New Group of Boys at Boytown Camp

One hundred boys, selected from the special education department of the public schools of Detroit, spent the month of July at Boytown camp, Mill Lake, the first of the welfare projects to be completed on the government's Waterloo project, and during the month of August the camp is being occupied by 100 colored boys, also selected from the special education department in Detroit, who came last Wednesday.

For many of these boys it was their first experience in camp and at least one third of them had never seen a cow before. Forty per cent of them came from families on relief and all are what is described as "behavior problems," a term covering a multitude and a variety of mental, moral and physical handicaps. To call these "bad boys" would be unfair, although they are difficult to supervise, and would not be accepted in ordinary camps.

Although ranging in age from seven to only 18 or 17, more than a few have already learned many of the ways of crime. Yet, among the group who just left the camp was one boy with an I. Q. rating of 180, just one point short of genius, and several with ratings of 112 to 115, compared to the normal average of 90 to 110.

The camp staff consists of William E. Masterson, camp director, who is in charge of the health education program of the special education department of the Detroit schools; 10 counselors and their three assistants, and a doctor. Much more patience is required than if they were supervising normal boys and careful planning of the day's activities is needed, as almost every hour must be taken up.

At 7 a. m. the boys are awakened by the ringing of the farm house bell set up in front of the mess hall. They first take a dip in the lake, stressing the idea of cleanliness, then breakfast, then study and work periods, in which some of the boys go on nature hikes in charge of assistant director Bud Handy. Others work in the crafts shop. Others hear the camp doctor discuss simple anatomy. Another dip in the lake occurs at 11 a. m., before dinner, with more study and work after dinner, and then comes the one "free" time in the day, from 4 to 5:30 p. m.

In the evening camp assemblies are held in the "bowl," a natural hollow on the west side of the camp site. Nature study, crafts and anatomy, boating, swimming and boxing are subjects and activities in which the boys receive instruction. The boys do all of their own housework, setting table for the meals, washing their clothing and keeping the camp clean and neat. The camp is divided into cabin groups, with nine boys and one counselor sleeping in each of the ten 10-cott cabins.

Health is an important matter at the camp and during the period just closed the average gain in weight was from five to 10 pounds. But most important of all is turning the boys from the path on which they have started and giving them a better chance of staying on the right road.

ATTEND BASEBALL GAME

Thirty-two local baseball fans attended the baseball game in Detroit last Thursday, boasting the special 20-coach train which carried 1200 Jackson fans to the game. One of the best games of the season was witnessed, Schoolboy-Rowe winning the decision over the New York Yankees with a 5 to 4 score.

D. H. Bacon, secretary-treasurer of the Central Fibre Products Co., was host to the employees of the Chelsea plant at the game, furnishing them with tickets on the special train and at the game. Following the game he entertained them at the Hungarian Kitchen for dinner.

MICHIGAN LEADS THE WAY

Again the State of Michigan leads the way in businesslike conduct of state business. Gov. Frank D. Fitzgerald, by his deciding vote when the project was before the State Administrative Board, assured another statewide advertising campaign to encourage collection of delinquent taxes.

The State of Michigan will spend \$27,000 for the new campaign that will be conducted during the month of August. The drive will be handled by Milton M. Alexander, of Detroit, nationally known advertising man, who conceived and conducted last year's notably successful effort.

There is no more pressing problem before the various states than that of collecting delinquent taxes, carried over from depression years. In some states the authorities have thrown up their hands in despair at the problem. In other states various plans have been enacted only to be extended or changed time and time again. It remained for Michigan to make real progress in cleaning up this distressing problem.

Reports are that seventy millions of dollars in delinquent real estate taxes were paid or revived in Michigan during last year's drive.

This year's drive will urge the taxpayers who are on the "ten-year plan" to make their second payments before September 1st in order to keep their tax records clear and avoid penalties. It will also persuade those not yet on the "ten-year plan" to come under it. Finally, it will point out that due to improved business conditions or distribution of the soldiers' bonus, many taxpayers are now in a position to pay up their remaining balances on the "ten-year plan" so as to save themselves 8 per cent to 36 per cent interest on future payments.

When Abraham Lincoln was once asked how he managed to get so much work done, he replied: "When I have something to do I go and do it. Michigan had a job to do—and what a job! To the credit of our state officials be it said that our state has 'gone and done it!'"

Jewett Family Observe 100th Anniversary

One hundred years ago Elizar Jewett came to Michigan from New Hampshire, settling on what is now the Waltrous farm in Lima township. To commemorate this event, 55 members of the Jewett family gathered Sunday for their 22nd annual reunion at the home of R. B. Waltrous, who is a great-grandson of Mr. Jewett. During the past century six generations of the family have resided on this farm.

A picnic dinner was served and the table was centered with a large centennial cake bearing the dates 1836-1936. Letters written by the early settlers to their kinfolk in New Hampshire were read. At that time the postage on a letter from Chelsea to New Hampshire was 25c.

APPLY FOR GRANT

The village council took action at their meeting Monday evening to apply to the Federal Emergency Administration for a grant of \$24,300.00 to aid in the construction of the local sewage disposal plant which was voted at the special election on July 27. The original application was for both the outright grant and for a loan to finance the remainder of the cost, but the loan application was eliminated from the request for a grant. No action will be taken on the matter of constructing a plant until the grant is deposited in the local bank, when bonds will be issued and bids asked for the construction work.

State Safety Council Urges Safe Driving

The Michigan State Safety Council advises that observance by all motorists of the following eleven safe driving rules will make life and property safer on Michigan highways.

Set speed according to conditions of traffic highway surface and of the motor vehicle itself.

Keep to extreme right hand side of highways when going over hills.

Overtake and pass only when, without doubt, it is safe to do so.

Keep as far as is reasonable to the right of lane and centerline pavement markings. On three and four lane highways, use inner lanes for passing only.

Readily give way to the right at sound of horns of overtaking vehicles. Slow down for intersections.

Slow down when approaching hill tops.

Slow down when approaching pedestrian crossings.

Make right and left turns carefully and be sure your signals can be seen a hundred feet from the turn.

Observe traffic lights and stop signs.

Park only at a distance from the traveled portion of the highway.

Approximately 75 per cent of the motor vehicle collisions on Michigan highways result from disregard of these rules.

Four Persons Seek Each Elective Job

If records of the Department of State represent an accurate sampling of political activity throughout the state, an average of 4.5 persons are candidates for every elective office to be filled next November. Orville E. Atwood, Secretary of State, points out.

A total of 290 candidates for United States Senator, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Congress and the State Legislature have filed their petitions with the Secretary of State. The vacancies to be filled by election to total 52, thus the average number of candidates for each.

In 1934, while 217 candidates filed their petitions originally, six withdrew before the deadline for that privilege. In 1932, the record-breaking number of 246 candidates had presented themselves for consideration of voters in elections for which petitions are filed at the capitol.

Candidates whose districts are wholly contained within any one county, file their petitions with their county clerks. Thus, lists of candidates for Congress published by the Department of State, omit reference to the 1st, 13th, 14th, 15th and 16th Congressional districts, all contained within Wayne county.

Similarly, candidates for the state senate from the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 13th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 21st and 22nd state senatorial districts, file with their respective county clerks.

Of the 100 seats in the state House of Representatives, candidates for but 14 of them file their petitions with the Secretary of State.

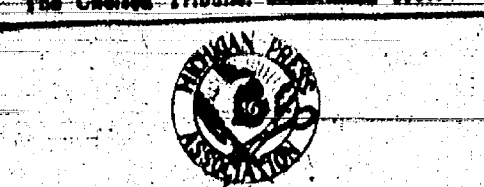

Question And Answer Dept.

Ques.—I would like to ask you if fish ever sleep? Thank you.

Ans.—Yes. When fish are not "biting" they are usually taking their sleep. However, their eyes are never closed, but they are inactive and apparently at rest.

Ques.—How do trees and things become petrified?

Ans.—This is the effect of water carrying in solution certain chemicals, especially silica, which is another name for quartz. This water saturates the body of the tree or thing and replaces its fiber, atom for atom, with quartz. The whole tree or thing is thus turned to stone.

Ques.—Will you kindly answer in the question department of your paper in what country is the Po river located?

Ans.—The Po river is in Italy, the longest and widest river in that country.

Ques.—What religion did George Washington embrace?

Ans.—George Washington was an Episcopalian. The records show that he was baptised on Thursday, April 9, 1732, in this sect. He was a vestryman in Christ church, Alexandria, where he had a pew.

Ques.—Is it known how many stones it took to build the Great Pyramid?

Ans.—The Great Pyramid, the largest of the pyramid group, contains 2,300,000 stones.

Ques.—Does Kansas and Arkansas have the same state flower?

Ans.—No. The State flower of Kansas is the sunflower, and that of Arkansas is the apple blossom.

Ques.—What chemicals or oils are used to soften the bones of canned salmon?

Ans.—The bones of canned salmon are not softened by any chemicals or oils. The great heat in the process of canning is what softens the bones of salmon.

Ques.—May I ask in your interesting questions just what is meant by "pinto"?

Ans.—"Pinto" is a term used to designate the color of the coat of a horse of mixed color. A spotted, mottled, piebald, or milk-and-elder animal is spoken of as a pinto.

Ques.—When and where did Calvin Coolidge die? What was the cause of his death?

Ans.—Calvin Coolidge died in the forenoon of Thursday, January 5, 1933, at Northampton, Mass. He died very suddenly, and the official statement of the physician was "heart trouble," although a few hours before his death he was suffering from what he thought was an attack of indigestion.

Ques.—How can a person tell when canned stuff is poisonous, spoiled or otherwise unfit to eat?

Ans.—As a rule canned goods that is unfit to eat may be detected by its appearance, odor or taste. Another sure way is to place a drop or two of water on top of the can and then make a puncture in the can through the water. If the water goes down through the little hole the contents are O. K. If it bubbles at all the food is spoiled.

Ques.—Why is it difficult to walk in a straight line while your eyes are closed?

Ans.—This is because very few people take exactly equal steps with their two legs. Subconsciously one leg steps out a little farther than the other. This is corrected, also subconsciously, if the eyes are open to see where you are going. If your eyes are closed you cannot walk a straight line more than several feet. A broken or beaten path across a field or short-cuts are always more or less winding because of the irregular distance of stepping.

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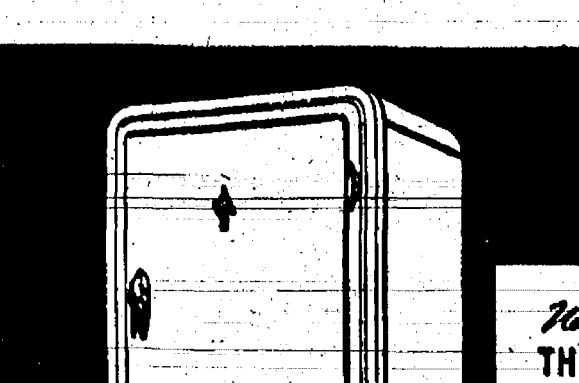

Fishing Census Gives Interesting Data

Lansing—In compiling data obtained from 17,885 fishermen through the medium of creel census cards in 1935, the Institute of Fisheries Research has found that these fishermen—men and women—had devoted an average of approximately three and a third hours to fishing when contacted and had averaged 1.5 legal-size fish per hour.

The 17,885 fishermen contacted had spent a total of 69,408 hours fishing and had made an aggregate catch of 93,967 fish, better than five fish per man.

Admittedly these figures do not give a complete picture of fishing in Michigan for 1935, but they do serve as a pretty good indication and will be useful in the future to give an idea of fishing trends and supplies, conservation authorities say.

The 17,885 fishermen who participated in the creel census work are obviously only a small part of the total number who fished Michigan waters last year. In 1935 nearly 600,000 fishing licenses of various kinds were sold; but Fred A. Westerman, chief of fisheries operations, believes that the number who actually fished runs closer to the million mark.

"If we were to apply the five-catch average, which is the sampling of a day's total catch, to that number and carry it out we would run into startling figures," Mr. Westerman said. "This teaches us to keep in mind that we must depend upon the natural production of native fish in wild waters for the maintenance of our fish supply and good fishing in this state. We cannot begin to keep our natural fish supply by plantings from the hatcheries, without natural propagation in wild waters."

"Our hatchery system can serve its best purpose in stocking depleted waters and in helping to replenish local fish supplies which have suffered from intensive fishing and for these purposes it is probably now adequate. The bulkward of sustained good fishing and fish supplies in Michigan is clean waters and adequate protection for spawning and young fish."

Of the 17,885 fishermen mentioned in the report, 4,330 had fished trout waters, spent 15,404 hours fishing, caught a total of 12,321 legal-size fish, an average of 0.8 fish per hour. A total of 13,555 anglers spent 43,912 hours fishing in non-trout waters, catching 81,288 legal-size fish or 1.9 fish per hour.

Other interesting information included in the Institute report follows: Fishing in trout waters was decidedly better in the upper peninsula than in the lower peninsula.

Non-resident stream fishermen got more fish per hour for the entire state than resident stream fishermen.

Non-resident lake fishermen caught fewer fish per hour for the entire state, than resident lake fishermen.

For all fishing the catch per hour was slightly higher for residents than for non-residents.

Female stream fishermen caught only about half the fish per hour caught by male stream fishermen.

Female lake fishermen were almost as successful as male lake fishermen in catching fish.

Female fishermen, for all fishing combined, were almost as successful as male fishermen.

Of all stream fishermen 44 percent were women. Of all lake fishermen, seven percent were women; of all fishermen, six percent were women.

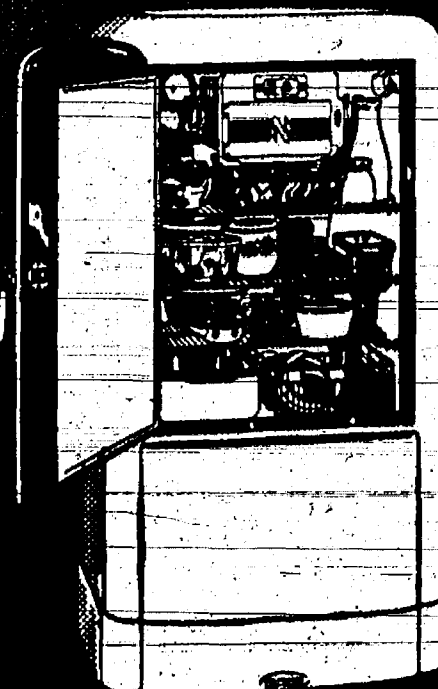

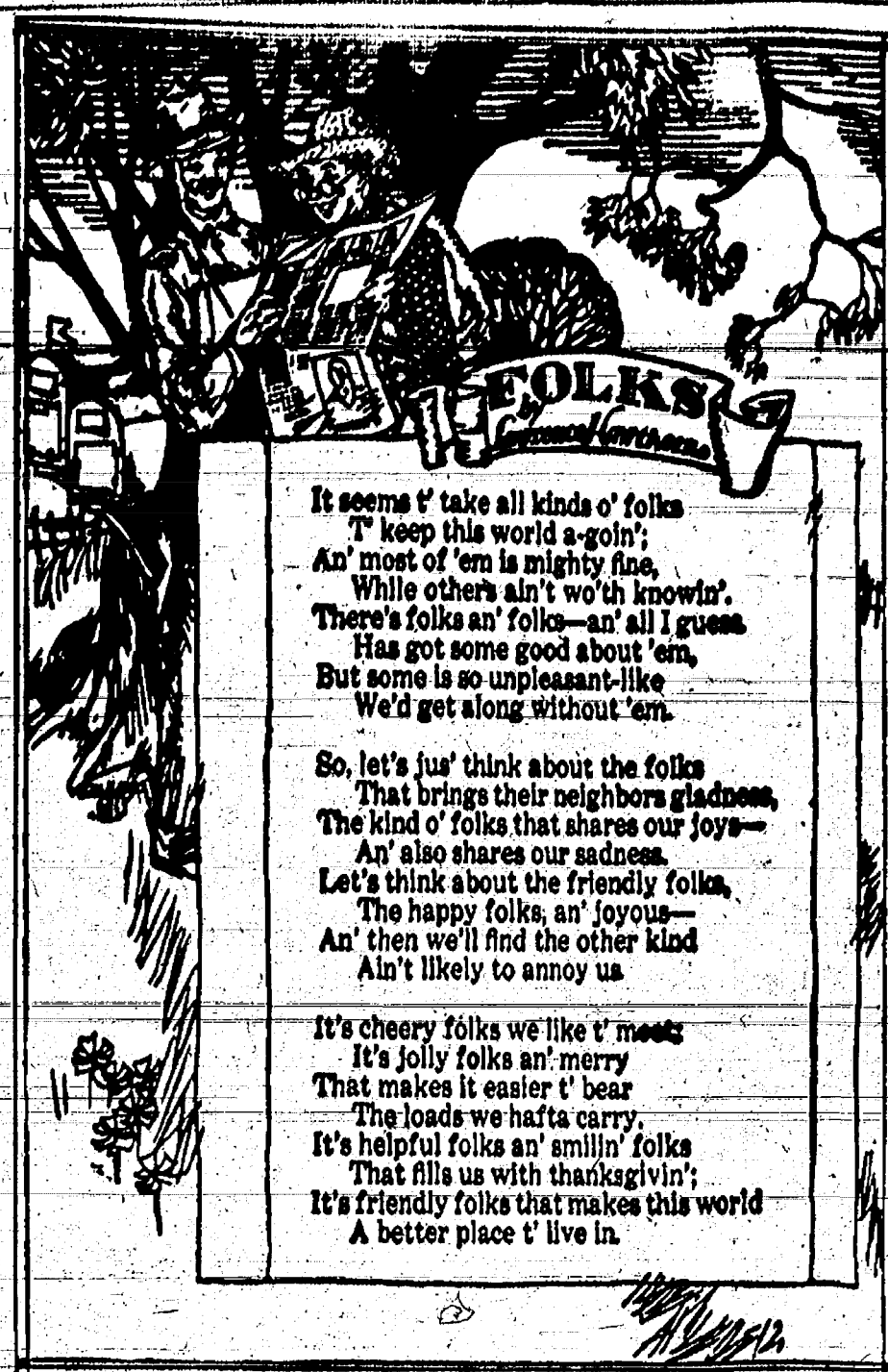

Use of Nature's Gifts

There are no indications that in remote time, either oil or gas was put to much practical use as modern people understand that term, but there is little doubt that priests of the fire-worshipping cult which flourished in old Persia made "good things" out of the phenomena. Not far from Baku are the ruins of a temple of the cult which is believed to have been in existence for more than 2,500 years.

Tower, beacons and altars are provided with channels concealed in the masonry, which demonstrate that gas-fitting is not a craft of modern birth. These channels led from fissures in the earth which once furnished natural gas. To this temple came pilgrims from all parts of the East as late as the eighties of the last century. Besides the walls of the temple today stands a modern refinery, furnishing an emphatic contrast in the old and new uses of Nature's gift of oil and gas.

Average American Uses Lots of Milk and Butter

Mr. Average American uses a little over a pint of milk a day in one form or another. To be more specific, according to statistics the average American uses 55.3 gallons of milk a year. In addition to the milk, he eats 17.8 pounds of butter, 4.3 pounds of cheese, and 2.77 gallons of ice cream in the course of a year. There are other nations which have a higher consumption when it comes to ice cream. Other nations don't even report on their ice cream consumption, while in this country it is quite an item.

The great dairying countries of Europe use more milk and cheese per person than the United States, although there is little difference in butter consumption. Sweden heads the list in milk consumption, with 63.7 gallons per person for the year; Denmark, with 63.5; Switzerland, 67; and Germany with a consumption of 61 gallons per person are all ahead of the United States.

When it comes to cheese consumption, the American just isn't in it with his four pounds, for the average Swiss eats over 23 pounds, the average Frenchman or Dane 18 pounds; the German eats more than nine pounds, and the Englishman about the same.

Many Giants Mentioned Through Ancient History
Stories are common among the lower civilized peoples, as well as among savage tribes, to the effect that men have lived who have measured 15 feet in height. Og, King of Bashan, is said in Deuteronomy (3:11) to have been the last of the giants. His bedstead of iron was nine cubits, or between 11 and 13½ feet in length. Pliny mentions the name of an Arabian giant who measured 9½ feet, and also speaks of two others who were 10 feet in stature.

First American Play in 1787

The first play written by an American to be presented professionally, "The Contrast," a comedy by Col. Royall C. It could not be produced in his native Boston because there (to use his words) the theater was "the vestibule of hell."

Prague, Gay City

Prague, the capital city of the Czechoslovakian republic, has rapidly grown into a big world center. It looks back on a long history, for it was already an important township in the Middle Ages and seat of a famous university since 1348. Magnificent architecture combined with all achievements of a modern city make it most attractive for foreign travelers.

Popples Make Samarkand Golden

When Walter Duranty visited Samarkand, Russia, all the roofs of the adobe houses were a mass of yellow popples, and that, he surmised, was the reason the city is called Golden Samarkand. The Soviet government has carefully maintained and, where possible, restored the city's treasures of the past, he reports.

Never the Same

The collections in the Ski museum near Oslo, Norway, show that skis vary not only from one locality to another, but also from one winter to another, points out Charles M. Dudley in "60 Centuries of Skiing." The museum contains a ski about 2,500 years old, believed to be the oldest in the world.

Cardinal, Inter Cardinal Points

North, south, east and west are the cardinal points. Northeast, northwest, etc., are called intercardinal points of the compass.

The Kinkajou

The kinkajou is a species of the raccoon family found in South America, and sometimes known as a honey bear, a yellow lemur, a masavi, and even a Mexican weasel. The adult is the size of a large cat and its fur is short, thick and yellowish brown in coloring with shades of deep brown on the neck and over the back and ribs. A peculiar feature of this covering is the flexibility of the skin. It can be stretched several inches from the body with no discomfort to the animal and serves as a great protection when attacked. The long tail is much the same as a monkey's and used in the same fashion for holding or grasping an object.

"Beyond the Pale"

A pale was originally a stake, and referred especially to one of the stakes used to form a fence. As early as 1400 it was used in a figurative sense to mean a limit, boundary or restriction.

"Hiking" an Old Word
