from wounds sustained when he accidentally discharged a shotgun while at work on his farm in Ann Arbor township.

Mr. Bauer, who had been planting corn during the morning, went to the house for his gun about 11 o'clock and started toward a flock of sheep that had been molested by dogs.

It is believed that he stumbled, causing the gun to discharge. The shot entered his chest.

Mr. Bauer was found by his brother-in-law, when he failed to return home at noon. Coroner Edwin C. Ganzhorn, who was called, decided an inquest was unnecessary.

Mr. Bauer was the son of George and Lydia (Bristle) Bauer, and was born in Chelsea, May 28, 1902. Following his marriage to Grace Hadley on May 12, 1928, they made their home in Chelsea until their removal last November to the Smith farm in Ann Arbor township.

Surviving are the widow, two daughters, Violet, aged three years, and Geraldine, three months; his parents, three brothers, George, Edwin and Earl, of Chelsea, and three sisters, Mrs. Clarence Hindover and Miss Lily Bauer of Chelsea, and Mrs. Chas. Mosher of Ann Arbor.

Funeral services, conducted by Rev. P. H. Gracowski, were held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the Star-fair funeral home in Ann Arbor. Interment was at Arboreost cemetery.

Katherine Outwater Receives 4-H Honors

Miss Katherine Outwater, leader and member of the Lima 4-H Food Study and Canning clubs, has been accorded one of the highest honors that a 4-H club member can attain in the United States. She has been selected as one of the two girls of the state of Michigan who will represent the state, with the two boys representatives, at the National 4-H Club Camp at Washington, D. C., which opens Wednesday, June 17 to Tuesday, June 28. At the present time Miss Outwater is a freshman in the home economics course at Michigan State College.

She was selected on her all-around club work, which she has carried on since the fall of 1928 when she joined the Delhi clothing club under the leadership of Miss Mildred Walsh. She has made an enviable record as far as individual honors are concerned, but her leadership work is what has brought her this state and national recognition.

Miss Outwater's leadership work was started in 1928 when she organized a canning and food study club in Lima township. She was the Washtenaw county nominee for this National Club Camp trip in 1929, but was not successful in winning the trip at that time. In 1929 she took part in the Farm Journal National 4-H Club Leadership contest. In 1928 she, and Louise Pleinmeyer, a member of her club, won first place in food study demonstration work in the state and county contests, winning a trip to the National Club Congress, Chicago, that year.

Last year she won the Ann Arbor Daily News 4-H Club Leader's cup for the most proficient leader in summer 4-H club work—in 1929. She holds this cup at the present time and will continue to hold it until the contest closes for 1931.

The National 4-H Club Camp was organized in 1927. This will be the 5th year of the encampment, and Washtenaw county has been represented with a state delegate three out of the five years. Since there are only four representatives each year, that gives Washtenaw county three delegates out of 20 that have gone to this National Camp. The other Washtenaw delegates were Laura Gale, in 1927, and Raymond Girbach in 1928. Part of Katherine's expenses to the camp will be paid by the Michigan Central and Pennsylvania railroads.
