Project Work Will Be Started In Few Days

According to information released from administration headquarters of the Waterloo project, it is expected that about 50 men will be employed in the park area within the next few days, and it is hoped to have 700 employed there before spring.

Further information given out is to the effect that most of the men to be employed at the present time will be from Jackson county, as practically all employable men in this section are now working on the US-12 highway and grade separation projects. Men to be employed in the park will be furnished through the Jackson Re-employment Service, and come under the provisions of the Works Progress Administration.

The first contingent of men furnished for work on the Waterloo project will be employed in preliminary work of rough grading on the camp sites. As men are added to the payroll construction work will be started on temporary buildings at the Mill Lake campsite, including field house for shelter, tool house, cement shed, etc. Sand and gravel will be placed on the ice during the winter months, preparatory to the making of a good beach in the spring. Some of the WPA workers will live in the temporary buildings this winter.

The Mill Lake site will be used as a permanent children's camp, and cottages, bath house, dining hall, administration building, etc. will be constructed there, and will no doubt be ready for occupancy next summer.

Auto Titles Soon To Take New Form

Within a relatively short time, the familiar long yellow sheet on which titles to the more than million motor vehicles in the state are registered, will disappear, to be replaced by a new form about half the size of the present one. The new form will be on paper watermarked with the seal of the state, with printed matter on a faint gray background carrying an intricate design which would instantly betray any attempt to alter original writing. The new form will be virtually white. Sample copies were sent this week by Orville E. Atwood, Secretary of State, to sheriffs and police officials to familiarize them with the new form.

Another important change in the form is reservation of space in which "sticker" and license numbers for successive years will be written. Heretofore, license numbers for successive years have been endorsed on any available space on the face of the title. The new form contains space for recording of "sticker" and license numbers for 1935 to 1940 inclusive.

The primary reason for changing the size of the title is so that copies for filing in the Department of State can be made easily by photostatic process from original titles, a device for saving time and positively eliminating possibility of error in copying detailed information to forms now used for filing.

The present yellow forms have been in use for five years; prior to then, titles were printed on green tinted bond.

Administration of Relief Will Change on December First

Effective December 1st, the status of direct relief clients in Washtenaw county, as well as in other counties of the state, will be materially changed. After that date all relief work will be carried on through the cooperation of the state, county and township or city governments.

Administration work will continue under the supervision of the County Welfare Relief Commission, aid going to people of the county who will not be able to qualify as employables under the Works Progress Administration, with the understanding that the supervisor or authorized agent approve the investigation and the amount of relief to be furnished.

The County Relief Commission will furnish the county clerk each month a statement of expenses incurred during the month, and such list will show the amount chargeable to each township and city in the county. The townships and cities will pay 45 per cent of the cost, the remaining 55 per cent to be paid by the state, to counties entering into the agreement for carrying on the relief work in this way.

Although it is expected that a majority of the townships and cities will adopt this plan for direct relief, it is reported that some will assume the full amount of the burden.

At a meeting of the Sylvan township board Monday evening the plan was adopted, which means that after December 1, Theo. Bahnmiller, supervisor, will control the situation in this township insofar as unemployables are concerned, and 45 per cent of the cost will be paid by the township.

Red Cross Roll Call Conducted By Scouts

The annual Red Cross Roll Call is being conducted in Chelsea this week, and a house to house canvass is being made by members of the Girl Scout organization. The drive for memberships will close on Thanksgiving Day.

Of the amount collected one-half will remain in the treasury of the local and county chapters, the other half being sent to national headquarters. Local officials of the Red Cross state that the demand for aid is greater than ever before, and that clothing, shoes, milk, etc., has been furnished by them to many families during the past year, and that the demand is again increasing as winter approaches. They ask that anyone having used clothing which they wish to dispose of, give it to the Girl Scouts when they are solicited.

During the past year 832 people went to the County Red Cross office for some kind of service and in addition 282 outside calls were made. New and used clothing given out totaled 950 garments, in addition to used bedding, dishes, chairs, stoves, beds, and baby carriages. Layettes numbered 108. There were 90 transients who received aid there.

A total of 242 life-saving certificates went through the county office during the past year. This means that some teacher previously qualified by Red Cross instruction had to examine with rigid tests the persons totaling the 242 mentioned above, who will in turn teach others.

Home nursing certificates were awarded 85 women in Washtenaw county last year. A class of 36 men selected to be foremen on WPA projects were instructed in First Aid. 124 war veterans were given some kind of service by this office.

On Friday, November 22, at 2:30 p. m. Herbert J. McKune Post No. 31, the American Legion, will present American flags to both the public and parochial schools. A program will be given at a joint meeting of the schools in the public school auditorium, to which the public is invited.

Rev. Fr. George Cairns of Monroe, chaplain of both the State and 2nd District American Legion, will give the principal address. Paul C. Maroney, Commander of the 2nd District, will make the presentation of the flags.


