Former German Celonies Germany has never owned or had mandate on any part of Australia. Her acquisition of territory in Australasia began in 1884 when she annexed part of New Guinea, also the New Britain Archipelago. There was some indignation in Australia over this action, as in the previous year the Queensland government had attempted to appropriate this hand but had been restrained by the British government which assured them that no foreign power contemplated any interference in New Guinea. In 1885 Germany annexed the Marshall and Solomon islands and in 1809 German Samon and other islands.
