which it rests cannot be made sound by over-zealous eloquence. Tyranny rejects spiritual values, without which existence is a meaningless dream. Devoid of reality, lacking the divine at-tributes which ensure the continuity of all right ideas, its pretense to power falls before the law of God.

God is omnipotent, omnipresent, om-niscient, and omniactive, governing all His children through spiritual law. This divine law can be understood and-demonstrated by all, for their mutual good. There is nothing in mortal belief that can intervene between God and His creation, including man made in His likeness, who is wholly good. Even though this truth may be ob-scured for a time, it will stand in spite of all efforts of evil to erase it. Man cannot be separated from God, the cause of his being, the source of all real existence. Soon or late, every mortal will awake from the dream of separation from God, good, to hear and respond to the call of Love. Thenwill Principle and its reflection be understood as existing in everlasting harmony; and Love's likeness will be seen as eternally loving. Truth will.
