Birds Lay Eggs on Rock

The brightest eggs laid by British birds are those of the guillemot, found in colonies around the coasts. The birds like a large flat ledge of rock, and there they may be seen sitting packed close together with their wings and breasts touching. No nest is built; the one large egg laid by each bird is just dropped on the bare rock. Each bird knows its own egg, and the same applies to the young when they appear. If a strange baby tries to take food from the beak of an old bird it receives a violent peck, and the food is not parted with until the mother find

AUGUST 31 is the last date on which 1933, 1934, and 1935 taxes may be placed on the moratorium, or paid, with out penalties. The requirements are as follows: The first three installments must be paid on the 1932 and prior taxes, if any, and all of the 1936 taxes paid in full.




