Crossus Famous for Wealth. Crossus, who lived from 560 to 546 B. C., and who was famous in antiquity for his great wealth, was king of Lydia, in Asia Minor. According to tradition, his wealth was principally obtained from the golden sands of the River Pactolus, which flowed through his dominions." The true source of his riches was probably the industry of his people, who were not only great producers but great traders. There is no record of the extent of his wealth, but there is some account of his landed properties, from which an ingenious archeologist has estimated them to have been worth between \$8,000,000 and \$9,000,000.

of the Garter, an order of chivalry instituted by Edward III in 1349. Its meaning is: "Evil be to him who evil thinks." It is the most ancient and important of British orders of knighthood. The story of its origin in the restoration of her garter to the Countess of Salisbury by the king, after it had dropped to the ground, is questioned and depends on popular tradition only, Edward had projected the revival of King Arthur's Knights of the Round Table and he invited "foreigners and subjects of quality and courage" to a tournament in 1344, a table being erected at Windsor Castle, 200 feet in diameter, at which the knights were to be entertained. This festival excited the jealousy of Philip of France, who forbade his subjects to attend and proclaimed one to be held by himself in Paris.

Edgar Lee Masters was born in the little town of Garnett, Kan., in 1868. His father was a descendant of old Virginia stock; his mother, the daughter of a Methodist minister and descendant of Israel Putnam of | Solemn Compact Signed American Revolutionary fame. The family moved to Petersburg, Ill., and later to Lewistown, where Edgar was raised in the typically respectable atmosphere of small town America.

He did newspaper work for the local weekly, learned the printing trade, and studied law under his father, who was one of the leading lawyers in-the-state. In 1891 Edgar Lee Masters was admitted to the bar and practiced in partnership with his father. The following year he opened his own office in Chicago where he was a highly successful lawyer until 1920,

But even in high school, Edgar Lee Masters was interested in writing and he never forgot his ambitions. He contributed to the Waverly Magazine of Boston and the Saturday Evening Call of Peoria; he wrote poems for a Chicago newspaper. His first book, published in-1898, while he was struggling to es-

Search for the True Cross The-cross did not become the symbol of Christianity until the Fourth century. The true cross is said to have been found during the reign of Tiberius when St. James was the bishop of Jerusalem. We have all heard of the finding of the three crosses by the Empress Helena in 328; says a writer in Pearson's London Weekly. It is mentioned that she did not know which was the true cross. To determine which was the true one she had the body of a dead man placed on one of the crosses. Contact with, it had no effect upon him, so he was placed on the second cross with the same result. When he was laid on the third cross he immediately came to life. We are told she sent part of the true cross to Constantine and part to Rome, where it is still preserved. The rest was buried in the church which she had built over the site of Golgotha.

#### **Continental Body Issued** \$250,000,000 in Bills

Continental currency is the term applied to the forty issues of bills of credit or paper money put out by authority of the Continental congress rom June 22, 1115, to November 29, 1779. In all, this currency amounted

to a face value of \$250,000,000, says the-Rocky-Mountain Herald. The bills were promises to pay, based-upon the pledge of congress to redeem them in "Spanish milled dollars, or the value thereof in gold or silver." No date for redemption was given,

The reason for their issuance was that the congress had no fiscal power and not authority to levy taxes. There was, moreover, not enough faith in the prospects of the revolution being successful for the congress to be able to borrow much money.

real value, quickly depreciated, and their face. At the end of the year their ratio to specie was 38 to 1. In 1780 the congress itself recognized its inability to maintain their value and provided for their acceptance in place of silver at a rate 100 to 1, and in 1790, by the terms of a funding act of that year, provision was made for redeeming them, up to a certain date, at that ratio. Those which were unredeemed were thereafter without value and no longer circulated.

#### William Hogarth, Artist

William Hogarth, painter, engraver and pictorial satirist, was born at London in 4697. He served an apprenticeship to a silversmith and about 1720 began business for himself, engraving coats of arms and designing plates for booksellers. In 1724 he entered the art school of Sir James Thornhill. He illustrated Gray's edition of Butler's "Hudibras." and in-1739-began-the painting of the satirical pictures that made him famous. Among them are "The Harlot's Progress," "A Midnight Modern Conversation," "The Distressed Poet" and "Marriage a la Mode." He died in 1764.

gin of the flag is one of the dramatic stories of Revolutionary days, featuring one of the more colorful women of colonial history, the widow of John Ross, upholsterer, who fell early in the revolution. A storehouse of munitions he was guarding exploded. Betsy Ross has been pictured as the Florence Nightingule of the Revolution.

To this brick house at 239 Arch street, Philadelphia, came one day in June, 1776, a committee of Gen. George Washington, Col. George Ross, uncle of Betsy's late husband, and the wealthy Robert Morris, chairman of the secret commission on supplies for the colonial forces. They requested Betsy Ross to make the flag according-to-a-design-given her by General Washington, and which was officially adopted by the congress the following year.

The old house is a two-and-a-half story structure, 17 feet wide, with but two rooms on the ground floor. 

ing carefully preserved. Thus it was discovered that six doors with original L-shaped hinges of colonial make remain; two sets of colonial shutters, of spliced wood, panelled inside, with authentic hinges were discovered on the rear of the building. 


