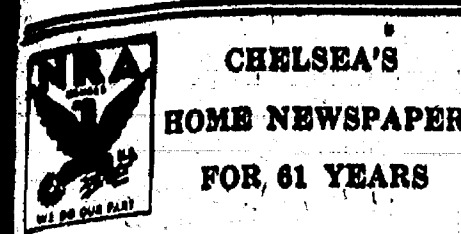

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More Speed Shown In New Farm Loans

Loans to Michigan farmers through the St. Paul Federal Land Bank are being speeded up along with the loans in other districts, according to Henry Morgenthau, Jr., in charge of farm credit, who points out that \$810,700 was loaned by the St. Paul Bank during September.

Loans made by the Land Banks for that month were nearly one-half of the total amount loaned in the whole of 1932. Applications for federal farm loans piled up in such quantities immediately following the liberalization of the loan policy that the banks did not have the facilities nor the personnel to handle them.

The first step to catch up with the volume of business was to enlarge the force of appraisers, who must inspect the farm before a loan can be made. That has now been done and the accumulated applications are rapidly being considered. More appraisers are added as rapidly as competent men can be found.

Two types of loans are made on farm property. The first is a first mortgage which can be for an amount equal to one-half the normal value of the land plus one-fifth of the value of the buildings. In some cases, an additional loan can be obtained direct from the commissioner with a second mortgage on the land and chattel mortgages on farm property as security. The total of the two types of loans can not exceed three-fourths of the normal value of the property offered as security.

Federal farm credit can not relieve the financial difficulties of all farmers because the law demands that the loans be secured with a certain amount of property. Interpretations of this law have been as liberal as possible and the interest rates charged are low.

It has been found possible in some cases to get the creditors of individual farmers to discount their claims enough to permit their payment with the government loans when it would have been impossible to afford financial relief if all creditors demanded the last penny.

Land Bank funds are obtained by the sale of bonds in the open market and the public will not buy bonds which they believe are not secured by good collateral. Farm land at normal values is first class collateral, but farm mortgages based on boom values are not good security today for bonds.

NAVY DAY

October 27

In times of world-wide perplexity and disturbance such as these, it seems particularly appropriate and pertinent that the American people should exhibit a deep interest in their navy and its possible effectiveness for the defense of our land and the upholding of our national dignity.

And so we approach Navy Day, Friday, October 27, anniversary of the birth of the American Navy, with a sincere recommendation that everyone participate in its observance. On that day the thoughts of patriotic and loyal Americans will be directed toward a consideration not only of the glorious deeds of our navy in war-time and peace, its historic records, its strength and effectiveness, but of its present and future needs if we are to maintain our respect in the eyes of other nations.

Throughout the land, observance of the day will be proclaimed and urged by governors and mayors. The flag will be displayed, public exercises will be held, appropriate programs will be presented in the schools and before club organizations, and other things will be done under the sponsorship of Veterans and other patriotic associations for the purpose of honoring our navy and its men.

Incidentally, October 27 also will be the anniversary of the birth of Theodore Roosevelt, staunch friend and builder of the American navy, and a proponent of preparedness on sea as the first line of national defense.

Navy Day Proclamation

WHEREAS, Friday, October 27th, has been designated as Navy Day, the anniversary of the establishment of the American Navy by the Continental Congress in 1775; and

WHEREAS, This day will be observed by the citizens of this Country, as a tribute to the past and present services, which the Navy of the United States has rendered to the Nation during one hundred and fifty-eight years, and to the men who have responded in times of peril to the call to arms, and who stand ready at all times to defend with their lives, if necessary, the ideals and institutions of this great country;

THEREFORE, be it resolved, that J. E. McKune, President of the Village of Chelsea, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the law, do designate Friday, October 27, 1933, as "Navy Day," and urge that appreciation of the loyal services of the Navy be shown by a display of the National Colors, and that appropriate exercises be held to commemorate the occasion.

Board To Eliminate Unfair Practices

Washington—The purpose of the newly organized Committee on Unfair Trade Practices in Production and Distribution is to eliminate unfair trade practices, particularly between buyer and seller and between producer and distributor. The committee was appointed by Gerald Swope, chairman of the Business Advisory and Planning Council, and is composed of nationally known commercial authorities. The chairman is Lincoln Filene, chairman of William Filene Sons Co., of Boston.

"Business men," Filene said, "have an opportunity to begin a process of house cleaning which, over the years, will certainly make for more profitable business. Unfair business practices are of two kinds, those that occur between competitors and those that affect buyer and seller." The work of the committee will be confined at first to the latter field, which heretofore has not been covered by any organized study on a large scale. Mr. Filene expressed the belief that unfair practices of this sort have created wastes amounting to millions of dollars annually.

The huge sum, the committee chairman feels, must be saved to the public, as it will tend to keep prices within a reasonable level. "The public," he said, "has not the least conception of how serious the problem is and to what extent these practices appear in the guise of more or less established business customs."

The committee will make use of data collected in NRA code hearings and will cooperate with NRA code enforcement agencies.

WEEKLY NEWS BULLETIN

Lansing, Mich.—The Department of State in the past few weeks has granted articles of incorporation to five new companies which have been formed for the purpose of borrowing money from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, and then lending the funds to industrial companies.

The new corporations, organized under Michigan laws, will come under new federal laws which allow Reconstruction Finance Corporation funds to be loaned with so-called "slow assets" as security. The new companies are located in Detroit, Grand Rapids, Saginaw and Jackson.

While it is understood generally that there will be a special session of the legislature before January 1, the exact date will not be set until the liquor control sub-committee of the legislative council has completed a tentative bill to be submitted to the solons. At least two weeks longer will be required to draft the bill, members of the sub-committee say. From testimony given at the committee's hearings, a wide difference of opinion regarding the best proposed method to distribute liquor is to be found in different parts of the state.

Funeral services were held last week for Burton F. Browne, first director of the gasoline tax division of the Department of State. For many years Mr. Browne was editor of the Harbor Beach newspaper and when Michigan adopted the gasoline tax, he was placed in charge of the work. At the time of his death he was connected with the same division as assistant director. Mr. Browne was 60 at the time of his death, which followed an illness of 10 days.

Labor Exchange

The term labor exchange is sometimes erroneously applied to employment bureaus. Properly the term was given to a class of institutions founded in 1892-1893 designed to bring about an exchange of products of labor without the use of money. The basis of the value of such product was the amount of time spent in producing it.

PARENT EDUCATION INSTITUTE
TO BE HELD IN ANN ARBOR

What promises to be the most important event of the year for parents, teachers, social workers, and others interested in the field of Parent Education, will be held at the University of Michigan on November 2, 3, and 4, with the opening of the Fourth Annual Parent Education Institute in Ann Arbor. The Parent Education Institute is a joint project of the Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers and the Extension Division of the University of Michigan.

Outside speakers of national reputation have been obtained for the two-and-a-half-day session of the Institute. Mrs. B. F. Langworthy, of Winnetka, Illinois, first vice-president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, is scheduled to speak on Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. Dr. Frankwood E. Williams, internationally known psychiatrist of New York City, will be the speaker at the evening meeting on Thursday at 7:30 o'clock in the Lydia Mendelssohn Theatre. This meeting is open to the public. Dr. Williams will again speak on Friday morning at 9:30 o'clock. On Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Dr. Paul Voelker, state superintendent of public instruction, will give the principal address, and in the evening Mrs. Langworthy and Professor William Clark Frow, of the University of Michigan, will be the speakers at the annual dinner. Saturday morning at 9 o'clock Dr. Frank N. Freeman, Professor of Education of the University of Chicago, and Floyd Dell, the well-known novelist, will appear on the program. These two men will also speak at the luncheon meeting Saturday noon at the Michigan Union.

The Institute opens on Thursday morning, November 2, at 9 o'clock, in the auditorium of the University High School. Speakers at the first session are Mrs. H. W. Stewart, Saginaw, president of the Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers, Mrs. Langworthy and Dr. Marguerite Wilker, director of the University of Michigan Nursery School. Additional University speakers on the program are: Dr. Willard G. Olson, Dr. Arthur B. Wood, Dr. Arthur Moehlman, and Dr. S. A. Courts. Besides the above mentioned University professors, Dr. Maud E. Watson, of the Children's Center, Detroit; Judge D. J. Healy, of the juvenile court, Detroit; Mrs. Fred M. Raymond, Grand Rapids; Mrs. J. K. Pettengill, Lansing; and Mrs. H. R. Lewis, of Detroit, will participate in the program.

This meeting is officially sponsored by the Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers, but anyone interested in Parent Education is invited to be present. There will be a nominal enrollment fee of \$1.00. Those who pay this fee will be admitted to all sessions of the Institute. There is no charge for the evening meeting on Thursday; the dinner on Friday and the luncheon on Saturday are open to those who purchase dinner or luncheon tickets, even though they may not have enrolled in the Institute. Parent-Teacher locals throughout the State are expected to send a delegate to the Parent Education Institute this year.

Red Cross Poster of 1933
Appeals for Help for NeedyTornado Is Most Frequent
Disaster; Causes Heavy
Loss of Lives

What type of disaster occurs most frequently in the United States? This question is answered from the relief annals of the American Red Cross which show over a period of years that the tornado is the most frequent and claims a heavy toll of life. It sweeps almost without warning, and in the terrific whirlpool of its force winds it destroys all in its path.

The Red Cross gave relief in 44 tornadoes in eighteen states last year. The tornadoes killed 320 persons, injured 2,765 and the Red Cross gave aid to 21,738 who were homeless, injured or otherwise victims of the storms.

Toll of the Earthquake

When a severe earthquake killed 86 persons, injured 4,011 and destroyed several thousand homes in Southern California last March, the Red Cross was first upon the ground with emergency relief. It required more than three months for the Red Cross to restore the needy to a self-sustaining basis. The organization expended a relief fund of \$411,000.

Serves Under Five Presidents

John Barton Payne, a retired judge and lawyer of international reputation, is serving his twelfth year as chairman of the American Red Cross. His service is without pay, and his appointment is by the President of the United States. He has served by appointment in high public office under five presidents—Wilson, Harding, Coolidge, Hoover and Roosevelt.

Prepared to Save Lives

One of the most valuable services given to the American public by the Red Cross is through its Life Saving and First Aid courses. Virtually all of the life guards at beaches and pools in the nation are Red Cross life savers. Nearly every industry in America supports the First Aid work of the Red Cross because it annually saves lives of thousands of injured persons. These courses are taught by Red Cross experts in both times. Last year 88,364 certificates were issued to persons completing the First Aid course and 78,766 certificates for completing Life Saving instruction.

War Veterans' Problems

Not since the period of the World War has the Red Cross faced a greater problem in handling the claims of World War and other veterans. Due to the changes in the regulations covering the veterans' claims, chapters all over the nation have been crowded with veteran applicants for relief and for service in preparing appeals. During last year Red Cross home service workers in 3,265 chapters dealt with the problems of 411,124 ex-service men or their families. The chapters also aided 7,346 men still in the regular army, navy and marine corps.

An Army of Children

The membership in the Junior Red Cross last year was 1,688,880 boys and girls in schools, private, public and parochial. They enjoyed volunteer work in hospitals and for orphans, the aged and crippled, and also aided their schoolfellows by providing attention for their eyes, purchasing their glasses, and giving many other types of service to them. The Juniors aid their school work by carrying on correspondence and the exchange of parcels with school children in other nations.

Ovenizing Hams

Question And
Answer Dept.

Ques.—Isn't the President of the United States violating his oath of office when he sets himself up as an enemy of a part of the Constitution—namely, the 18th Amendment?

Ans.—No. The President not only has the legal right, but is duty bound to recommend amendments to the Constitution if he considers such measures "necessary and expedient." Sec. 111, Article 2, of the Constitution says: "He (the President) shall (quote the word "shall") from time to time give the Congress information on the state of the Union and recommend to their consideration such measures as he may judge necessary and expedient."

Ques.—When, where and by whom was President Garfield assassinated?

Ans.—President James A. Garfield was shot by Charles J. Guiteau in a railway station in Washington, D. C., July 2, 1881. The President died from the effects of this shot on Sept. 19, 1881. Guiteau was hanged in the jail in Washington June 30, 1882.

Ques.—Will you please answer in your good paper where Mesa Verde National park is located? Also whether Yosemite Valley National park is larger than Yellowstone.

Ans.—Yellowstone is the largest National park belonging to the United States. Its area is 3,149,720 acres. Mt. McKinley in Alaska is second with 1,408,000 acres, and Yosemite is third with 167,080 acres.

Ques.—To settle a dispute will you please answer in your question department which State in the Union has the largest number of illiterates—that is, people who can't read or write?

Ans.—Louisiana has the largest percentage of people who cannot read or write any language. However, about 4 percent of these can read and write in languages other than English. These would not be classed as illiterates.

Ques.—Why are woolen clothes warmer than cotton clothes?

Ans.—Woolen clothes are warmer because they hold more air and hold it tighter. It is really this air which is entangled in the fibers of the cloth that makes clothes warm. Air, when it cannot move, is a very poor conductor of heat. The layer of air entangled in the masses of clothes prevents the heat of the body being conducted out and lost.

Ques.—Why can't animals talk?

Ans.—Scientists say that the rea-

son animals cannot talk is because they have little or no power of having abstract ideas. Words, you must remember, represent such ideas. For instance the word "man" means any man—not merely some one man with whom you happen to be acquainted with. Animals do not seem to be able to take this mental step from a knowledge of some single thing to the general, abstract idea, including both that thing and the things like it. If they could take this step, they could learn to talk, just the same as a baby learns to articulate.

Ques.—Why does rain fall in drops instead of coming down in sheets or lumps?

Ans.—There are two reasons which are inseparable. One reason is that rain is formed in little droplets condensed out of the water molecules in the air. The other is that the water would fall in drops because the friction of the air would break it up. As an example, take an ordinary garden hose and shoot the stream high in the air. The water won't come down the

same as it left the nozzle. It will spray down. It's the same with the rain. If an airplane can go 80,000 or 100,000 feet in the air, why is there to prevent them from going up twice that high, if he wants to?

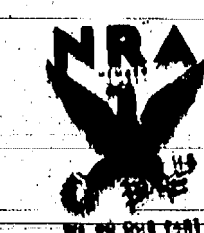

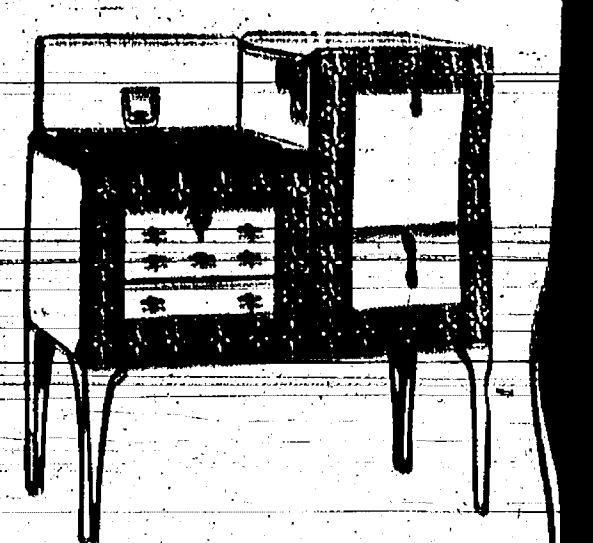

These orders, with suitable modifications, have become our modern bank checks. Similarly, the receipts the goldsmiths gave to the merchants for their deposits of gold evolved into the modern bank note.

Tough Sod Waiting
For State Plowmen

Horsemen will have a chance to cheer their favorites on at the fourth annual State plowing match to be held on the Michigan State College Farm at East Lansing, October 31.

Entries in the contest are confined to multiple hitching, with four, five or six horses hooked up. There may be a demonstration of an eight-horse hitch but there will be no competition between teams of that size.

Winners are judged on quality of plowing and handling of team. Each entrant must plow a minimum amount of ground but there is no definite time limit in which the work must be accomplished. The ground to be plowed will be in alfalfa sod.

The use of horses in multiple hitching is one of the newer farming practices in this State but its economic values have long been known in the West. Driving five or six horses as a team was forced upon Michigan farmers when it was very difficult to obtain farm help and the practice has aided in these last years when it has been even more difficult to find money to pay hired men.

A banquet and speaking program will follow the plowing contest. Musical and other features are included in the entertainment to follow the banquet.

Cameo-Cutting Requires

Most Careful Attention

Two kinds of engraving are done on the precious stones: intaglio, which means cutting down into the stone, and relief, such as cameo-cutting.

Onyx, chalcedony and sardonyx are among the popular stones used for cameos, because they have layers. Some of the onyxes have layers of different colors. Agate is black and white, and carnelian is red and white. The figure is cut on the top section, which is usually the lighter one, then the rest of the layer is cut away so the figure stands out on its dark background.

Onyx is not one of the gems, yet it is a valuable stone. The cameo-cutter pays too high a price for it to risk a mistake in his carving. When he is going to work out a figure he first molds it in wax—exactly as it is to be in the stone, then he cuts it line for line on the better material.

Some of the old Greek cameos are so intricately carved that we are led to think the ancient cameo-cutters spent months working on a single stone. Yet the hours they put in were put to good advantage, for a well carved cameo is a permanent thing. There are cameos in existence which were fashioned hundreds and even thousands of years ago, but which are as perfect as though they were done yesterday.

Two towns in Italy, Santa Lucia and Torre de Greco, are the center of the cameo trade.

Presidents' Widows First

Pension Started in 1870

The custom of paying pensions to widows of United States Presidents did not originate until July 14, 1870, when the President approved a bill providing that "the secretary of the interior be and is hereby authorized to place the name of Mary Lincoln, widow of Abraham Lincoln, deceased, late President of the United States, on the pension roll and allow and pay her a pension at the rate of \$10,000 per annum from and after the passage of this act." Her pension was increased to \$5,000 a year by the act of February 2, 1882, and this has remained the rate of pensions for widows of Presidents, when granted, since that time.

Prior to the increase the widow of President Tyler had received a pension of \$100 a month, but this rate was reduced on account of the fact that at his death he was a member of the Confederate congress.

The pension has not been granted to all widows, the exceptions usually being as in the case of Mrs. Harding, due to the death of the widow within a comparatively short time after the death of her husband, or to the remarriage of the widow. There is no general statute on the subject, but each pension is the subject of a special act.

RED CROSS RELIEF

AIDS DISTRESSED

IN 120 DISASTERS

Help Given in Fires, Floods, Earthquake and Epidemics Part of Year's Task

The American Red Cross has reached into the homes of six million families in the past year with unemployment and disaster relief, Chairman John Har- to Payne announced.

"As the year closed the organization continued in readiness to serve in the forthcoming winter at the point of greatest need and to adjust its service to meet the calls of the emergency of unemployment and disaster," Chairman Payne stated.

In a year of greatest economic distress in the nation's history, in which the Red Cross ably discharged a relief task in distributing flour and clothing to distressed families in all but six of the nation's 3,098 counties, the organization also was called into action in 120 disasters, of which 96 were within the borders of the United States.

Earthquake, floods, hurricanes, fires and other catastrophes visited death and destruction upon the lives and homes of thousands of people. Red Cross statistics showed that in the 120 disasters, almost a thousand lives were lost, 148,340 homes were destroyed or damaged, 13,275 persons were injured, and Red Cross relief was given to 452,879 individuals.

In giving aid in these disasters, in its unemployment relief and in handling the distribution of government wheat and cotton, the Red Cross expended from its national treasury the sum of \$1,070,284.

During one period of twelve weeks, 46 disasters occurred in 23 states. Red Cross disaster workers were hard pressed in meeting all of these needs occurring at once, but everywhere misery was promptly relieved.

Support of the Red Cross work is through its annual roll call, conducted by chapters in the period from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving Day, November 11 to November 30. Every citizen who joins the Red Cross as a member aids in carrying relief to disaster victims and in other Red Cross services, such as preservation of life, child welfare through the Junior Red Cross, and direct service for the public health.
