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

Speedy Flowing Glaciers A glacier flows much like a river, except more slowly. One of the fastest-flowing known, is the Upernivik in Greenland which has been found to have a velocity of 99 feet per day at one point. The Muir glacier, Alaska, has a velocity of about seven feet per day near tidewater. A world record for short-time glacial movements was set by the Black Rapids glacier, near Fairbanks, Alaska, in the winter of 1936-7. The glacier advanced five miles in four months with a speed average of 220 feet per day.





Wild Bird Longevity Record Few wild birds live to be over 10

years old. Twenty-one years is the greatest longevity record thus far recorded for any bird in the banding files of the bureau of biological survey. An osprey banded at Gardiner's island, N. Y., in June, 1914, was found dead at the same place in June, 1935. One of the oldest birds recorded in the past few years was a 17-year-old Louisiana heron, which was banded at Avery island, La., in August, 1920, and retrapped at the same place in January, 1937.
