Farm Census Begins
In Michigan Jan. 1

Beginning January 1, census enumerators will call on all Michigan farmers to obtain information in accordance with the law which requires that an agricultural census shall be taken every five years, according to the director of the census, William L. Austin, Washington, D. C.

The farm census will be very important, in view of the unusual conditions under which agriculture has been conducted in the past few years.

The first farm census was taken in 1840, and others at intervals of 10 years until 1925 when the new law requiring that the census be taken every five years was passed.

Many of the governmental plans to aid farmers are based upon information provided by the data secured by the census reports. This is the most accurate detailed record of the farming industry, and it is very important to the farmers themselves that accurate information be given to the census enumerators when they call.

The enumerators will have means of identifying themselves when they call. Most of them will be local people chosen in the districts where they will work.

Every farmer can secure a sample farm schedule which is a copy of the blank which the census enumerator will fill out when calling at the farm later. The sample copies can be secured by writing to the Bureau of the Census, Dept. of Commerce, Washington, D. C. Most county agricultural agents will have copies which can be inspected in their offices.


