NYA Camp at Cassidy Lake Given Approval

At a meeting of officials of the National Park Service held in the regional office at Indianapolis last week plans for the establishment of a Na-

Instructions have been given local project officials to have plans drawn and submitted within the next ten days and it is hoped that these plans will be approved and work started at the camp within thirty days.

Materials for construction work at the camp will be furnished by NYA and the Resettlement Administration will supply most of the labor and su-pervision. A group of 30 NYA boys from Jackson will be brought to the camp each week and will assist in some of the construction-work, under proper supervision.

This camp is being established by NYA for "misfit" young men between the ages of 10 and 20 years, who have quit school and are floating on criminal borderlines. The camp will accommodate 130 men, including the staff. The boys will work four hours daily on the project property, the remainder of their time being spent under supervision in an apprentice or craft school and in recreation. The camp will be operated during the entire year and boys will be enrolled for six month periods. They will be selected by youth councils throughout the state.

Buildings for the new NYA camp will be similar to those being con-structed at the Mill Lake camp, including dining hall, recreation building, craft shop, 8-cot barracks, etc. The site selected is on the northeast

Provisions of SCP Will Be Explained

Wm. C. Pritchard was in Lansing on Friday where he attended a meeting held for the purpose of acquainting local committees with provisions of the 1936 Soil Conservation Programof the Federal Government. Two men from Washington were present at the meeting to explain the new set-up which replaces the outlawed AAA,

In addition to Mr. Pritchard other members of the Washtenaw county delegation who attended the meeting were Clarence Carr of Saline, Gottlieb Jacobs of Manchester and H. S. Osler, county agricultural agent. These men are acting as a temporary county committee on the project, and a permanent committee will be appointed

A series of meetings will be held throughout the county, starting within the next week or ton days, at which members of the committee will explain the program which has been created in such a way that every farmer may easily adjust his crop plans so as to receive benefits, according to Mr. Pritchard. The committee will set the dates for the meetings, which will no doubt be announced next week.

The SCP in a nutshell is as follows

First—
For soil conserving payments a farmer must have 20 per cent or more of his 1935 crop acres in soil conserving and soil building crops in 1936.

For each 1935 acre of crop depleting crops reduced and transfered to crop building crops in 1936, he is eligible to receive a sum equal to about \$10.00 per secon up to 15 per cent of \$10.00 par acre up to 15 per cent of his crop depleting acres.

Soil building payment is based on all soil conserving crops planted in 1986 and carrying out soil building practices on land already seeded to soil conserving crops and also rotating pastures. A sum not to exceed \$1.00 per acre for all crop land used in 1930 for crop conserving and building

Township Road System

ter reaching the ripe old age of 85. The 88 counties of the state com-

pleted the job Wednesday, April 1, of taking over the remaining township 62,200 miles of township roads originally certified in 1981 to the State

yided that the counties take over the township road mileages at the rate of 20 per cent a year. A first-year appropriation of \$2,000,000 was allocated to the counties to help them shoulder this burden. This amount was increased by \$500,000 annually until the present annual appropriation is \$4,-

Although the adoption of township road mileage is now complete, the Mc-Nitt Act provides that the counties in 1937 take over streets and alleys in recorded plats outside of incorporated cities and villages. No provision is made to re-imburse the counties for these additions to their road systems. This clause will work a hardship or industrial counties of lower Michigan where there are many subdivisions outside of city limits.





BEEKEEPERS WARNED

Michigan beekeepers are warned against the danger of many dead colonies of bees known to exist throughout the state as a result of the extreme cold weather this past winter. Don P. Barrett, chief apiary inspector in the state department of agriculture, issued the following statement in regard to the situation:

"Beekeepers should realize this great danger and take steps immediately to plug up the hives of all dead colonies. A strip of wood tacked over the opening will be sufficient to keep both robbing bees out and to prevent mice from getting in. Some beekeepers have been so careless as to eave the covers off the hives or even the brood comb exposed while examining the colonies and found them to be dead. Others have shown such carelessness as to leave comb containing dead brood outside of the hives. The beekeepers have been insistent that the state and county offer some form of protection against the spread of foul brood. Now they should assume some of the responsibility themselves and practice good aplary methods in helping keep this disease in




