

Christmas Seals Go On Sale In County

To provide funds to carry on the war against tuberculosis in Washtenaw county in 1937, 2,000,000 of tuberculosis Christmas seals were sent on their mission of health last week by the Washtenaw County Tuberculosis Association. Residents throughout the county have received the seals, Kathryn Tuomy, general chairman of the committee in charge of the sale, stated this week.

"The question of how adequately the 1987 campaign against tuberculosis in Washtenaw county will be financed, has been placed with the people," Miss Tuomy said. "Each of the thousands of Christmas seals mailed is a potential weapon against disease that still kills more between the ages of 15 and 45 than any other. Whether these seals take part in the fight depends entirely upon the action of those to whom they have been mailed. Every death from tuberculosis is

New Portion of US-12 Opened to Traffic

A two-year building program by the state highway department brought the completion last week of a threelane superhighway on US-12 between Ann Arbor and Jackson.

Traffic was opened on 15.9 miles of the highway east from Jackson to ring down the curtain on an improvement program that cost the state and Federal governments approximately \$1,-478,650.

Motorists can now drive over a 81foot pavement all the way from Jackson to Ann Arbor with the exception son to Ann Arbor with the exception of a 5-mile section in the vicinity of Chelsea. There, the highway department was unable to proceed with its building program because of right-of-way difficulties. Until these difficulties can be straightened out, the road at this point will be a two-lane bottleneck, State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner has said.

The state highway department in 1985 built 9.2 miles of the new superhighway west from Ann Arbor. This year's program embraced 15.9 miles east from Jackson except for a mile to the Jackson city limits which will be constructed next year. Plans call

Invented Vacuum Cleaner The vacuum cleaner was invented

by H. C. Booth, an engineer of London. He patented his invention in 1901 and named it the vacuum cleaner.
