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

## Contracts Awarded For Two Highways

Two contracts for the construction of gravel roads were awarded Friday by the Washtenaw county road commission in their weekly session. The road group awarded the contract for the construction of three-quarters of a mile of the Townline road in Lima township. The bid was for \$3,500.00, and was submitted by Frank Brown & Sons of Flatrock. The second contract awarded was for the construction of 1.9 miles of the Stockbridge road in Lyndon township, and the contractors will be the B. H. Shaw Co. of Birmingham.

The road committee of the Washtenaw county board of supervisors met with the commission and discussed plans for dust layer operations this summer. The amount appropriated for road oil this year was \$70,000. The Shaw company moved their equipment to the Lyndon road on Tuesday.
