## Local Toy Industry Increasing Volume

A new Chelsea industry which has been making rapid strides during the past few weeks is the Chappy Craft Industries, manufacturers of an educational toy, "Peg-A-Picture". This toy was designed by H. J. Chapman of Detroit and manufacturing operations are being carried on in a part of the Central Fibre Products plant, North Main street.

Large quantities of this toy have been made here and the company is selling the item to more than 50 large department stores throughout the United States. It is expected that the demand for this toy during the Christmas buying season will provide a fine volume of business for this local industry.

Peg-A-Picture is a board 10x13 inches, with 743 punched holes for brightly colored pegs which are furnished. The holes are close together, so that a child may place the pegs in the form of letters, designs and pictures, illustrations of which are printed on the toy and box cover. Educational leaders and child psychologists who have seen the board enthusiastically endorsed it, not only because of its splendid amusement features, but because Peg-A-Picture teaches color, design and line.

A number of the boards have been purchased by the Chelsea public school for use in the kindergarten department. This toy is sold in Chelsea at Grove Bros. store. It comes packed in an attractive colored box.  
Chappy Craft Industries also manufacture a similar but smaller item which is sold entirely in a large chain of 5c to 25c stores. Other products are planned by the company which will maintain their sales volume throughout the year.

## KROGER SALES INCREASE

Cincinnati—An increase of \$700,000 in sales of the Kroger Grocery & Baking Company for the four week period ending October 31, compared with the same four week period of 1935, was reported at the general offices of the company here last week.

The increase is equivalent to four per cent.

Sales for this period of 1936 total \$18,468,742 against a total of \$17,708,092 for the same period a year ago, reflecting the upward trend that has been noted in the business of the Kroger organization of 4,212 retail grocery stores and meat markets during the last several months.

Cumulative sales for the year for the first 11 periods of 1936 ending October 31 have reached \$199,614,578, as against a total of \$194,175,592 for the same 11 periods of 1935, which represents an increase of three per cent.

## FIND 186,134 JOBS

During the twelve months ending October 31, 1936, which marks the completion of Major Howard Starret's first year as State Reemployment Director, the National Reemployment Service found 186,134 jobs for Michigan persons.

This is an average of over 15,500 per month. During the first few months the bulk of the placements were on Federal projects but since January jobs in private industry and with private contractors have shown a steady monthly increase.

At the end of the year the situation has completely reversed itself, the majority of jobs now being with private industry and contractors while comparatively few placements in relief work projects are being made, according to Major Starret.

There are 42 district and branch offices serving each of Michigan's 83 counties. Localities remote from NRS offices receive itinerant registration service. Approximately 60 of these "part time offices" are operated by representatives out of the nearest district or branch office, Major Starret said.

The NRS is a division of the United States Employment Service which is affiliated with the U. S. Department of Labor.

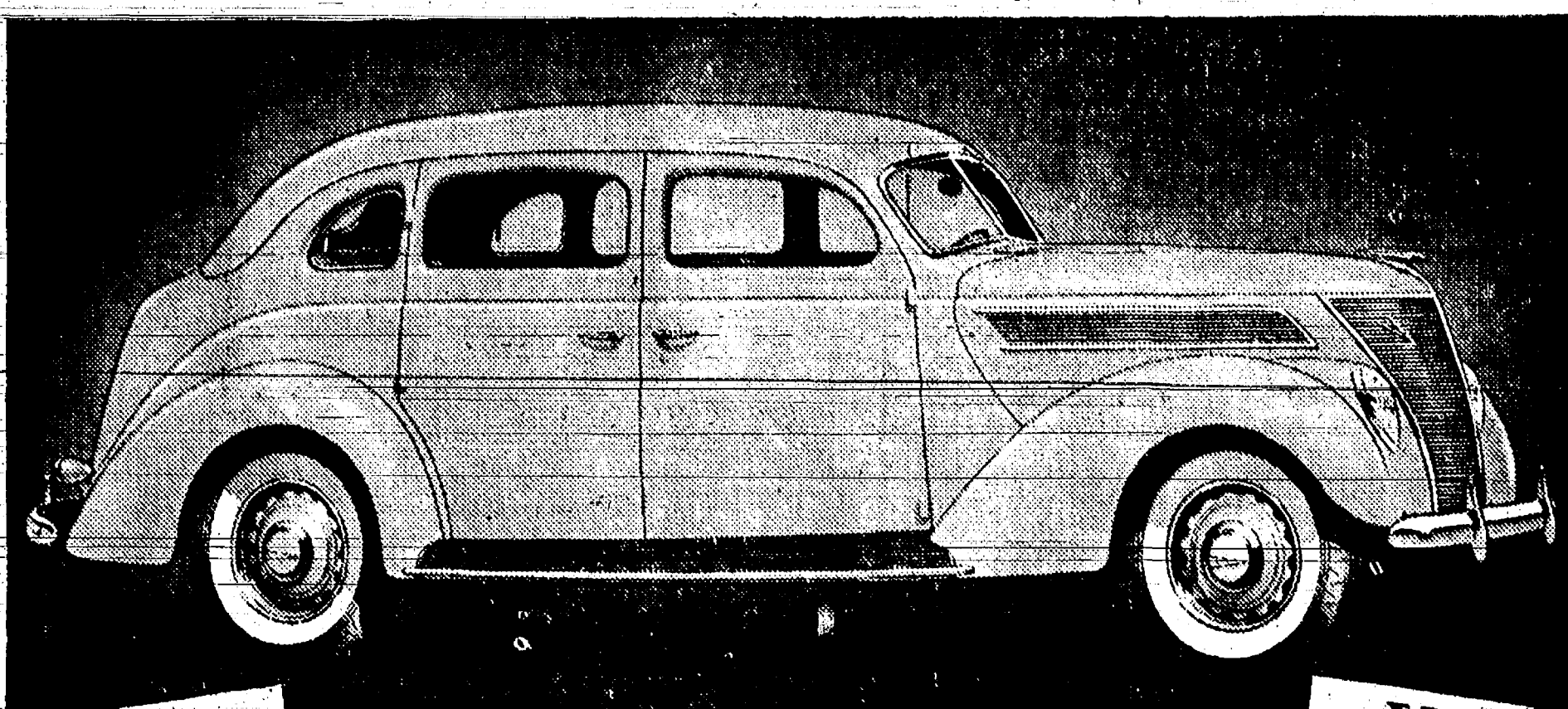

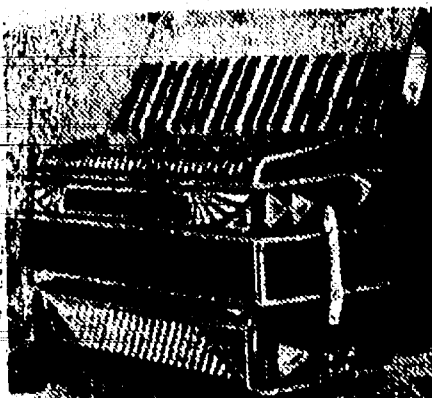
