Net profit ..... 151.33

The projects were under the supervision of Owen G. Lyons, vocational agriculture teacher in the Chelsea public schools.

## North Lake M. E. Church Celebrates 100th Anniversary

North Lake M. E. church closed a three-day observance of its centennial Sunday afternoon, June 7, with a reminiscence service in the afternoon. Among those who gave interesting accounts of their association with the church were: James Gilbert, who came from his home in Riverside, Calif., for the occasion; William H. Wood and William Cooper, M. Pleasant; Mrs. Olla Arnold, Detroit; Samuel Schultz, Ann Arbor; Mrs. Clara Isham, Wayne; Mrs. Ida Johnson, Warren; Daniel Chelsoe; Dr. B. H. Glenn, Fowlerville; Mrs. Ella Burkhardt, North Lake; Mrs. P. E. Noah, president. The history of the church was written and read by Mrs. E. W. McDaniels.

Rev. A. T. Camburn, a former pastor, preached at the morning service. Music was furnished by the ladies' quartet of the Dexter M. E. church and the junior choir of North Lake, accompanied by Marian Allen of Chelsea.

At the opening service Friday evening, Dr. Addis Leeson of Chelsea led in prayer; Fred Glenn gave "Boyhood Memories"; Mrs. Mildred Mayer of Munith, "Girlhood Memories"; Rev. H. J. B. Marsh of Ridgeway told of his experiences when he preached at North Lake; Dr. William H. Harrison, district superintendent, preached; music was furnished by J. B. McCurry of Jackson.

The Ladies' Aid Society held a bazaar and served supper Saturday evening. A one-act drama, "Color Line" was presented by the Epworth League.

The three days were an awakening of tender memories, renewing of friendships and a strengthening of the great loyalties of the Christian life—a fitting tribute to the men and women of the entire century whose faithfulness has established and maintained a temple of worship.

Letters were read from Emmet Whalian of Sellnas, Cal., Matie Schultz of San Bernardino, Cal., Rev. Elbridge Gordon, Tremonton, Utah.

## North Lake Church History

The North Lake Society was organized in 1836, with a membership of twelve. Charles Glenn, who came to Michigan from New York state in 1833 was the leader of the group and served as local preacher for over thirty years. He bought two lots of land from the government in the township of Dexter, where he lived until his death in 1876. The heirs of Charles Glenn owned this property until it was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. E. W. McDaniels in 1894. It is now owned by the latter.

From 1836 to 1846, the society held services at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Glenn. In 1846 the two brothers, Charles and John Glenn, at their own expense, built a small one-story frame building, 20x26 feet. This building stood on the line between the farms owned by John Glenn and Richard Webb. It was used for both school and church purposes for several years. In 1866, the present frame structure was built at an expense of \$2,645.87. The land on which the church stands was deeded to the conference by Mr. and Mrs. John Glenn. In 1866, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Glenn presented the Bible which is still in use in the church.

Of the twenty-nine young people converted during evangelistic meetings in 1876, nine are still living. One member, Mrs. E. W. McDaniels, is actively connected with the North Lake church.

During the century, the church has been on the same circuit with Unadilla, Pinckney, Dexter, Williamsville, Waterloo, Lima Center, North Waterloo. Of these eight Methodist churches, two, North Lake and Dexter, are used for worship.

In 1907 the church was remodeled and rededicated. In 1919 the Delco lighting plant was installed at a cost of \$500.00. When the Edison company came through the church was wired for the new system. In 1925 Charles Johnson secured from the Michigan State Game the hall which stood on the first corner west of the church. This building was moved and annexed to the south side of the church and now serves for Sunday school class rooms and social activities.

The building is one of the best equipped rural churches in the state and serves well the community. Many have gone from this church to become leaders in other churches.

At the present time the president of the Ladies' Aid Society is Mrs. F. A. Glenn; superintendent of the Sunday school, Homer Stoffer; the pastor, Rev. Victor D. Longfield.

Question And Answer Dept.

**Ques.**—Kindly inform me how I can procure a copy of John Adams' speech before the Continental Congress in the year 1776, in favor of the Declaration of Independence from Great Britain.  
**Ans.**—There are no copies of John Adams' speeches for sale. When he became a member of the Continental Congress in 1774 he was a staunch advocate and supporter for the Declaration of Independence. Charles Francis Adams, his grandson (born 1807, died 1886) wrote the memoirs of his grandfather and they were handed down to his eldest son, Charles Francis Adams II, who became president of the American Historical Association, where the speeches and memoirs of his great grandfather, John Adams, are preserved. A stamped envelope, and self-addressed, to that association in Boston, Mass., may bring you further information.

**Ques.**—To settle an argument will you kindly state in the Question and Answers column whether Ben Butler of Civil War fame was a Democrat or a Republican?  
**Ans.**—Benjamin F. Butler was a member of three different political parties—Democrat, Republican and Greenback-Labor—but not all at the same time. Prior to 1860 he was a member of the Massachusetts State Legislature as a Democrat. He was a member of the national Democratic convention in Baltimore. In 1866 he was elected to Congress as a Republican and served 18 years. In 1882 he was elected Governor of Massachusetts as a Democrat, and 1884 he was the Presidential candidate on the Greenback-Labor ticket.

**Ques.**—Why are walnuts sometimes referred to as "black walnuts"?  
**Ans.**—This is done to distinguish it from the butternut, which is widely known as the "white walnut" because the wood is not so dark as the black walnut.  
**Ques.**—From what part of Africa are our present negroes descended?  
**Ans.**—When the slave trade was lawful about 65 percent of the slaves were brought from Dahomey, a French colony in Africa on the northern coast of the Gulf of Guinea. The slave trade has been abolished there, and while there are a few savage tribes in the interior, and the puppet kingdom is under the rule of an African prince, the colony is governed by a local governor appointed by the French.

**Ques.**—When some people weep without being sincere they are said to be "shedding crocodile tears." Please tell me what that means.  
**Ans.**—The tear glands of a crocodile are very large, and when in the act of killing or masticating its prey these glands are set rapidly in motion and the tears are very profuse. In mythology it is said the crocodile is weeping because he has to kill and eat his prey.

**Ques.**—What is meant by the Dark Ages? And when did they exist?  
**Ans.**—Dark Ages is a name applied to a portion of the Middle Ages, and included a period of about a thousand years from A. D. 486 to A. D. 1495, or from the fall of Rome to the revival of letters in the fifteenth century.

**Ques.**—Can you tell me who the antediluvians were?  
**Ans.**—The antediluvians were the people who lived prior to 2348 B. C. This, according to the Bible, is given as about the time of the deluge which it is claimed, was predicted by Noah.

**Ques.**—I would like to know why Eros is called the god of love, when I have always understood that Cupid was or is the god of love.  
**Ans.**—In mythology Cupid is the god of love. "Eros" is the Anglo-Saxon name. "Eros" is the Greek for the same name, and having the same meaning.

**Ques.**—Where is the Cumberland Road?  
**Ans.**—The Cumberland Road is a highway built by the United States government from Ft. Cumberland, Md. to Vandalia, Ill., which was completed in 1838. The proper name was the "great National Pike" and was controlled by the Federal government until 1856, when the control was given to the various States in which the different portions were located.

**Ques.**—Who drafted the Declaration of Independence?  
**Ans.**—The Declaration of Independence was drafted by Thomas Jefferson, assisted by Thomas Payne, Jefferson's close friend and chief adviser. It was Payne's "Common Sense" that set ablaze the spirit of 1776, when the State Legislature of Pennsylvania was so pleased with his book "Common Sense" that he was voted a grant of \$3,500. Jefferson and his committee drafted the document which was adopted with only a few changes from the original draft.

**Ques.**—What is the size of the Dead Sea? And why is it called "Dead"?  
**Ans.**—The Dead Sea stretches north and south about forty-five miles and has a width of about ten miles. It is located about twenty miles southeast of Jerusalem and ten miles south of Jericho. It has been named "Dead" because there is no living matter in its waters. The sea is about one-fourth salt.

HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

Boston—An appeal to Christian Scientists to work for the demonstration of World Peace, the reading of reports by church officers on the various activities of the movement throughout the world and sustained demand for the writings of Mary Baker Eddy, Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, marked the annual meeting this week of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass. Election of Mrs. Elizabeth Caldwell Tomlinson of Boston as President of The Mother Church was announced. She succeeds Dr. Frank C. Colby. The addition of 22 new churches and eight new university organizations, making a total of 2751 branches of The Mother Church and 55 college and university organizations, was announced by the Department of Branches and Practitioners.

Approximately 6000 Christian Scientists representing every state in the Union and practically every civilized nation in the world attended the meeting. The main floor and three galleries were filled within a short time after the church doors were opened, the overflow being accommodated in the original Mother Church where amplifiers were installed.





**Wise Gardener Uses Calendar**

Schedules for planting in small and large gardens can be extended as far through the summer as late in August, suggests H. L. Seaton, instructor in vegetable gardening at Michigan State College. Not only will a succession of crops keep the table supplied, but canning and winter storage supplies will be part of the harvest.

After the first plantings of string beans and sweet corn have a start, successive patches can be put in every two weeks until July 15. For late cabbage, cauliflower and Brussel sprouts, set the plants from June 15 to July 1.

"The right quantity of vegetables to plant depends upon the size of the family, preferences for certain vegetables and a guess as to what the soil and weather will produce as a reward for the garden work," says Seaton.



"Usually about 100 cabbage plants of a good storage variety is sufficient. For beets and turnips for winter storage, about 150 feet broadcast about August 1 to 15 after early crops are harvested is enough. A good storing variety of carrots should be sown 300 feet in rows before June 15. Late spinach, radishes and lettuce can be put in August 10 to 20 to catch cooler weather."

At the time the cabbage plants go in late this month, two or three dozen cauliflower plants and one to two dozen plants of the Brussel sprouts can be transplanted, while Chinese cabbage can be sown directly in the garden plot.



WHO ARE YOU? The Romance of Your Name By RUBY HASKINS ELLIS

A Lincoln? THIS is a place name taken from the town of Lincoln, in Lincolnshire, England. The name is derived from the word lin, found in Gaelic, Welsh and Cornish-British, which means a pool, pond or lake, and coln, which signifies a ridge or neck of land, so called from the situation. The town of Lincoln was located on the top and side of a steep hill. So evidently the name came from the association of the two places; "the hill by the lake."

This was the beginning of the name, but the family is found later to have been seated for many generations in the town of Hingham, County Norfolk, England. It is from the Norfolkshire Lincolns that the American Lincolns trace descent.

Thomas Lincoln came to America from Hingham, England, in 1633, and was followed in 1637 by his brother Samuel. They settled in Hingham, Mass., named for the town in their mother country. Samuel married Martha, and among their ten children was Samuel, through whom came the governors of Massachusetts, Levi Lincoln, father and son, and Enoch Lincoln, who became the governor of Maine.

The fourth son of Samuel was Mordecai, who married Sarah Jones. They located in Scituate, Mass., and among their five children were Mordecai, Jr., and Abraham, who moved to Monmouth County, New Jersey. Their son, John, located in Virginia, where he married Moore. They had four sons and several daughters. Among the sons was Abraham, who married Mary Shipley, of North Carolina. His son, Thomas Lincoln, was the father of Abraham Lincoln, sixteenth President of the United States. Abraham Lincoln's grandfather removed to Mercer county, Kentucky, in 1782, entered a tract of 400 acres of land on the south side of Licking creek, where he built a log cabin near what is now the city of Louisville.

Benjamin Lincoln, of Massachusetts, made a brilliant career for himself during the Revolution. At the outbreak of the war he was lieutenant and colonel of militia. There were many other Lincolns who served in the American Revolution. Most of them were from the family stronghold, Hingham, Mass. Among these were Amos, who assisted in throwing tea overboard in the famous "Boston Tea Party," and in addition to this, saw seven years' service; Bess (b. 1756), Ezekiel (b. 1759), Royal (b. 1754), Joshua (b. 1757), James (b. 1751). From Norton, Mass., Elkanah (b. 1747); from Taunton, Caleb (b. 1757); Rufus (b. 1761), Nathaniel (b. 1744), Loe (b. 1762); from Rehoboth, Stephen Lincoln (b. 1761). There were Lincolns in Pennsylvania also; Michael Lincoln served at Fort Pitt under Capt. John Brady. There are Lincolns in every part of this country today, and many of them trace their lineage to one or another of the early settlers mentioned in this brief sketch.

Records Show Livestock Paid Best Last Year

Operators of 66 Michigan Livestock farms who kept records of their income and expenses in 1935 as co-operators with the farm management extension project at Michigan State College, find that their type of farming gave returns last year that put them at an advantage over more than a dozen other types of farming in the state because of their larger volume of business, low feed costs and increased meat prices, according to C. O. May, extension specialist.

From 1934 to 1935 the change in livestock prices, particularly meat animals, was greater than in any year since 1910. In 1934 meat animal prices were only 68 per cent of 1910-1914, while in 1935 they averaged 110 per cent, or a 78 per cent increase over 1934.

In the opinion of Mr. May, it would be unwise to make drastic changes in order to participate in the advantages that livestock farmers enjoyed in 1935. "This is especially true since a downward trend in prices for livestock will most likely begin in a particularly short time, and this is particularly true for hogs."

The operators of the 66 farms represented in this report averaged earnings of \$1,566 for their labor and management. This figure represents what the operator had left for his labor and management after paying all cash operating expenses, allowing for depreciation and other inventory losses, a charge for family labor other than the operator and a deduction of 5 per cent interest on the total investment.
