In a recent newspaper I read that the Honorable Secretary of Interior, Mr. Ickes, had made the statement "he wished he had an armored car and could proceed down the highway and knock off some of the trucks on our roads."

What is Mr. Ickes talking about? Doesn't he know that some of the best highway safety records in the country have been developed by fleets of trucks? Doesn't Mr. Ickes know that from 1927 to 1938 the fatal accident rate for trucks decreased 29 per cent, and that the number of trucks involved in fatal accidents was 17 per cent lower in 1938 than in 1937? Isn't he aware that some of our truck drivers have driven hundreds of thousands of miles without an accident of any kind? Doesn't he know that truck companies and fleet owners are spending thousands of dollars for safety annually and that these dollars are an investment in safe driving? Doesn't he know that the young men on these trucks are devoting a lot of their time to the development of safety records that will be difficult to equal?

It is discouraging to have government officials give an opinion about some type of business when the facts prove just the opposite. This befuddling remark is entirely uncalled for and is direct unjustified criticism of the trucking and transportation industry.

There may be exceptions in certain cases, but certainly the entire industry should not be called on the carpet for one or two individual drivers.

I'm for the trucking industry because of the splendid safety performance of their drivers have turned out.

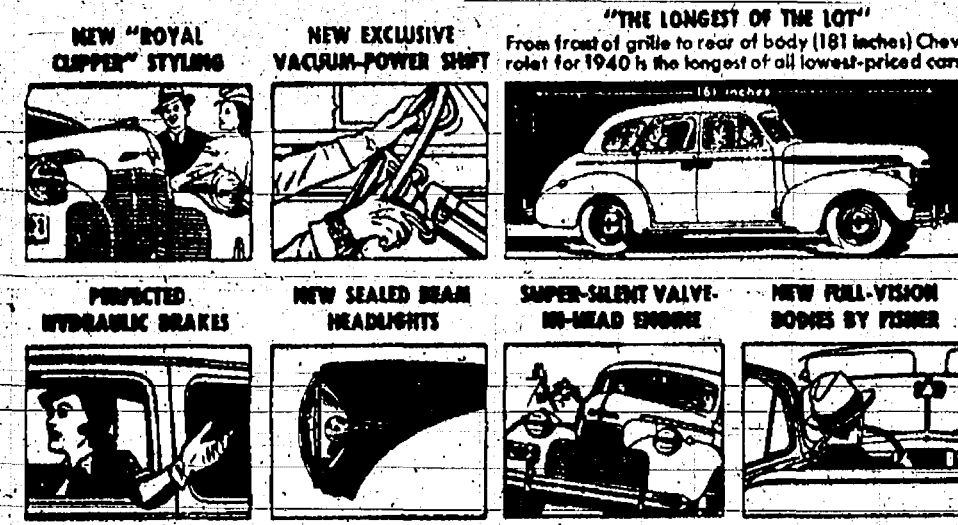

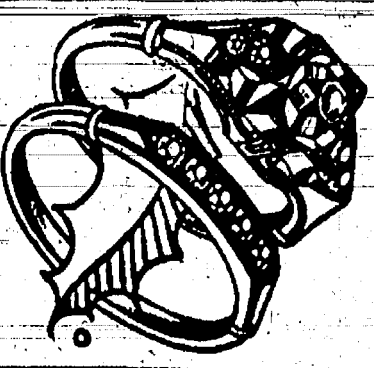

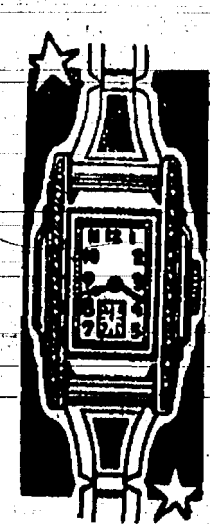

Missionary Will Speak At Methodist Church

Dr. Elbert M. Moffatt, missionary of the Methodist Episcopal church in Bombay, India, will be the guest speaker at the Chelsea Methodist church on Friday evening, December 8, at 7:30.

Dr. Moffatt first went to Lucknow, India, where he was engaged in educational work in the School of Commerce, as well as in evangelistic service among the Hindustani people of the city. He was also manager of the Boys' School at Dwarahat.

During recent years, Dr. Moffatt has been in charge of the Inter-Mission Business Office in Bombay, handling much of the financial work of a large number of mission boards and societies in India. He is also the Executive Secretary of Central Conference of the Methodist church. He

was a delegate to the Methodist-Uniting Conference, held in Kansas City, at which session the three branches of American Methodists were united into one body.

Dr. Moffatt was born in Le Sueur, Minnesota, and received his education in Dartmouth College and New York University. He served for five years in India as secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association before receiving appointment for service under the Board of Foreign Missions.

Dr. Wm. E. Harrison, the District Superintendent, will preside and introduce the speaker. The First Quarterly Conference will be conducted in short form and the required reports must be in writing.

Cattle Feeders Meet At M. S. C. Dec. 15

It's round-up time soon at Michigan State College for cattle feeders. The annual Cattle Feeders' Day, Dec. 15, for presentation of today's problems in buying, feeding and marketing beef cattle.

Use of the new livestock pavilion will provide space for all of the day's events which begin at 10 a. m., says E. L. Benton, college livestock extension specialist. Reese Van Vranken, Climax, president of the Michigan Cattle Feeders' association, will be ringmaster.

Cattle on feed on outside farm feedlots are to be trucked in for use during talks by two Michigan farmers and feeders, Austin Cowles of St. Johns and W. D. White of Hartland. Besides their experiences and advice, the college will present current experimental results through a staff member, Professor George A. Brannan. Market representatives will add to the information available in the day's program.

College tests include feeding results from three lots of 11 heifers started at 305 pounds. One group has been getting shelled corn and hay, another has had unlimited feeding of corn silage, hay and cottonseed meal and the third lot has been full-fed on alfalfa-molasses silage and shelled corn. Similar tests were completed a year ago on heavier cattle.

Campus visitors themselves will turn feeders at noon during a college beef lunch available in the pavilion. Students in the college Block and Bridle club are handling details for the lunch.

Afternoon events will turn towards transportation and market problems. Speakers will include R. D. Plaster, R. C. Pollock and Walter Howe. Conclusion of the program will be a discussion open to those who attend. Directors of the feeders' association will hold a brief session at the close of the Feeders' Day.

OLD AGE OFFICE MOVES
The Washtenaw County Bureau of Social Aid (formerly the Old Age Assistance Bureau) has moved to its new quarters on the first floor of the building at 417 West Liberty Street, Ann Arbor, formerly occupied by the E. R. A. The Bureau of Social Aid will administer aid to dependent children and aid to the blind formerly administered by the E. R. A., as well as old age assistance. A supervisor, to be appointed by Dr. Callahan, supervisor of the State Bureau of Social Security, from the three highest names for the position of social worker A on the Washtenaw County eligible register for this class of work will be in charge of the Washtenaw County Bureau of Social Aid.

Our Neighbors

DEXTER—The Standard service station on the corner of Main and B streets, operated for the past year by Jack Blanchard, has been purchased by Mrs. Dorothy Miller of North Lake. Mrs. Miller will continue operation of the service station with possibly some change in the building arrangement scheduled for the near future. The station will be managed by Edward Haselschwerdt. Mrs. Miller is well known in Dexter and environs in connection with the Inverness Inn at North Lake, which she will continue to operate. The "old Murdoch home" on Fifth street is now being remodeled by Mrs. Miller and will be occupied by her about January first.—Leader.

PINCKNEY—24 head of Hereford steers from Texas got loose from the Percy Ellis farm last week and it took two days to round them up, with the assistance of some 25 amateur cowboys from Pinckney.—Dispatch.

MASON—Mason's fire department was summoned to the Frank Hayhoe farm in Alaledon township Monday morning to fight a muck fire which had been burning for eight days. The fire spread over a wide area and probably killed 200 hard maple trees. There were about 300 hard maples in the sugar bush and two-thirds of them had their roots burned in the muck blaze. Woods and fields are as dry as tinder and hunters have been warned to be careful with matches and cigarette butts.—County News.

DUNDEE—An oil well which came in with a rush at 2080 feet in a Monday sprayed oil 125 feet in the air, was fought for three hours on the Hugo Gaertner farm west of here and three and a half miles north of Petersburg before being brought under control. During the three hours there were four spectacular flows and approximately 200 barrels of oil were lost. Today the well is flowing at about 65 barrels an hour. The other seven wells now operating in the field are producing from three to 70 barrels each per day. Oil sand in the Gaertner well was struck at 2072 feet. Drilling was started on September 20.—Reporter.

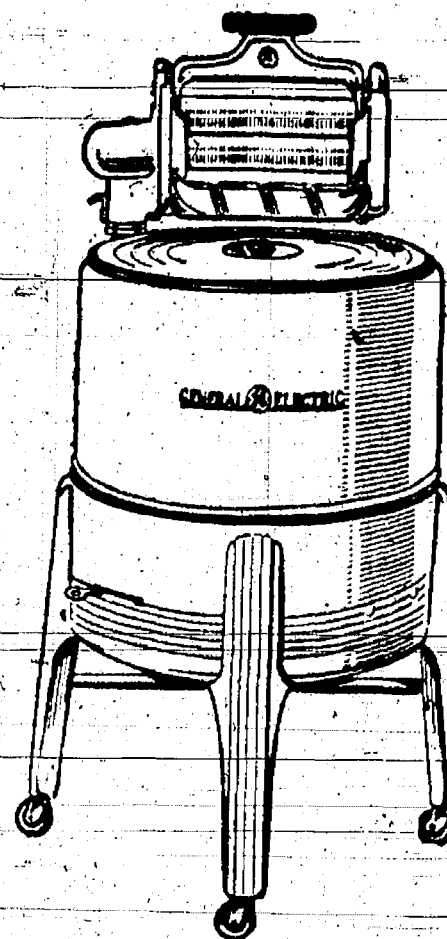

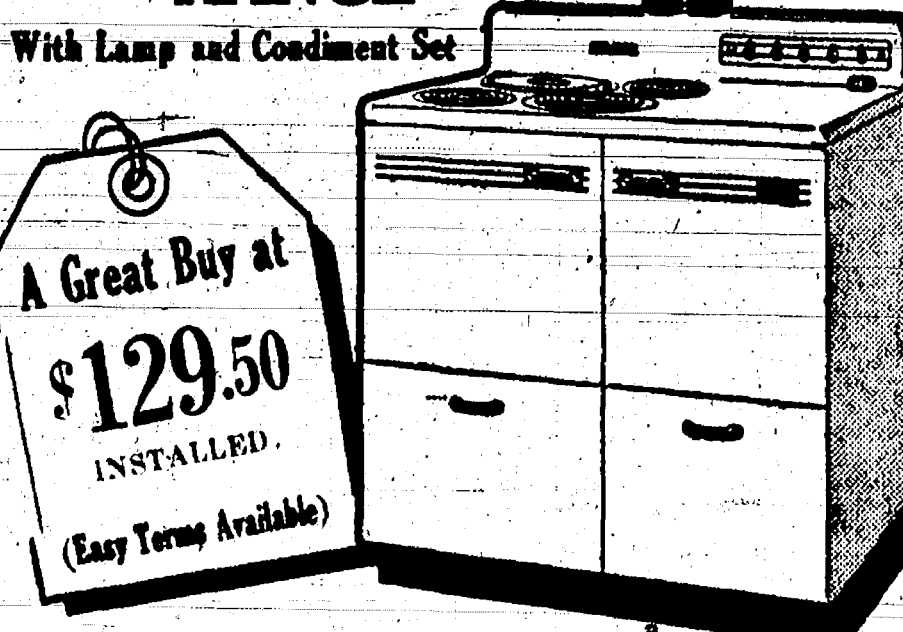
