ng an all-night session Wednesday of Commissioner Van Wagoner and his staff. It was whipped into shape less than twelve hours after the commissioner and Varnum Sr. Steinbaugh, deputy commissioner and road engineer, returned from Washington by airplane where they received long. awaited Federal regulations. Immediate action was possible because the commissioner had anticipated general provisions of the program two months ago and had expanded his drafting forces.

Significant features of the new prograni mean:

Expenditure of Federal funds on county roads for the first time. General exclusion of highway construction projects in municipalities under the works relief phase of the program.

Probabilities that much of the road construction fund will be used at this time for grading with surfacing to be applied later under the Federal ald program.

Selection of projects requiring 90 per cent relief labor. Expenditure of the \$7,600,000 of Federal aid money under the state law. This requires that 50 per cent of the fund be allocated below Town Line 12 (south of the city of Saginaw, east and west), 25 per cent above this line, and 25 per cent in the Upper Poninaula.

A division of the \$13,000,000 work relief grant_into_\$6,300,000 for roads and \$6,700,000 for railroad grade sep arations.

Commissioner Van Wagoner said he noped to start advertising for bids under the new program within two weeks after final Federal approval. County roads are brought into the Federal relief picture for the first time. New regulations require that 75 per cent of the road fund shall be expended on state and Federal aid trunklines and 25 per cent on county roads, Commissioner Van Wagoner hopes to build low-cost oil aggregate surfaces that are dust proof on county roads.

Labor requirements preclude any general trunkline street development through municipalities. The only type of road projects available in the cities is surfacing. Cost of materials and equipment, however, will prevent surfacing projects to qualify under the works relief-program. Gity atreeta, on the other hand, will qualify under the Federal aid phase of the program.

Grade separation projects may be selected without limitation as to location except that not less than 25 per cent of the funds must be spent on crossings off the Federal aid system. Respective mileage of the various railroads must also be taken into construction.

Labor regulations call for an 8 hour day and 5 days a week. Rates are expeoted to range from 30 to 40 cents an hour for unskilled, 44 to 60 cents intermediate, and 60 to 80 cents.
