

Farmers Are Invited to College on July 31

Celebration of the state's supremacy in the growing of alfalfa on more than a million acres of land will be one of the highlights in the annual Farmers' Day program at Michigan State College, Friday, July 31, on the campus at East Lansing.

Farmers from all sections of the state are being invited to participate in the program, to view the latest experiments under way in test plots and experiments, and to hear O. E. Reed, chief of the Bureau of Dairy Industry, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

Reed participated in the history making development of dairying and alfalfa growing in Michigan when several series of "harm meetings" were held beginning in 1921 in Allegan county. He then was head of the dairy department at Michigan State and worked with J. F. Cox, then head of the farm crops department, H. C. Rafter, A. C. Balthasar and J. A. Waldron.

From 75,000 acres of alfalfa in 1920, the acreage grew to nearly a million last year and is above a million acres in 1936, largest in the United States. All departments at the college will participate in the celebration.

Agricultural engineering, farm crops, poultry, animal husbandry, dairy, soils, horticulture, forestry, botany, veterinary and entomology will offer special departmental programs in the morning after the first special event is conducted at 9 a. m.

In the afternoon a general program is being planned by Dean E. L. Anthony, R. J. Baldwin, director of extension, V. R. Gardiner, director of the experiment station, Professor H. C. Rafter and R. W. Tenney.

Many Arrested for Fishing Violations

Lansing—Fishing without a license is a poor way to save money in Michigan, as 93 of the 331 violators arrested by Conservation Officers during May can testify.

The 93 were arrested for fishing without a license and were assessed a total of \$1,036.50 in justice court. This is an average of about \$11.50 each or 23 times the cost of a 50-cent resident fishing license.

Several of the 93 were non-residents and some minor jail sentences rather than pay fine and costs, but all would much rather have paid the nominal license fee if by so doing they could have avoided a court appearance.

Of the 331 arrests, most of which were for illegal fishing, only one was lost during prosecution. One case was certified to circuit court, dismissals or suspended sentences were recorded in four and in three the respondents were placed on probation.

A total of \$2,384 in fines and a total of \$2,246.20 in costs were assessed in justice court. Justices meted out 855 days in jail terms. Arrests were

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The Man Who Hit the Bull's Eye

MOONSHINING flourished long before the prohibition amendment was made to the Constitution of the United States.

Twenty years ago it was carried on in the mountains of West Virginia as a trade that made the government authorities gasp for breath.

The general impression of the moonshiner is that of a poor white man who is willing to take big chances in order to make a little illegal money. This is true of some sections, but at the time mentioned there were bold and unscrupulous distillers who carried it on as a business in a big way and who made fortunes by the operation.

Wayne Gooch was one of these men. He was called the King of the Moonshiners, and there is no reason to doubt that he was entitled to the distinction.

The amount grew to such proportions that the commissioner of internal revenue at Washington determined it would have to be stopped at all hazards.

The man he assigned to the job was a fearless agent named Tom Kennedy. He had several advantages. One was that he knew the mountains of West Virginia.

Another was that he was a crack shot. These things were important, because the moonshiners placed small value on human life.

Most of them boasted that they would not be taken alive, and by the same token they would kill anyone who attempted to interfere with their business.

Kennedy determined to confront the lion in his den. He made up his mind to go to the Gooch stamping grounds in the guise of a government forerunner.

Merely to be known as a person who was connected with the government in any capacity was taking a big chance, but Kennedy was a man who had been taking chances all his life, and one additional chance meant little to him.

He had two capable assistants with him, and he went direct to the cabin where the king of the moonshiners made his headquarters.

He introduced himself by his real name, and he wanted to know what the authorities could do to help the cultivation of trees in that part of the country. Gooch who was a big bluff fellow, received him cordially enough, even though he kept his weather eye on this curious stranger.

He said the soil in that part of West Virginia was not particularly adapted to forestry, but he cheerfully offered to escort Kennedy about the country.

It was just what the revenue agent wanted. He kept his eyes and his ears open, and at the end of 24 hours was forced to confess that there was not even the sign of a still in operation.

Contracts Awarded for Portion of US-12 Landing, June 30—Low bids on \$5,750,222.10 worth of highway and bridge construction projects were announced today by State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wageningen. The bids were the first to be taken on Michigan's new \$7,600,000 Federal Aid program for the fiscal year which starts tomorrow. They constitute the largest single letting in the entire history of the State Highway Department. Actual construction activities are expected to get under way within two weeks. Contracts which were awarded include the portion of the new US-12 highway from Jackson to Sylvan Center, as follows: Washtenaw County—3.594 miles of concrete pavement on US-12, west county line east, of which 8.401 miles will be 31-foot concrete pavement and 0.193 mile will be 42-foot concrete pavement. Awarded to C. A. Handyside Construction Company, Detroit, \$148,488.29. Jackson County—5.108 miles of 31-foot concrete pavement on US-12, east county line west, R. D. Baker Company, Royal Oak, \$181,270.25. Jackson County—7.849 miles of 31-foot concrete pavement on US-12, east of Jackson east, Lewis and Frisinger Company, Ann Arbor, \$290,497.54. When work under way and contracts just awarded are completed, all of US-12 on the Jackson-Ann Arbor section will be paved with 31-foot concrete except a 4.2-mile gap from west of Chelsea to one mile west of Lima Center. Filling in this gap involves a relocation of the highway to a route south of Chelsea, but opposition developed to the plan, and after it was found impossible to secure the new right-of-way at a price the Highway Department was willing to pay, the project was dropped.

Salem Church Will Celebrate Anniversary Once again people and pastor of Salem M. E. church have made preparations to observe the anniversary of the church's organization appropriately next Sunday, July 6. This will be the 83rd anniversary of the founding of the church. Dr. H. A. Leson of the Chelsea Methodist Church, will bring the anniversary sermon at 10:45 a. m. The Fellowship meeting is scheduled for 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The program consists of both musical and literary numbers, and brief messages by the visiting pastors. A chicken dinner will be served at noon by the ladies of the church—no need of saying any more! Salem church was organized in the pioneer days of German Methodism in Michigan. Sometime in 1852 the Reverend Jacob Rathweller, then pastor of one of the churches in Detroit, visited this community, preparing the way by preaching and house-to-house visitation for organizing a church, which was done in 1853 by the Rev. John Schweinfurth. During the 83 years of its existence 28 pastors have served the people of this community. The first church edifice was built in 1858 while Rev. John Schweinfurth served his second pastorate, and he also had the privilege to build the first parsonage in his third term, 1869-'70. In 1899 the church building, having become inadequate, a new church was built by the Rev. George Mitter. Fire destroyed the parsonage in the spring of 1929 and was replaced during the summer of the same year while Rev. F. Ross was pastor. Nine of the 28 pastors who have served Salem church are still living, five of them being on the retired list. Salem Methodist church invites all its friends, former members, the people of other churches, with their pastors, to come and spend this Sunday, July 6, with them in Christian fellowship.
